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
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

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

## ROAD S.E. Appalachian TRIPS

Kentucky offers numerous natural amenities, such as scenic waters and overlooks. Meander through wooded wonderlands by car, or step out for a hike to a natural rock formation, such as the 75-foot Sky Bridge in Red River Gorge. In eastern Ohio, drive the Ohio River Scenic Byway for lots of water views, fields, hills and cliffs. The star of the route is of course the Ohio River, which marks the border between Ohio and West Virginia.

















### 01 IRONWORKS SCENIC ROAD, KY

**18.9 miles: 0 hours, 31 minutes**Off Iron Works Pike, Kentucky Horse Park

Off Iron Works Pike, Kentucky Horse Park impresses with 1,200-acres to explore. This destination presents opportunities to meet, greet, learn about and enjoy many different breeds of horses.

### 02 KENTUCKY'S SCENIC ROUTE 90

57.9 miles: 1 hours, 5 minutes

This drive is a relaxing journey through woods, meadows and small communities, until you cross the Cumberland River, when the drive turns spectacular.

#### 03 BARREN RIVER LAKE SCENIC DRIVE, KY

21.0 miles: 0 hours, 25 minutes Stop in Barren River Lake State Park, a 2,187-acre resort area with a restaurant, boating, swimming, nature trails and golf.

### PENNSYLVANIA STATE LINE TO GENEVA-ON-THE-LAKE, OH

In Ashtabula, scout for sea glass at Walnut Beach, then drive into the village, where you'll find darling brick-clad shops and bistros.

#### 05 VERMILION TO MARBLEHEAD, OH

54.2 miles: 2 hours, 44 minutes

Quaint small-town vibes await in Vermilion and then admire Sandusky's 22 miles of coastline. Next, onto the 1821 Marblehead Lighthouse, which will delight shutterbugs.

#### 06 WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS TO ELKINS, WV

118.5 miles: 2 hours, 53 minutes

US 219 tunnels through trees that are alive with new growth in spring, lush & green in summer, and resplendently colorful in fall.

As strains of the state song drift across the track on the first Saturday in May, the sight of mint juleps conjures visions of stately manors and acres of blue-green grass. Imagine summer evenings on a porch, watching a canopy of trees swing gently in the breeze, golden fields of tobacco swaying in the distance.

Then they're off! You're brought back by the pounding hooves and the roar of the crowd. Jockeys battle for position and the first jewel of the Triple Crown. The climactic conclusion of 2 weeks of parties and festivals takes place in a scant 2 minutes, as the winner races across the finish line and collects a blanket of roses. The Kentucky Derby is over, but your adventure is just beginning . . .

Not far from Louisville's interstates are quiet country roads that take you to legendary horse farms and underground caverns known for their surreal beauty.

Slow down the pace as you take scenic drives past white-painted fences surrounding paddocks and pastures. Small but historic towns along the way offer tours of distilleries, Civil War landmarks and the grand mansions that were Stephen Foster's inspiration.

But modern Kentucky is more than just plantations and Thoroughbred farms. Louisville and Lexington have become thriving metropolitan areas without losing a drop of their Southern charm. Their urban skylines have grown up through the bluegrass, shadowing the historic homes of the past.

#### **Scenic Wonders**

The Appalachian mountain pass of Cumberland Gap was the first entryway settlers used to reach the nation's vast interior. During its 1775-1796 heyday, more than 200,000 men, women and children passed through, leaving behind everything familiar for a new life in a virtually unknown land. Today you can hike a 3-mile trail to the top of White Rocks, a limestone outcropping heralding the approach to the gap, and on a clear day you may even see as far as the Great Smoky Mountains.

Within Daniel Boone National Forest, the terrain takes an unusual turn. Here the steep-sided, narrow valleys are dotted with ancient, erosion-carved rock arches. The forest's Red River Gorge Geological Area boasts 80 such landmarks, including much-photographed Sky Bridge, which airily stretches 75 feet atop a lofty ridge overlooking the gorge.

Sporting whimsical names like River Styx and Grand Central Station, the unusual formations at Mammoth Cave National Park range from 192-foot-high Mammoth Dome to 105-foot-deep Bottomless Pit. Move on to the town of Horse Cave to see intricate onyx formations in Kentucky Caverns, then head to Olive Hill's Carter

Caves in northeastern Kentucky and discover an underground waterfall tumbling down a 30-foot drop.

#### Portals to the Past

After you've explored Kentucky from top to bottom that is, its hills and caves-what's left?

Imagine finding portals to a time far removed from traffic jams, computer crashes and all the other woes of modern life. These entry points to the past can be found throughout the Bluegrass State, but one of the finest examples is My Old Kentucky Home State Park in Bardstown. The park's centerpiece, an antebellum mansion named Federal Hill, so charmed Stephen Foster during an 1852 visit that he was inspired to write "My Old Kentucky Home."

While the 19th-century occupants of Federal Hill hosted lavish parties, their Shaker contemporaries in Pleasant Hill near Harrodsburg led a very different lifestyle. Today, the entire town, which includes 34 Federal and Georgian buildings, is a living-history museum where costumed interpreters and working artisans demonstrate the Shakers' minimalist way of living.

#### Recreation

In this state that offers nearly 500 miles of developed forest trails amid immense natural beauty, hiking might just be the preferred way to get around. You can trace the crest of eastern Kentucky's Pine Mountain on the 38-mile Little Shepherd Trail in Harlan. Or skirt rivers, lakes and narrow ridge tops on the Sheltowee Trace National Recreation Trail, within Daniel Boone National Forest.

Should you tire of hoofing it on your own two feet, what better place than Kentucky to saddle up for the real thing? Bring your horse and head off down any of many trails. Guided horseback riding trips are offered daily at Daniel Boone National Forest. At Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area, you and the horse you rode in on can take advantage of riding trails and rental stalls at Wranglers Campground. You can also rent a ride at several state resort parks that provide horses as well as trails.


Like to bike? Welcome to heaven. Kentucky's renowned for its winding byways boasting postcard views, especially in the Bluegrass region, where gracious acres of horse farms vie with mossy stone fences for "most picturesque" honors. Kentucky Travel offers a free booklet detailing bike routes.

At Land Between the Lakes, mountain biking enthusiasts will find rentals and designated trails. Those who want to pick up the pace—and the mud—can try offroad driving at the park's Turkey Bay Off-Highway Vehicle Area. Bring binoculars; it's one of the Southeast's best sites for spotting bald eagles.

White water to wide waters, Kentucky's got swimming, boating and fishing covered. There's 160,000-acre Kentucky Lake, so big you can even go inland sailing. Adjacent Lake Barkley offers myriad bays and inlets ideal for exploring.

Plus, Kentucky has 14 major river systems, and most provide superb canoeing and kayaking, too. Adventuresome night owls will want to head to Woodlands Nature Station, inside Land Between the Lakes, for guided moonlight canoe trips. Or, for a really wild ride, sample the state's wealth of white-water rafting spots. One of the best: the Cumberland River's Big South Fork, a mostly class II float through a steep-sided gorge rimmed with dense woods.

#### REGULATIONS

**TEEN DRIVING LAWS:** Driving is not permitted midnight-6 a.m. One unrelated passenger under age of 20 is permitted. The minimum age for an unrestricted driver's license is 17. Phone (502) 564-1257 for more information about Kentucky driver's license regulations.

SEAT BELT/CHILD RESTRAINT LAWS: Seat belts are required for driver and all passengers ages 8 and over. Children under age 7 and between 40 and 57 inches tall are required to be in a booster seat. Children under 40 inches tall must be in a child restraint. AAA recommends the use of seat belts and appropriate child restraints for the driver and all passengers.

**CELLPHONE RESTRICTIONS:** Persons under age 18 and those with an instruction permit, intermediate license or operator's license may not drive while using a personal communication device. All drivers are prohibited from texting while driving.

**HELMETS FOR MOTORCYCLISTS:** Required for all drivers and passengers under age 21 and drivers with an instruction permit or who have had a license less than 1 year.

RADAR DETECTORS: Permitted. Prohibited for use by commercial vehicles.

MOVE OVER LAW: Driver is required to slow down and vacate the lane nearest stopped police, fire and rescue vehicles using audible or flashing signals. Law also requires driver to use lanes further away from repair vehicles stopped roadside.

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### ABRAHAM LINCOLN BIRTHPLACE

Three miles south of Hodgenville on US 31E and SR 61. Abraham Lincoln Birthplace National Historical Park preserves the birthplace of the 16th U.S. president. Lincoln was born on Feb. 12, 1809, in a one-room log cabin at Sinking Spring Farm, where he lived for the first 2.5 vears of his life.

In a granite and marble memorial is an early 19thcentury Kentucky cabin which symbolizes the cabin in which Lincoln was born. The memorial building was completed in 1911. Above the six granite columns at the memorial building entrance are carved Lincoln's words, "With malice toward none, with charity for all." The memorial is reached by 56 steps, each representing a year of his life; a short, easy walk along a wooden boardwalk also leads to the memorial. The grounds of the park include 110 acres of the original Thomas Lincoln farm.

The visitor center has a re-created pioneer log cabin, exhibits about the family and the movie "Lincoln-The Kentucky Years." Nature trails and picnic facilities are available. The park also encompasses the Abraham Lincoln Boyhood Home, 10 miles northeast on US 31E.

#### **ASHLAND**

Due to the rich natural resources in the area, Ashland is a major shipping and industrial center. The town, also known as the birthplace of country music's The Judds and Billy Ray Cyrus, boasts a museum and a performing arts center. In December, visit Santa and enjoy 800,000 lights during the Winter Wonderland of Lights Festival.

#### BARBOURVILLE

Barbourville, on the Wilderness Road in the scenic Cumberland Valley, was one of the first settlements in southeastern Kentucky. The site was originally owned by James Barbour who donated the land in 1800 with the stipulation that half the proceeds from the sale of lots be used to erect public buildings.

The first Civil War encounter in Kentucky, a Confederate victory, took place in Barbourville Sept. 19, 1861.

#### **BARDSTOWN**

Settled in the late 1700s, Bardstown is Kentucky's second oldest city. Its Georgian houses recall the days when Bardstown was a political and social center. A monument in Court Square marks the burial spot of steamboat inventor John Fitch.

The principal industry is distilling, due to an abundance of lime in the community's water supply; some of Kentucky's largest distilleries are in the area. Heaven Hill offers exhibits and a video presentation about the bourbonmaking process, and Maker's Mark conducts tours of its complete plant (see Loretto p. 77).

O'Connell Hall, on the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth's campus 3 miles north of Bardstown on US 31E, has a museum devoted to the order's history and ministries; phone (502) 348-1500.

The Kentucky Bourbon Festival, held in September or October, celebrates Bardstown's bourbon-making heritage. Among the festivities are a barrel relay, historical tours, art exhibits, food, activities and games. Phone (502) 275-8384 to confirm schedule.

#### BARDSTOWN, KY

Self-quiding tours: Walking tour brochures of Bardstown's historic sites are available from the tourist and convention commission.

BARDSTOWN HISTORICAL MUSEUM, 114 N. 5th St. in the restored Spalding Hall Chapel, interprets more than 200 years of area history. The Oscar Getz Museum of Whiskey History, in Spalding Hall, chronicles the history of the American whiskey industry. Exhibits display rare flags, uniforms, medical instruments, maps, artillery and weapons. Galleries are devoted to the infantry, cavalry and navy. A campsite featuring a wagon used during the conflict depicts battlefield life. The oldest part of the park's centerpiece mansion, also known as Federal Hill, was built in 1795 by Judge John Rowan, U.S. congressman and senator, state chief justice, U.S. commissioner to Mexico and cousin of Stephen Foster. Completed in 1818, the renovated home is furnished with heirlooms and old portraits. It is believed that Foster wrote "My Old Kentucky Home" here while visiting the Rowans in 1852.

In the park are a visitor center, the family cemetery, a garden and a replica of Judge Rowan's law office. Tours conducted by guides in antebellum costumes are available. An outdoor concert and drama series are presented at the park's outdoor amphitheater June through mid-August. Camping and an 18-hole golf course are available.

#### **BLUEGRASS COUNTRY**

The Bluegrass Region encompasses roughly 1,600 square miles of lush farmland in north-central Kentucky. For most visitors this land epitomizes the state—quiet farmhouse communities and rolling green pastures bounded by picturesque white and black plank fences. Rock fences, some built in the 1800s by Irish immigrants, add to the pastoral surroundings.

These pastures are seeded with the long-lived perennial for which the region is named. The grass, which produces small blue flowers during its late May blooming season, is said to take on a bluish tint; however, since most fields are constantly mowed or cropped by livestock, the blue color is rarely seen.

Color and scenic value aside, the grass—fortified with calcium and phosphorous due to limestone deposits that feed the soil—is prized for its role in producing the equine blue bloods for which the region is recognized. The Bluegrass Thoroughbred horse is world-renowned for its speed, stamina and strength.

Since the first racetrack was built in 1797, the breeding, training, racing and selling of horses—American Saddlebred horses, Standardbreds and especially Thoroughbreds—has become a lucrative industry. Some 50,000 horses are foaled each year, and many champions earn millions at big-ticket races and even more as retired studs. The wealth is apparent in the careful attention given to the construction and maintenance of horse barns. Stables, some of which resemble posh estates, feature such architectural elements as cupolas, spires and picture windows. Inside, it is not surprising to find rich woods, brass fixtures or other embellishments.

Shows and exhibitions take place year-round, and both Keeneland Race Course and The Red Mile Harness Track have spring and fall meets in Lexington. Thoroughbred racing reigns supreme, but harness races, steeplechases and horse shows also draw crowds. Thoroughbred sales take place in January, April, September and November.

Lexington (see place listing p. 65), one of the world's most prominent horse centers, is the region's geographic and commercial hub. Other Bluegrass Country towns listed individually are Berea, Danville, Frankfort, Georgetown, Harrodsburg, Paris, Richmond, Versailles and Winchester.

#### **BOWLING GREEN** Hotels p. 32

At the time Bowling Green was settled, the area was known as the Barrens, an expanse of open prairie surrounded by forests. The first courthouse was erected in 1797, and the town was founded the following year on land donated by brothers Robert and George Moore.

Located between Confederate Tennessee and Unionist Kentucky, residents of Bowling Green at first refused to choose sides during the Civil War. On Sept. 18, 1861, however, rebel troops arrived and changed the town's neutral stance. Bowling Green was proclaimed the Confederate capital of Kentucky later that year. The Confederate army battled with disease rather than soldiers, and Union troops did not arrive until after the rebels evacuated the town.

The city is a cultural center for southern Kentucky and has a variety of industries, including automobile and clothing manufacturing, dairying, livestock raising and tobacco farming.

In addition, several walking tours lead visitors to the city's historic sites, homes and buildings. Information is available for walking tours of the Upper East Main, College Hill and ShakeRag historic districts. The downtown Heritage Walk covers 18 markers. The 80-mile Duncan Hines Scenic Byway begins and ends at the Duncan Hines historical marker in front of the 1940 structure that Hines built as his home and office at 3098 Louisville Rd. (US 31W). Maps and brochures for all tours are available at the convention and visitors bureau and at the visitor center in the National Corvette Museum (see attraction listing).

THE HISTORIC RAILPARK AND TRAIN MUSEUM AT L & N DEPOT is at 401 Kentucky St. In its heyday, this 1925 depot saw more than 20 trains depart per day and to such destinations as Louisville, Ky. and Nashville, Tenn. Its museum's galleries offer such culturally and historically significant displays as Segregation & The North American Railroad as well as exhibits at which visitors may listen to passenger trains' sounds and interact with conductors

and engineers. The L & N Theatre presents films and vintage news reels.

Outside the museum are five restored railcars, including an E8a diesel engine, a 1911 Presidential Office Car used to transport high-ranking officials and a 1921 Railroad Post Office Car.

KENTUCKY MUSEUM. located on the campus of Western Kentucky University at 1444 Kentucky St., relates the history of the state. Collections include furniture, paintings and decorative arts. Faces and Places features more than 40 guilts and textiles, while Instruments of American Excellence exhibits a large collection of ordinary tools used by Americans. Other displays cover local genealogy, agriculture, politics and 19thcentury life, including a log house on the grounds.

LOST RIVER CAVE, jct. US 31W (Nashville Rd.) and Dishman Ln. (Cave Mill Rd.), offers a 45-minute underground boat and walking tour of a cave discovered by Native Americans 10,000 years ago. The cave, which is a constant 56°F, was a shelter for Paleo-Indians, the site of a 19th-century water-powered mill, a campsite used by both sides during the Civil War, a hiding place for outlaw Jesse James and a popular 1930s night club. A butterfly habitat can be seen in summer. Lost River Cave has 2 miles of nature trails, along which visitors can see three blue holes, sites where the underground river rises to ground level. The Nature Explore outdoor classroom includes the Nature Art Studio, Fox Hole, Thistle Theater and Busy Bee Play Area.

NATIONAL CORVETTE MUSEUM is off I-65 exit 28, across from the General Motors Bowling Green Assembly Plant. Exhibits feature the cars in realistic period settings such as a 1960s Mobil station, a dealership showroom from the '60s, the legendary Route 66 and an early assembly line.

Get a hands-on experience in the KidZone, on the Corvette Racing Simulator and with rides in vintage Corvettes (seasonally and weather permitting). 

BERNHEIM ARBORETUM AND RESEARCH FOREST is 1 mi. e. of jct. I-65 and SR 245 exit 112. **FOREST** is 1 mi. e. of jct. I-65 and SR 245 exit 112. The nonprofit site consists of 16,000 acres of forest and a 600-acre arboretum with three lakes, more than 40 miles of hiking trails and 16 miles of paved road for biking. Isaac W. Bernheim, a German immigrant who made his fortune in the distillery business, founded the natural area in 1929 as a gift to Kentuckians.

The arboretum features more than 8,000 labeled varieties of plants and trees, including a collection of American, Japanese and deciduous hollies. The Visitor Center, known as "a building like a tree," features a living green roof and interactive exhibits on sustainability.

More than 250 species of birds may be seen on the property, which is adorned with such nature-inspired artwork as sculptures made from metal, stone and other natural materials. Visitors may also experience life in the treetops on the Canopy Tree Walk; a nearby valley is visible from the 75-foot-high structure during winter months.

Three bridges spanning the Ohio River connect Covington to Cincinnati. During the Civil War Covington's ties with its northern neighbor greatly divided the people's loyalty; the connection has spurred industrial ventures and trade between the two states and has made Covington a part of the Cincinnati metropolitan area.

The five- to six-block area making up MainStrasse Village is a restored 19th-century German neighborhood. Shops and restaurants are housed in renovated buildings. Of interest in the village is the Goose Girl Fountain, a lifesize bronze sculpture of a German maiden carrying two geese to the market. Greek-born sculptor Eleftherios Karkadoulias destroyed the mold from which the fountain was cast, making the sculpture a unique piece.

Following a transportation theme in "Rivers, Roads, Rails & Runways" visitors can see a restored 1892 Kentucky

streetcar, fish in the Ohio River, sit in a 1959 Buick Electra convertible to watch a drive-in movie and push buttons to activate the trains, lights and music of a miniature, midcentury community.

The museum also houses works by prominent regional artists, including primitive painter Mary Bruce Sharon, scientist/Expressionist Wolfgang Ritschel and Harlan Hubbard, whose simple, agrarian lifestyle on the Ohio River is chronicled in his paintings and books. Devou Park provides scenic views of Covington and nearby Cincinnati. Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (859) 491-4003.

MOTHER OF GOD CHURCH is at 119 W. 6th St.; use the entrance between the church and the rectory. The Italian Renaissance-style church, built 1870-71, is enhanced by stained-glass windows imported from Bavaria in 1890 and five murals created by parishioner Johann Schmitt, some of whose works are in the Vatican. ST. MARY'S CATHEDRAL BASILICA OF THE AS-**SUMPTION,** 1101 Madison Ave. at 12th St., has a facade modeled after Notre Dame in Paris, France. The 1895 basilica has 82 stained-glass windows, including one of the largest stained-glass windows in the world. Four large murals on canvas painted by Covington native Frank Duveneck adorn the walls of a chapel.

### CUMBERLAND GAP NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

Elevations in the park range from 1,600 ft. at the Cumberland Gap to 3,513 ft. at White Rocks. Refer to AAA maps for additional elevation information.

At the convergence of Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia, Cumberland Gap National Historical Park covers 24,000 acres of heavily forested, rugged mountains honoring the historic pass.

The gap provides a natural doorway through the mountains. It was first used by migratory animals as a seasonal thoroughfare, then by Native Americans, whose footpaths followed buffalo and deer trails. The westward movement of settlers seemed barred by the Allegheny ridge until April 1750, when Dr. Thomas Walker discovered the gap while seeking the fabled land to the west, the "Kentucke" of Native American lore.

Daniel Boone passed through with a hunting party in 1769, and in 1775 he blazed the Wilderness Road. From 1775 to 1796 the gap could only be used by those on foot or horseback, and although no wagon passed over it during this period, more than 200,000 people made their way through the gap into Kentucky and beyond.

A strategic point during the Civil War, Cumberland Gap changed hands several times without any major battles. Some of the earthwork fortifications remain.

In the 1990s, the 4,600-foot-long Cumberland Gap Highway Tunnel was built; the project also included rerouting US 25E through the tunnel and the addition of new bridges, highway interchanges and parking areas. Although the final cost of this joint effort led by the National Park Service and the Federal Highway Administration was a staggering \$265 million, the construction plan alleviated traffic problems and improved motorist safety while simultaneously restoring the historic appearance of the Cumberland Gap and the Wilderness Road.

### General Information and Activities

At an elevation of 2,440 feet, Pinnacle Overlook provides a view into the gap as well as views of the mountain range and parts of three states. It is accessible via a 4-mile paved road from the visitor center. No trailers or vehicles more than 20 feet long are allowed. Shuttle service may be arranged for a small fee when staff is available; reservations are required.

Still a wild area, the park offers approximately 85 miles of hiking trails ranging from relatively easy nature trails to those requiring an overnight trek. Many park features, including Sand Cave, a multicolored sandstone overhang, and White Rocks, a prominent sandstone outcropping, can be reached only by trail. Ridge Trail, a 19-mile-long route offering panoramas of the valley, approaches five primitive campsites, all accessible by foot. The Wilderness Road Campground has 160 campsites, 41 of which have hookups.

Hensley Settlement is a reconstruction of a community that was occupied 1903-51. Reminiscent of a time much earlier than that from which it actually dates, Hensley seems like a community of the late 1700s or early 1800s. The settlement sits atop a mountain in the eastern end of the park. With more than 70 acres of land under cultivation, it has several reconstructed log houses, barns and outbuildings. The site can be reached by an all-day hike or, from mid-May through Oct. 31, via a guided tour that departs the park's visitor center daily. Building interiors

may be seen during the 3.5- to 4-hour trip, which includes shuttle transportation to and from the settlement. The cost is \$10; \$5 (ages 0-12 and senior citizens with an Interagency Senior Pass). Phone (606) 248-2817, ext. 1075, for the shuttle tour schedule; reservations are recommended.

It is not advisable to hike alone; overnight camping requires a permit. Trail guides and other information can be obtained at the visitor center. The visitor center also contains a museum, which chronicles the rich history of the gap. Throughout the year ranger-led programs suitable for the entire family introduce visitors to the historical, cultural and natural aspects of the park; phone for a schedule of events.

The park is open daily. Some parking areas close before dusk. The visitor center at the park entrance is open daily 8-5, Memorial Day-Labor Day; 9-4, rest of year; closed Christmas.

ADMISSION to the park is free.

**PETS** must be restricted at all times, either in vehicles or by leash, and are not allowed in public buildings.

**ADDRESS** inquiries to the Superintendent, Cumberland Gap National Historical Park, 91 Bartlett Park Rd., Middlesboro, KY 40965; phone (606) 248-2817.

**GAP CAVE** is .25 mi. s. of Middlesboro, Ky., on US 25E. Two-hour guided tours of the cave, discovered in 1750, cover a 1.5-mile route and are conducted by lantern light. Rooms and walls are covered with stalactites and stalagmites. Wildlife, including bats and salamanders, can be seen, as can the names of Civil War soldiers carved on the walls.

**Note:** The guided tour's path includes 183 steps; visitors are advised to wear good walking shoes. No sandals or open-toed shoes are permitted. Due to the threat of white-nose syndrome to bats, visitors should not wear clothing and footwear that has been worn in other caves unless properly decontaminated.

#### DANIEL BOONE NATIONAL FOREST

Elevations in the forest range from 640 ft. to nearly 2,000 ft. Refer to AAA maps for additional elevation information.

Daniel Boone National Forest runs along the Cumberland Plateau in the Appalachian foothills of eastern

Kentucky. The forest encompasses more than 708,000 acres of mostly rugged terrain, including towering sandstone cliffs, steep forested ridges and narrow, low-lying ravines. Natural stone arches, waterfalls and caves are among the forest's exceptional geological features.

Visitors appreciate the recreation, scenic beauty and abundant wildlife in the forest. Popular features include Cave Run Lake, Laurel River Lake, the Red River Gorge Geological Area, Clifty Wilderness Area, Beaver Creek Wilderness and Wildlife Management Area, and the Natural Arch Scenic Area. Two state parks fall within the forest: Cumberland Falls State Resort Park (see Recreation Areas Chart) and Natural Bridge Resort Park near the Red River Gorge in Slade (see Recreation Areas Chart).

Mature pine and hardwood trees grow on lands once cleared by logging, mining and farming. This diverse forest provides a suitable habitat for wild turkeys, quails, songbirds, white-tailed deer and other mammals as well as 23 threatened and endangered species of plants and animals. The forest also fosters the growth of a variety of rare flowering plants, including the wild white fringeless orchid and the white-haired golden rod.

Some of the recreational opportunities include camping, picnicking, hiking and boating. The approximately 290-mile Sheltowee Trace National Recreation Trail bisects the length of the forest running north to south. Hikers and other trail users are rewarded with unforgettable scenery in addition to sightings of birds and other animals. More than 600 miles of trails, along with an abundance of rivers and streams, offer quiet escapes. Mountain biking, horseback riding and off-road vehicles are allowed along designated sections of trail.

Among the highlights of the Red River Gorge National Scenic Byway are the natural geologic features, including sandstone arches carved over millions of years. Trails lead to these geological landmarks and also to picturesque waterfalls. The 11-mile Zilpo National Forest Scenic Byway runs through the forest near Cave Run Lake and provides views of the native landscape and wildlife. In the southern region of the forest, sections of the Wilderness Road Heritage Highway and the Cumberland Cultural Heritage Byway transect through the national forest.

A recreation fee is required in most areas. Kentucky state boating, fishing and hunting regulations apply. For additional information contact the Forest Supervisor's Office, Daniel Boone National Forest, 1700 Bypass Rd., Winchester, KY 40391; phone (859) 745-3100. See Recreation Areas Chart.

### DANVILLE

Settled in 1775, Danville was the capital of the Kentucky District of Virginia for many years and of the new Commonwealth of Kentucky for 3 days while the state's constitution was drawn up. The property of pioneer surgeon Dr. Ephraim McDowell has been preserved as McDowell House Museum, Apothecary and Gardens and depicts Kentucky's journey to statehood; phone (859) 236-2804 for more information.

Isaac Shelby, both the first and fifth governor of Kentucky, is buried in the Isaac Shelby Cemetery State Historic Site 5 miles south of Danville off US 127. Shelby was the chairman of the first Kentucky Constitutional Convention and served in both the American Revolution and the War of 1812.

Many of the state's landmark structures were built in Danville, including Kentucky's first college, school for the deaf, law school, log courthouse and brick courthouse as well as the first post office west of the Allegheny Mountains. Danville hosts the Treat American Brass Band Festival in June. This 3-day event includes hot air balloon races, a huge picnic on the lawns of Centre College and music by brass performers from across the country. Also see Bluegrass Country p. 30.

Elizabethtown was settled by three pioneers from Virginia in 1779. In 1797 Col. Andrew Hynes donated land for public buildings and town lots, so the settlement was named Elizabeth Town in honor of his wife. Over the years other pioneers followed, among them Thomas Lincoln, father of Abraham Lincoln. He lived in or near the town 1796-1816 and then moved to Indiana.





### FORT KNOX

Established in 1918, Camp Knox was named in honor of Revolutionary War General Henry T. Knox, who served as Chief of Artillery for the Continental Army and later was the nation's first Secretary of War. The installation's name was changed to Fort Knox in 1932. The fort has been home to the U.S. Army Armor School and Center since the inception of the Armored Forces in 1940.

Note: All visitors over age 18 must provide photo identification in order to gain admittance to Fort Knox. Valid registration and a driver's license are required of vehicles entering the premises.

PATTON MUSEUM, 4554 Fayette Ave., is named for World War II general George S. Patton. Exhibits at the museum tell the story of General Patton and his career in the U.S. Army.

Armor Unit Memorial Park, adjacent to the Patton Museum, pays tribute to the units that served and protected the United States in 20th century wars. Note: To access the museum, visitors with no military ID card or installation entry pass must go to the Fort Knox Visitor Center, located on E. Bullion Boulevard just before the Chaffee (main) Gate, and present a valid driver's license to obtain an Automated Installation Entry pass. If your driver's license is from the states of Illinois, Minnesota, Missouri, New Mexico or Washington, please bring an additional form of ID. Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (502) 624-3391.

**U.S. BULLION DEPOSITORY,** on Gold Vault Rd., holds a large portion of the U.S. gold reserve. The 100-squarefoot, 1937 treasure house is bombproof; its walls and roof are faced with huge granite blocks. At different times the vault has also held the British Crown Jewels, the Magna Carta, the Constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence. The depository is closed to the public. Note: Photography of the depository is strictly prohibited.

#### **FRANKFORT**

### • Hotels p. 50

Frankfort is surrounded by wooded hillsides and divided by the S-curve of the Kentucky River as it meanders through the Bluegrass Region. The city's north and south sections are separated not only by water but also by their historical backgrounds and architectural styles. The north section originated around the time of Frankfort's founding in 1786, while the south section was developed after the new capitol was built in 1910.

The state capital, Frankfort has been Kentucky's seat of government since 1792, when it was chosen as the capital in a compromise between rivals Louisville and Lexington. As an enticement, a group of local businessmen offered land for the capitol building and grounds as well as \$3,000 in gold and the nails and window glass needed for construction.

The city's oldest residential neighborhood centers on the Corner of Celebrities, bounded by Wapping, Washington, Main and Wilkinson streets. There are more than 40 sites of historical or architectural interest in the area.

In addition to state government, the rich farmlands and bourbon distilleries are strong local industries. Scenic portions of US 60 and I-64 run east from Frankfort to Lexington. Also see Bluegrass Country p. 30.

**BUCKLEY WILDLIFE SANCTUARY** is 10 mi. s. at 1305 Germany Rd.; from I-64 exit 58 take US 60E, following signs on SRs 1681, 1659 and 1964, then onto Germany Rd. This 374-acre facility of the National Audubon Society has a bird blind and three well-marked nature trails. A nature center building offers exhibits, educational programs and scheduled events. Trail booklets and maps also are available.

Pets are not permitted. **Time:** Allow 2 hours minimum. **Phone:** (859) 873-3271.

**BUFFALO TRACE DISTILLERY** is off I-64 exit 58, then 5 mi. n. on US 60/421 to 113 Great Buffalo Trace. A walking tour of the distillery, where bourbon has been produced continuously since 1787, begins in the visitor center. From here visitors can see displays and a video depicting the process of distillation. Also on the tour are a warehouse where the bourbon is aged in barrels and the hand bottling house. The tour concludes with a tasting.

FRANKFORT CEMETERY, downtown at 215 E. Main St., overlooks the city. A monument marks the graves of Daniel Boone and his wife, Rebecca. The cemetery also contains the graves of 17 Kentucky governors. The Kentucky War Memorial honors Kentuckians who have died defending their country from the War of 1812 through the Gulf War. Many gravestones bear quaint epitaphs. Time: Allow 30 minutes minimum. KENTUCKY DEPARTMENT FOR LIBRARIES AND AR-CHIVES, 300 Coffee Tree Rd., houses reference materials, genealogical information about Kentuckians and public records from the state and local government. **Phone:** (502) 564-8300.

The Kentucky Vietnam Veterans Memorial, on a hill opposite the library and archives at 365 Vernon Cooper Ln., consists of a large sundial. The shadow of the indicator shaft falls on a granite panel on which are etched the names of Kentuckians killed in the Vietnam War. Each name appears in a place the shadow touches annually on the anniversary of that soldier's death. Behind the sundial, where the shadow never falls, are the names of veterans missing in action. **Phone:** (502) 564-9203.

Wilkinson St., consists of two historic houses situated on 4 acres of formal boxwood and perennial gardens on the banks of the Kentucky River. In order to give both of his son's equal inheritance, Sen. John Brown divided the original 4-acre site into two parcels, each with a house. Tours of both houses include changing exhibits that focus on the lives of the Brown family and the early days of Kentucky's statehood. Liberty Hall Historic Site is owned by the National Society of the Colonial Dames of America in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Liberty Hall, at Liberty Hall Historic Site at 218 Wilkinson St., was begun in 1796 by John Brown, a member of the Continental Congress and one of Kentucky's first two U.S. senators. Three U.S. presidents are among the dignitaries who visited Brown and his wife Margaretta at the threestory Federalist home. Period furnishings include many original Brown family items as well as Kentucky-built furniture and other early 19th-century pieces. Gardens behind the house extend to the Kentucky River. **Orlando Brown House,** at Liberty Hall Historic Site at 202 Wilkinson St., was designed by Gideon Shryock for the senator's second son, Orlando, for a total cost of \$5,000. Little has changed over the years; the 1835 house has a floor plan similar to that of Liberty Hall. The style of the house reflects the transition from Federal to Greek Revival. Original furniture, silver, china, brass and family portraits are displayed. **Phone:** (502) 227-2560.

SALATO WILDLIFE EDUCATION CENTER is off I-64 exit 53B; take US 127 1.5 mi. n. to US 60, then 1.5 mi. w. to 1 Sportsmans Ln. in the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources Headquarters Complex. The center includes indoor and outdoor exhibits focusing on Kentucky's native fish and wildlife.

#### 50 FRANKFORT, KY

Indoors, a mountain stream and native foliage are settings for butterflies, rattlesnakes, raccoons and birds in the Eastern Forest diorama, while frogs and toads occupy another area. The Living Bee Tree provides a look at honeybees busily working. Other exhibits feature venomous snakes, an aquarium with native fish and wildlife that have been successfully returned to the state.

Outdoors, paved accessible trails lead to natural exhibits housing such non-releasable animals as black bears, bobcats, bald eagles, elk, white-tail deer and buffalo. The Pea Ridge and HabiTrek trails wind through woods and fields and offer varying lengths of hikes. Fishing lakes are available onsite.

STATE CAPITOL is 5 blks. s. on Capitol Ave. Set between two bluffs overlooking Frankfort, the capitol is considered to be one of the most beautiful in the country. The exterior is of Indiana limestone on a base of Vermont granite. The walls of the 1910 building are ornamented with 70 Ionic columns. The pediment over the north entrance is noteworthy, and there are several fine sculpture groups. A brochure outlining a walking tour of the capitol grounds is available.

The interior, finished in marble and accented with murals and paintings, is noted for its French influence. The rotunda and dome were copied from the Hotel des Invalides over Napoleon Bonaparte's tomb; the stairs resemble those in the Paris Grand Opéra House; and the State Reception Room is modeled after Marie Antoinette's drawing room and features original hand-carved walnut furniture and infinity mirrors.



Kentucky's Floral Clock, on the capitol grounds, is surrounded by an illuminated reflecting pool. A garden contains thousands of plants and incorporates the name of the state. The clock has a raised 34-foot-diameter face and a minute hand that weighs 530 pounds and is more than 20 feet long. **Phone:** (502) 564-3449.

THOMAS D. CLARK CENTER FOR KENTUCKY HISTORY, at 100 W. Broadway St., features interactive displays interpreting distinct periods in Kentucky's history. The museum's permanent exhibit, A Kentucky Journey, traces the state's chronology from prehistoric times to the present. From the first Kentuckians (dating to 10,000 B.C.) through the state's frontier and antebellum days, the Civil War and its aftermath, the beginning of the new century, the Depression era, World War II and up to the present, the exhibit depicts Kentucky's story through artifacts, technology and sounds.

The center also houses the Martin F. Schmidt Research Library, an extensive research library housing genealogy records specific to Kentucky's families, and the interactive Hall of Governors exhibit. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (502) 564-1792.





### GEORGETOWN

Although pioneers arrived in the area as early as 1774, Georgetown's first permanent settlers, Baptist minister Elijah Craig and members of his flock, arrived in 1784 and incorporated the town of Lebanon. The territory at that time was still part of Virginia. In 1790 the Virginia legislature renamed the city George Town in honor of President George Washington.

It is believed that the first bourbon whiskey was made in Georgetown by Rev. Craig in 1789. The distillation was named for Bourbon County, Va., in which Georgetown was located. Students and faculty constructing the first building on the Georgetown College campus in 1840 reputedly put a guart of bourbon under each of the six Ionic columns that support the portico roof of this Baptist institution. Although bourbon is no longer produced in the county, the state remains the nation's largest whiskey producer.

Popular recreational activities include canoeing and bass fishing on Elkhorn Creek, walking along the Great Crossing Park Nature Trail and bicycling through the scenic countryside. Other area diversions include touring local horse farms and browsing for antiques and art in downtown, where there are many Victorian-era buildings and brick sidewalks. Ninety-minute guided tours, sometimes conducted by founder Michael Blowen, allow visitors close-up encounters with the horses, including Derby and Preakness winner Silver Charm as well as two-time Whitney winner Commentator and Belmont Stakes winner Touch Gold and Sarava. Founded in 1774 by James Harrod, Harrodsburg was the first permanent English settlement west of the Allegheny Mountains. Several buildings date back to the 18th century. Probably the oldest existing group of row houses west of the Alleghenies is the 1807 Morgan Row, on S. Chiles Street. During the 19th century Harrodsburg was a popular gathering spot for those eager to partake of the local mineral springs and visit the spas that were known for their gala entertainment. SHAKER VILLAGE OF PLEASANT HILL, 7 mi. e. on US 68, is America's largest restored Shaker village. The village was founded in 1805 by the Shakers, members of a celibate, communal religious sect that began during the late 18th century in England. The village is an outdoor history museum preserving 34 original buildings on 3,000 acres with streams, forests and native prairies; more than one dozen buildings can be toured. All visitor services are provided in the original buildings. The structures, some dating to 1809, reflect Shaker standards of simplicity and utility. The stone Centre Family Dwelling has Shaker furniture and artifacts.

Costumed interpreters describe the society's distinctive way of life, and artisans demonstrate such heritage crafts

Part of the Trail of Tears National Historic Trail, the park is on a campsite used by the Native Americans during the 1,200-mile march. The graves of two Cherokee chiefs who died on the trail and a heritage center with interpretive exhibits can be seen.

KENTUCKY DOWN UNDER/MAMMOTH ONYX CAVE, off I-65 exit 58, .2 mi. s.e. on SR 218. then n. on SR 335 to 3700 L & N Turnpike Rd., is an interactive nature park that is home to both Australian wildlife and a cave filled with unusual onyx formations.

At Kentucky Down Under visitors can roam with kangaroos and other Australian animals in the Outback, handfeed vibrant-colored birds in two walk-in aviaries, watch border collies herd sheep, participate in aboriginal culture and take part in chores at the woolshed. A nature trail, an exotic bird garden and other exhibits also are featured.

A 45-minute guided tour through Mammoth Onyx Cave allows visitors to see colorful cave formations in a constant 60°F environment.



### LAND BETWEEN THE LAKES NATIONAL RECREATION AREA

Between Barkley and Kentucky lakes in western Kentucky and Tennessee, Land Between The Lakes National Recreation Area can be reached from I-24W exit 31 by taking SR 453 south to Woodlands Trace National Scenic Byway and following signs. The 170,000-acre wooded peninsula is managed by the USDA Forest Service.

More than 200 miles of hiking, mountain biking and horseback riding trails lead to points of natural and historic interest. Dozens of elk and bison roam a 700-acre restored prairie in the Kentucky portion of the area.

### 64 LAND BETWEEN THE LAKES NRA — LAWRENCEBURG, KY

Fishing, boating, camping, picnicking and hunting are popular activities. The Turkey Bay Off Highway Vehicle Area offers 100 miles of designated trails.

The recreation area is served by three visitor centers. The North Welcome Station, near Grand Rivers, and the South Welcome Station, near Dover, Tenn., provide visitor information, including trail maps. The Golden Pond Visitor Center, centrally located at Woodlands Trace and US 68/SR 80, has visitor information and maps, interpretive displays, audiovisual orientation programs and a planetarium (see attraction listing).

The recreation area is accessible daily 24 hours. The North and South welcome stations are open daily 9-5, Apr.-Oct.; Wed.-Sun. 9-5 in Mar. and Nov. The Golden Pond Visitor Center is open daily 9-5, year-round. Closed Jan. 1, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Some activities free. For additional information phone (270) 924-2000 or (800) 525-7077. See Recreation Areas Chart.

ELK & BISON PRAIRIE is 1 mi. n. on Woodlands Trace National Scenic Byway from jct. US 68/SR 80. This 700acre area re-creates the vast prairie that existed here 200 years ago. By prescribed burns and reintroducing plant and animal species that once thrived in the area, the grassland habitat is slowly being reestablished.

Bison, elk, wild turkeys, rabbits, raccoons, hawks, owls and songbirds can be seen. A 3.5-mile paved loop road allows guests to see the prairie from their car and visit interactive interpretive stops. Time: Allow 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (270) 924-2000 or (800) 525-7077.

GOLDEN POND PLANETARIUM. in the Golden Pond Visitor Center, at the jct. of Woodlands Trace National Scenic Byway and US 68/SR 80, presents shows on a 40foot-diameter dome screen. An observatory has telescopes available for stargazing June through August. Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (270) 924-2233 or (800) 525-7077.

THE HOMEPLACE, 15 mi. s. on Woodland Trace National Scenic Byway from jct. US 68/SR 80, re-creates the lifestyle and farming practices of a mid-1800s family living between the Cumberland and Tennessee rivers. Interpreters dressed in period clothing talk with guests and perform daily activities. Buildings include 16 restored log structures, some relocated from the surrounding area. The interpretive center has an audiovisual presentation and exhibits about farm life. Special events, programs and festivals are held throughout the season.

WOODLANDS NATURE STATION, n. on Woodlands Trace National Scenic Byway, then e. on Mulberry Flat Rd. following signs, has live animal exhibits, seasonal canoe and kayak rentals, trails and interpretive programming. The Nature Station, within the 5,000-acre Woodlands Nature Watch Area on Lake Barkley, enables visitors to observe wildlife in a natural setting. Special events, programs and festivals are offered weekends March through November, and bald eagle viewing excursions are available during the winter.

### **LEXINGTON**

Kentucky's second largest city, Lexington is the commercial center of Bluegrass Country. The region is distinguished by a rich historical heritage that has centered on Thoroughbred horses and tobacco and, more recently, bourbon and hoops. Downtown Lexington is an urban tract amid rolling bluegrass pastures trimmed by miles of painted wooden fences and peppered with cupolas topping large barns. While picturesque, the pastoral scene commands a higher purpose: the horse, of course.

On the city's outskirts are hundreds of the world's most celebrated horse farms, where Thoroughbreds, Standardbreds, American Saddlebred horses and show champions are bred and trained.

Lexington is Thoroughbred Country. Even though the Kentucky Derby is held 80 miles away in Louisville, Lexington residents will remind you that many of the horses hail from the Bluegrass region. To celebrate the tradition, Lexington plays host to extravagant, black-tie galas celebrating the 2-minute race held under the Twin Spires.

The aristocracy of Lexington's Thoroughbred industry has reigned since horses were first brought to Kentucky from Virginia in the late 18th century. The city was founded in 1775, and the state's first impromptu races were held in Lexington in 1787. Two years later, the census noted more horses than humans.

The Lexington Jockey Club, the first in the country, was organized in 1894; still active, it preserves the history and integrity of breeding and racing by maintaining The American Stud Book, a database of all Thoroughbreds foaled in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico. Dating to the late 1800s, it contains the records of nearly 2 million horses and the results of every Thoroughbred race in the country.

Nearly 20,000 horses are bred each year in and around Lexington. It can be argued that horses still outnumber people in Bluegrass Country, and equines are treated as well or perhaps better. And for good reason: A world-record sale in 1985 garnered \$13.1 million for a horse with champion bloodlines, and a successful horse can earn millions in his racing career, not to mention stud fees.

When Man o' War (considered by many to be history's greatest racehorse) died in 1947, he was embalmed and lay in state for 3 days—the casket was lined with his black and gold racing silks. Thousands attended the funeral, and a giant bronze statue in his likeness marks his grave. Man o' War Boulevard, which circles the south side of Lexington, was named for the champion, whose 28-foot stride won 20 of the 21 races he entered.

Calumet Farm, just west on SR 60/Versailles Road, is one of the most well-known Thoroughbred farms and home to two Triple Crown, eight Preakness and eight Derby winners. Established in 1924, its 800 acres are divided by 35 miles of pristine white fencing, and the buildings are edged in devil's red, the farm's racing shade. Devotion to horses is evident in the farm's luxurious horse stalls, immaculate landscaping and six-to-one ratio of employee to horse.

Major equestrian events include Thoroughbred races at Keeneland Race Course (see attraction listing), founded in 1936. In April and October Thoroughbreds take to the 1.16-mile track several times per day Wednesday through Sunday. Lawn jockeys outside the Kentucky limestone buildings are painted annually in the winning team's racing colors. Spectators are allowed at Keeneland's prestigious Thoroughbred auctions, which occur several times a year.

Harness races take place July through October at The Red Mile Harness Track, said to be the country's oldest and fastest trotting track (see attraction listing). Steeple-chases and polo matches are held at the Kentucky Horse Park.

Lexington's major crop has been tobacco, yielding one of the largest crops of burley tobacco in Kentucky. Tobacco barns, where the leaves are dried, stripped and packed, can still be seen along country roads. In addition, the city is the country's chief producer of bluegrass seed and white barley.

Lexington's business district has thrived without losing the grace or traditions of its Southern heritage. Victorian storefronts are preserved along Main Street, and restored houses line Broadway between Main and West Third streets.

Nearby is Gratz Park, fronted by such early historic properties as the three Goodlowe Houses and Hunt-Morgan House (see attraction listing). Brick paths, shady trees and a fountain make the park a welcome respite. The park was once the campus for nearby Transylvania University, said to be the oldest college west of the Allegheny Mountains. Morrison Hall, now home to administrative offices, was built in 1833 in the Greek Revival style by Gideon Shryock, who is said to have introduced the architectural style to Kentucky. Guided and self-guiding campus tours include the medical museum, the Morlan Art Gallery and the Mitchell Fine Arts Center; phone (859) 233-8120.

A statue at the old Fayette County Courthouse in the center of town honors John Hunt Morgan, a Confederate general adept at conducting guerrilla warfare. Despite his controversial tactics and a series of defeats, Morgan was considered a hero. The statue caused quite a local stir when unveiled in 1911—Hunt is shown astride a stallion instead of his best-known mount, the mare Black Bess.

Patrons of the arts appreciate the lavish interior of the 1887 Lexington Opera House at 401 W. Short St. It plays host to musical and theatrical performances; for ticket information phone (859) 233-3535.

Seven life-size bronze racehorses streak toward the finish line in the 2.5-acre Thoroughbred Park, on the corner of Main Street and Midland Avenue. Standing at a break in the rock wall, one can witness a "photo finish."

The local obsession with college basketball reaches a crescendo from late October through March, when the University of Kentucky Wildcats hit the hardwood. The eight-time national champions play at the 23,500-seat Rupp Arena at 430 W. Vine St.; phone the university ticket office, (859) 257-1818, for information about all collegiate sports.

Even though their themes may not be horse-related, three of Lexington's special events take place at some of the city's better-known horse-related sites. The Blue Grass Trust Antiques & Garden Show sets up its tent in early March at Kentucky Horse Park (see attraction listing). The last weekend in April the park is home to the Rolex Kentucky Three-Day Event. Also known as RK3DE, this event draws top horses and riders from around the world to compete in cross-country, dressage and jumping competitions. Southern Lights, celebrated mid-November through December 31, features a 4-mile driving tour past brilliantly lit seasonal displays. The route goes through the park and ends at the visitor center, where the holiday spirit continues indoors with a petting zoo, crafts and music.

Lexington is at the intersection of three scenic highways: I-64 and US 60 both run west to Frankfort (see place listing p. 48), and US 68 runs northeast to Paris (see place listing p. 117). Also see Bluegrass Country p. 30.

**Self-guiding tours:** The Lexington Walk and the Bluegrass Country Driving Tour brochure features an approximately 2-mile-long walk that takes participants by many of Lexington's historic structures as well as a scenic driving tour past the area's famous horse farms and farmlands. The driving tour is split into three sections, varying in length from 24 to 35 miles long. Maps are provided by the convention and visitors bureau (VisitLEX).

**Shopping:** Two downtown areas—The Shops at Lexington Center and The Square—offer a variety of stores. Lexington Center, on W. Vine Street at Rupp Arena, has three levels of specialty shops as well as restaurants and entertainment. The Square is a block of restored 19th-century buildings on W. Main Street housing a collection of retail and specialty stores.

A variety of stores can be found at Fayette Mall, 3401 Nicholasville Rd., including Dillard's, JCPenney and Macy's. Fayette Place, an extension of the mall, features numerous eateries, shops and a cinema.

ASHLAND, THE HENRY CLAY ESTATE, 1.5 mi. s.e. at the corner of Sycamore Rd. and Richmond Rd. (E. Main St.), was the estate of "The Great Compromiser," Henry Clay, from 1806 until his death in 1852. Named for the large number of ash trees that graced the property, the stately home is surrounded by gardens and woods. The 18-room mansion is furnished with Clay family possessions.

The original house was replaced by Clay's son James in 1856 with a new structure built on the same foundation and with a similar floor plan. The interior of the two-story brick house reflects the Victorian style popular during the late 19th century. Early 19th-century outbuildings on the grounds include icehouses, a smokehouse, a dairy cellar and privy. Also on the grounds are a carriage presented to Clay by the citizens of Newark, N.J., and a formal garden. One-hour guided tours and a 12-minute video are offered.

**BLUE GRASS TOURS** offers a guided 3-hour introduction to the Bluegrass region, highlighting renowned landmarks and historic homes of the area. Visitors explore behind the scenes at Keeneland Race Course and beyond the gates of a Thoroughbred farm in addition to viewing sites where movies such as "Secretariat," "Seabiscuit" and "Dreamer" were filmed. A Bourbon Distillery tour is among the custom offerings.

**EXPLORIUM OF LEXINGTON** is at 440 W. Short St. in The Square; the entrance is at the corner of W. Short and Algonquin sts. Hands-on exhibits in this children's museum's nine discovery zones cover science, nature, history, ecology and the human body.

**Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (859) 258-3253.

HORSE FARM TOURS INC. picks up visitors at several Lexington area lodgings. Guided tours of two or three Lexington area horse farms are offered as well as stops at Keeneland Race Course. Passengers also see sites featured in the movies "Seabiscuit," "Secretariat" and "Dreamer." Guides explain the sights and answer questions about the horse industry and Lexington. Some farms allow visitors to pet and photograph horses.

HOPEMONT, THE HUNT-MORGAN HOUSE is at 201 N. Mill St. The early 1800s Federal-style house was built by John Wesley Hunt. Prominent family members include John Hunt Morgan, the "Thunderbolt of the Confederacy," and Nobel Prize winner Thomas Hunt Morgan. The house features a fanlight doorway, a three-story cantilevered staircase, family furniture, portraits and a garden. Among the Civil War memorabilia displayed in the Alexander T. Hunt Civil War Museum, on the second floor, are documents, equipment and uniforms.

KENTUCKY HORSE PARK, 9 mi. n. off I-75 exit 120, at 4089 Iron Works Pike, is a 1,200-acre facility devoted to the region's equine heritage. The Man o' War Memorial, the renowned racehorse's burial site, is at the entrance to the traditionally fenced grounds. A film about the relationship between man and horses, narrated by William Shatner, serves as an introduction to the park. Self-guiding walking tours and horse-drawn trolley rides are available.

The Breeds Barn houses multiple breeds of horses; after viewing the 25-minute Breeds Barn presentation in the show ring, visitors can meet the animals and their riders. The Hall of Champions is the site of a 25-minute show featuring a group of championship horses, including Kentucky Derby winners Go for Gin (1994) and Funny Cide (2003). The International Museum of the Horse depicts the 50-million-year history of the horse; a circular ramp winds past displays, artifacts, trophies, paintings and carriages.

Horseback riding and pony rides are available. Another close-up opportunity comes with a visit to the Big Barn, home of the huge horses that pull the tour trolleys. The craft of horseshoeing can be seen during a stop at the Farrier Shop. An animated holiday light display brightens the park the Friday before Thanksgiving through December 31.

American Saddlebred Museum, jct. I-75 exit 120 and Iron Works Pkwy. on the grounds of Kentucky Horse Park, has exhibits, video presentations and a movie tracing the history and current uses of the American Saddlebred horse, the oldest registered American breed of horse. The museum also features interactive and changing exhibits.

Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (859) 259-2746.

The International Museum of the Horse is part of Kentucky Horse Park at 4089 Iron Works Pkwy. This large, beautifully designed museum outlines the history of the first domesticated horse, the Arabian stallion, draft horses, horse-drawn vehicles and the horse as it relates to sports. Temporary international exhibits offer glimpses of the importance of horses to different cultures.

**LEXINGTON CEMETERY** is at 833 W. Main St. Buried here are the family of Mrs. Abraham Lincoln; Henry Clay and his wife; 19th-century author and educator James Lane Allen; Col. W.C.P. Breckinridge, the "silver-tongued Orator of Kentucky"; Confederate cavalry officer Gen. John Hunt Morgan; basketball coach Adolph F. Rupp;

actor Jim Varney; and 500 Confederate soldiers. Well-known as an arboretum, the cemetery has seasonal floral gardens.

Federal leader Gen. Gordon Granger and "King" Solomon, vagabond hero of the cholera plague of 1833 who was immortalized by novelist James Lane Allen, also are interred here. The cemetery embraces the nearby Lexington National Cemetery. Self-guiding walking tours are available. **Time:** Allow 2 hours minimum. **Phone:** (859) 255-5522.

MARY TODD LINCOLN HOUSE at 578 W. Main St. is the first historic site to honor a first lady. Built 1803-06 as an inn, the building was purchased in 1832 by Robert Smith Todd, who renovated it for use by his family. The Todds lived in the house until 1849. The family's 16 children included Mary Todd, who would become Abraham Lincoln's wife. Mary met and married the future president after moving to Springfield, Ill. to live with her older sister; she and Lincoln visited her girlhood home several times.

Knowledgeable guides provide insight into the life of the first lady as they lead visitors through the 14-room, two-story Georgian-style brick house. The décor contains antiques interspersed with a number of Mary Todd Lincoln's possessions as well as portraits and period furnishings. Especially noteworthy are Mrs. Lincoln's porcelain perfume jars, a candelabra and a mourning jacket. A 19th-century-style garden out back contains plantings representative of the original plot. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (859) 233-9999.

RAVEN RUN NATURE SANCTUARY, 6 mi. s.e. on Richmond Rd., 3.5 mi. s. on US 25/421, then 5.2 mi. s. on SR 1975/Jack's Creek Pike to 3885 Raven Run Way, is a 734-acre nature sanctuary with more than 10 miles of hiking trails that traverse meadow, forest and creek ecosystems, leading to views of the Kentucky River palisades. More than 200 bird and 600 plant species may be seen. Also on the property are a historic brick house and rock fences built by pioneer farmers. A nature center has interactive exhibits about native flora and fauna and offers pamphlets outlining the area's history and wildlife.

**Note:** Pets of any kind are not permitted. All visitors must sign in at the nature center, located at the beginning of the trail system, upon arrival and departure. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (859) 272-6105.

**RED MILE**, 1.75 mi. s.w. on US 68 via signs at 1200 Red Mile Rd., is a 1-mile oval track for trotters and pacers with grandstand, park and clubhouse facilities. The number of world records set at this red clay track has given it the

reputation as the fastest track in the world. Races are held from late July through early October. **Time:** Allow 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (859) 255-0752.

THOROUGHBRED HERITAGE TOURS depart from various hotels throughout Lexington. 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# Louisville

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### Then & Now

For 2 weeks each spring Louisville is an arena of glamour and festivity as the city anticipates and witnesses the Kentucky Oaks on the first Friday in May, where 3-year-old fillies race for a garland of lilies, and the Kentucky Derby on the first Saturday in May. The oldest continuously held horse race in the country, the Kentucky Derby pits the world's best 3-year-old Thoroughbreds in a 1.25-mile race for a purse of more than \$600,000 and a chance to become the winner of the coveted Triple Crown of racing.

Louisville is much more than a horse-racing town, however: It also is a cultural and industrial center. The city is located on a plain adjacent to the falls of the Ohio River. Named in honor of Louis XVI of France, the first permanent settlement on the site was established in 1778 by Col. George Rogers Clark, accompanied by 120 soldiers and 20 families. Fort Nelson, named after Gov. Thomas Nelson of Virginia, was completed in 1782. A plaque at the corner of 7th and Main streets commemorates the establishment of the city and the fort.

Louisville's growth was directly related to westward expansion. The Ohio River was a conveyor of both people and commerce. The portaging of goods around the falls contributed heavily to the settlement's early economy. In 1830, when the Portland Canal opened the way for river traffic from Pittsburgh to New Orleans, Louisville was catapulted from a frontier outpost into an important station of the New Orleans commercial empire.

The town attracted diverse ethnic groups, with the majority of the immigrants coming from Ireland, Germany and Scotland. Together they made Louisville an industrial center and inspired its cultural and architectural growth. Well-preserved neighborhoods reflect the impact of their heritage. Victorian houses, complete with stained-glass windows and iron fences, are found in Old Louisville. Butchertown, the German settlement and meatpacking area, exemplifies the simple lifestyles of its founders.

The city is known for producing one-third of the world's supply of bourbon. From a business standpoint Louis-ville's location has attracted many corporate offices,

including Brown-Forman Corp., Humana Inc., Papa John's International and YUM Brands, Inc. The city's facilities draw trade shows, conferences and conventions.

Louisville's downtown has undergone extensive redevelopment and represents diverse architectural styles. The Riverfront Plaza and Belvedere is an urban plaza and park; on one plaza wall is a one-story stained-glass window depicting 200 years of the city's history. Kentucky Center's glass walls reflect facades of buildings which have been renovated and converted into museums, theaters, shops and restaurants. East of downtown at River Road and Zorn Avenue, The Water Tower is an example of classic industrial architecture, with a Grecian temple

front and a great standpipe tower modeled after the Roman triumphal column. Also by River Road is the Patriots Peace Memorial, which commemorates fallen military personnel of the United States. And on Bradley Avenue near Eastern Parkway is The Grotto and Garden of Our Lady of Lourdes, a contemplative spot designed to resemble its namesake shrine in France.

As it plies the waters of the Ohio, The Belle of Louisville is a constant reminder of the city's river history even as it offers views of the ever-evolving metropolis. Both are definitive of the Louisville that, like the bourbon it produces, is a smooth blend—a tasteful mix of new with old, big city with small town and high-tech industry with gracious living.

### Must Do: AAA Editor's Picks

- Do the Derby. If you can plan ahead to attend the Kentucky Derby on the first Saturday in May, you'll witness a thrilling horse-racing spectacular, which also happens to be quite a party. The Kentucky Derby Festival precedes the race, an extravaganza featuring fireworks, concerts, sports and even a Derby Ball.
- If you can't make the Kentucky Derby, then by all means visit Churchill Downs (700 Central Ave.) to walk the hallowed grounds during a 30-minute guided tour. This is also the site of the Kentucky Derby Museum (704 Central Ave.), which showcases everything from stunning Derby hats and other fashions to exhibits about the famous Thoroughbreds that have graced the track.
- Baseball fans won't want to miss the Louisville Slugger Museum & Factory (800 W. Main St.), where the official bat of the major league is crafted. While some might be more inclined to view the collection of memorabilia dedicated to America's pastime, others might be curious to inspect a batting cage or observe bats being created in the onsite manufacturing facility.
- Enjoy Louisville's parks and recreation. For a sweeping panorama of the Ohio River, try Louisville Waterfront Park (401 River Rd.), a place with a children's play area. Or head to Cherokee Park (745 Cochran Hill Rd.), with a 2.4-mile scenic loop traveling past woodlands, meadows and rolling hills. Jefferson Memorial Forest (11311 Mitchell Hill Rd.) in Fairdale—only a 15-minute drive from downtown—offers stellar hiking, fishing and camping.
- If you're in search of an outing that appeals to all ages, you can't go wrong at the Louisville Zoo (1100 Trevilian Way). Playful polar bears thrill the kids, who also like hand-feeding the lorikeets, watching a bear-training demonstration or attending a giraffe feeding. You can navigate the facility by foot, or take a load off and ride the zoo's tram or train.
- The ★ Muhammad Ali Center (144 N. 6th St.) pays tribute to the legendary boxer in his hometown. Interactive exhibits and multimedia presentations, including a five-screen orientation film, outline Ali's life experiences and core values. A re-creation of the Champ's training camp allows participants to practice punches on a speed bag or engage in a round of shadow boxing.
- If you're up for learning, Louisville is the place to go.
   At Kentucky Science Center (727 W. Main St.), you can explore math, science and technology through hands-on displays, while highlights at

- Frazier Kentucky History Museum (829 W. Main St.) include such intriguing American artifacts as Daniel Boone's family Bible and President Theodore Roosevelt's "Big Stick."
- For a laid-back excursion, tour ➤ Locust Grove (561 Blankenbaker Ln.), a restored 1790s Georgian mansion that served as a gathering place for prominent social and political figures of the time. Just as exquisite as the home's Kentucky-crafted furniture are the meadows, gardens and woods surrounding the property, which also includes an original smokehouse and farm buildings.
- Browse for souvenirs in one of Louisville's unique shopping districts. Specialty shops and galleries dot Frankfort Avenue, also a hub for dining and entertainment. If antiques are your thing, check out the stores on East Market Street, where you'll also find artworks, home décor and upscale restaurants.
- Take a stroll through Old Louisville, said to be America's largest Victorian neighborhood. You can wander on your own, reserve a guided tour, or pick up a brochure for a self-guiding tour at the Historic Old Louisville Visitors Center (301 S. Fourth St.). Architecture buffs will delight in admiring the range of

styles represented by the quaint structures, which include Queen Anne, Renaissance Revival and Chateauesque.

### **Louisville 1-day Itinerary**

AAA editors suggest these activities for a great short vacation experience.

#### Morning

• If you'll be in Louisville on the first Saturday in May, then by all means plan to attend the Kentucky Derby, or at the very least, the Kentucky Derby Festival during the two weeks preceding the race. If you are visiting Louisville at another time, you may be able to catch another thrilling race at the legendary track, Churchill Downs (700 Central Ave.), which is situated in the southern portion of the city.

- Even if you don't attend a race, it's a treat to learn about the winners by taking the guided historic walking tour of Churchill Downs hosted by the adjacent ★ Kentucky Derby Museum (704 Central Ave.). A behind-the-scenes tour also is available, offering sneak peeks into the press box, jockeys' quarters and millionaire's row. At the museum you can try to maintain a jockey's stance on a simulated horse, view race footage or peruse the collection of exhibits providing insight into the world of Thoroughbred racing.
- About 6 miles east of Churchill Downs (via I-65S and I-264E), the Louisville Zoo (1100 Trevilian Way) entertains the whole family. In addition to observing the zoo's impressive assortment of animals, there are other interesting things to do. Kids love the zoo's train while a carousel and playground delight tykes.

#### Afternoon

- Head to downtown Louisville, where several must-dos are within walking distance of each other on West Main Street. For stylish dishes in an artful setting, order lunch from **Proof on Main** (702 W. Main St.), which also satisfies with decadent dessert choices.
- Louisville presents first-rate facilities for those captivated by the arts and sciences. Strolling along West Main Street, you'll encounter the 

  ★ Kentucky Science Center (727 W. Main St.), enlightening guests with a vast array of interactive displays and activity centers. "The World We Create" exhibit inspires creative thinkers as it explores physical science. Just a short walk west, the 

  ★ Frazier Kentucky History Museum (829 W. Main St.) holds such fascinating pieces as swords, shields and medieval weapons. Costumed interpreters and live demonstrations illustrating various techniques of using armor lend intrigue to the experience.
- Among the cluster of attractions on West Main Street, you'll come across two that represent well-crafted items unique to Kentucky. The KMAC Museum (715 W. Main St.), a contemporary art museum, aims to connect people to art and creative practice. If you're a baseball fan, then you can appreciate art of a different sort at the Louisville Slugger Museum & Factory (800 W. Main St.); this is the place where the iconic baseball bat is constructed, and you can go on a tour to see how it's done.

#### **Evening**

 Bardstown Road, just southeast of downtown, is known as the city's Restaurant Row. Seviche-A Latin Restaurant (1538 Bardstown Rd.) touts Nuevo Latino cuisine prepared with flair, enhanced by inventive cocktails and a modern yet cozy atmosphere with copper, leather and wood accents. For a down-home treat, try **Mark's Feed Store** (1514 Bardstown Rd.), where the barbecue consistently ranks high in area polls. Galleries, boutiques, pubs and nightspots dot the neighborhood as well.

- For a nautical endeavor, the historic steamboat Belle of Louisville and the riverboat Spirit of Jefferson offer dinner cruises (embarking at 401 W. River Rd.) on the Ohio River. Reserve a window seat if you are intent on catching the view, especially lovely at sunset.
- Louisville Horse Trams (801 Witherspoon St.) allows visitors to engage in evening sightseeing, with tours available after 6 p.m. You'll explore the downtown area in style via a handsome horse-drawn carriage.
- Those interested in the performing arts should check the box office at The Kentucky Center (501 W. Main St.). Home to the Kentucky Opera, Louisville Orchestra and Louisville Ballet, the venue also presents Broadway Across America.

### **Arriving**

### By Car

The major north-south route that bisects the city is I-65. From the north it comes from Indianapolis and enters the city via the JFK Memorial Bridge. From the south it passes through Nashville and skirts Louisville International Airport on its way into downtown. Numerous exits provide easy access to city streets. I-65 is closely paralleled north of the city by US 31. The four-lane George Rogers Clark Memorial Bridge, also known as the Second Street Bridge, crosses the Ohio River and carries US 31, a route which divides into US 31E and US 31W south of Louisville.

East-west traffic is best served by I-64. On the west it crosses the Ohio River from Indiana into Louisville on the Sherman Minton Bridge. It is a close neighbor of US 60 east of Louisville, bringing traffic from Frankfort and Lexington. In the city it hugs the riverfront, where it is called Riverside Parkway. Exits are at major city thoroughfares. The northeastern access is via I-71 from Cincinnati.

I-264 (the Henry Watterson Expressway and the Shawnee Expressway) bypasses downtown and loops around the western, southern and eastern portions of the city. Linking with short sections of I-64 and I-71, it provides a complete circuit of Louisville with interchanges at major cross routes. Farther out, the Gene Snyder Freeway (I-265) affords a bypass from US 42 to US 31W with interchanges at major highways.


### **Getting Around**

### Street System

Driving in Louisville is relatively easy with the help of a good city map. North-south address numbers start at Main Street; east-west numbering begins at 1st Street. Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit is 35 mph. Avoid rush hour traffic, 7:30-9 a.m. and 4-6 p.m., if possible.

### **Parking**

Many downtown streets have metered parking, but be careful to check signs and meters for restricted times and limits. Commercial garage and lot parking is usually available. Rates are 50c-75c per hour. Visitors also can purchase a "Smart Card" (which works like a debit card) at the visitor's center.

### **Public Transportation**

Transit Authority of River City (TARC) operates buses and trolleys throughout the Louisville metropolitan area. The base fare for buses is \$1.75; exact change is required. Transfers from one bus route to another are free and are valid for 2 hours; remember to ask the driver for a transfer upon boarding. TARC offers discount bus fares for senior citizens and the physically impaired. The Day Tripper pass, which allows for unlimited rides for an entire day, may be purchased for \$3 at the Louisville Visitors Center on the corner of 4th and Jefferson streets and at Union Station, 1000 W. Broadway.

The 4th Street Trolley travels on 4th Street from Theatre Square to the Galt House. The trolley's route extends further south to Breckenridge Mon.-Fri. 9-6:30. They also travel through Fourth Street Live, except during special events, when a detour route is followed. Green signs indicate stops for the 4th Street Trolley. The fare is 50 cents.

The Main Street Trolley runs a circular 3.5-mile route on Main and Market from 10th Street to Campbell Street. This trolley also provides service to Slugger Field for Louisville Bats baseball games on weeknights. Red signs indicate Main/Market Trolley stops. The fare is 50 cents.

Call the TARC Travel Center, (502) 585-1234, for information about fares, schedules and routes.

### **Shopping**

Many of Louisville's historic buildings have been converted into shopping and dining complexes, which makes browsing for a special purchase even more interesting. Things to see by regional artists are sold at numerous galleries in **NuLu** (new Louisville). Antique shops along **Bardstown Road** offer many choices for collectors.

Fourth Street Live!, a pedestrian mall downtown on 4th Street between Liberty Street and Muhammad Ali Boulevard, is a retail, dining and entertainment zone as well as a venue for concerts and other fun things to do. A glass ceiling over 4th Street provides protection from the elements. WE Hard Rock Cafe, 424 S. 4th St., offers a collection of rock 'n' roll merchandise.

At the intersection of Gene Snyder Freeway (I-265) and Brownsboro Road (SR 22) is **Paddock Shops**, a collection of more than 60 upscale shops and restaurants in a landscaped outdoor setting.

The Louisville area also offers three enclosed suburban malls. To the east are **Oxmoor Center** and **Mall St. Matthews**, both on Shelbyville Road. Southeast of the city is **Jefferson Mall**, at the Outer Loop east of Preston Highway. Most include major department stores, such as Dillard's, JCPenney and Old Navy.

East of the city in Shelbyville, English antiques and silver are the specialties of the Wakefield-Scearce Galleries.

### **Big Events**

Louisville has much to celebrate and wastes no time doing just that through various ethnic festivals, fairs, music events, art and trade shows, and of course, horse races. For current listings of events check the local newspapers.

To Louisvillians, the **Kentucky Derby**, held on the first Saturday in May, is not just a horse race but the last day of the **Kentucky Derby Festival**, a 2-week event accented by picnics, banquets and dances; music events with top-name entertainment; and bicycle, balloon and steamboat races. The whole festival is kicked off in grand style by **Thunder Over Louisville**, one of the nation's premiere air shows and fireworks displays. The city comes down with Derby fever a week before the race, and its population mushrooms with the influx of tourists, all anxious to experience one of the nation's largest celebrations.

The National Farm Machinery Show and Championship Tractor Pull, held at the Kentucky Exposition Center, draws crowds in mid-February. The center is also the site for the NSRA Street Rod Nationals, usually held late July-early August and said to be the world's largest street rod event with more than 11,000 pre-1949 vehicles.

Beatles fans flock to the **Abbey Road on the River Music Festival** on Memorial Day weekend when a tribute to Britain's fab four is presented. In July the **Forecastle Festival**, a music, art and activism event, draws more than 40 bands and some 50 environmental organizations to entertain and inform along the Ohio River.

In mid-August Louisville presents the **Kentucky State Fair and Horse Show**, also held at the Exposition Center. Besides the horse show—a prestigious event for Saddlebreds—exhibits and musical entertainment also are on the fair's schedule.

WorldFest, on Labor Day weekend, features international music, dance and food. Also in September, the IdeaFestival attracts highly diverse thinkers from across the globe to explore and celebrate innovation, imagination and cutting-edge ideas. Mid-September ushers in Oktoberfest at the German-American Club.

The fine arts are celebrated during several fairs and festivals. Shakespearean plays are performed each summer, late May to early August, during the **Kentucky Shakespeare Festival**. Performances are free. The first weekend in October, the **St. James Court Art Show** is held at St. James and Belgravia courts.

Step back in time to a Victorian era with holiday lights, vendors selling British fare and a parade during **Light Up Louisville** in late November.

### **Sports & Rec**

Louisville has something to offer almost every sports enthusiast, whether adventure travel enthusiast, athlete or spectator. The parks of Louisville and Jefferson County, ranging in size from one-tenth of an acre to the 6,400-acre **Jefferson Memorial Forest** (see Recreation Areas Chart), offer opportunities for many adventurous things to do. For information about park facilities and events contact the Metro Parks Public Information Office, 1297 Trevilian Way, Louisville, KY 40213; phone (502) 456-8100.

With a 900-foot series of pools, waterfalls, water cannons and a wharf, **Waterfront Park**, downtown on the riverfront, connects Louisville to the Ohio River and is a fun thing to do with kids. The park features a playground and is a popular spot for concerts, picnicking, walking and jogging.

Bicycle trails wind through many of the parks, and several bicycle routes are designated along city streets. A booklet highlighting bicycle routes throughout Louisville and Jefferson County is available at most public library branches and at the visitor center at Fourth and Jefferson streets; for additional information phone (502) 574-6473. For a more unusual bicycling opportunity, however, there's Louisville Mega Cavern, which operates the world's biggest indoor bicycle park with 320,000 square feet and 45 trails; phone (877) 614-6342.

**Hiking** is available in most of the parks, but marked hiking trails are found in Jefferson Memorial Forest, which offers hikers more than 35 miles of trails ranging from an easy .25-mile (one-way) paved walk to a strenuous 6.2-mile (one-way) trek. The forest, part of Louisville's Metro Parks system, is 16 miles south of the city in Fairdale; phone (502) 368-5404 for additional information.


Fishing is available; people between 16 and 65 must have a state fishing license. Charlie Vettiner, Cherokee, Chickasaw, Fishermans, Iroquois, Long Run, Tom Wallace, Watterson and Waverly parks have stocked lakes, and Chickasaw, Cox, Eva Badman, Hays Kennedy, Riverview, Shawnee, Thurman Hutchins and Thurston parks provide access to the Ohio River, where carp and game fish may be caught.

Golf enthusiasts can choose from any of the nine Metro Parks golf courses: Bobby Nichols, 4301 E. Pages Ln., (502) 937-9051; Charlie Vettiner, 10207 Mary Dell Ln., (502) 267-9958; Cherokee, 2501 Alexander Rd., (502) 458-9450; Crescent Hill, 3110 Brownsboro Rd., (502) 896-9193; Iroquois, 1501 Rundill Rd., (502) 363-9520; Long Run, 1605 Flat Rock Rd., (502) 245-9015; Seneca,

2300 Pee Wee Reese Rd., (502) 458-9298; **Shawnee**, 460 Northwestern Pkwy., (502) 776-9389; and **Sun Valley**, 6505 Bethany Ln., (502) 937-9228.

Six of these courses—Charlie Vettiner, Iroquois, Long Run, Seneca, Shawnee and Sun Valley—offer 18 holes. Shawnee is particularly scenic, with five holes played parallel to the Ohio River. Each course has a clubhouse and pro shop; both pull and riding carts can be rented. All courses are open daily, 30 minutes after dawn to dusk. Daily greens fees range from \$9.25 to \$16; discounts are available for senior citizens.

Influenced by their surroundings, visitors often want to go horseback riding while in Louisville. Marked horse trails ranging from 3 to 10 miles long are available at Cherokee, Forest View, Iroquois, Seneca and Tom Wallace parks. Trails also are available at five state parks: Barren River Lake Resort, Cumberland Falls





Resort, Dale Hollow Lake Resort, Lake Barkley Resort and Lake Cumberland Resort (see Recreation Areas Chart) as well as Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area.

For tennis buffs the more than 150 public outdoor courts in the area are free and are available on a firstcome-first-served basis, with a 1-hour time limit.

Water sports are enjoyed in the 12 outdoor pools, open mid-June to mid-August, and three indoor public pools, open year-round, as well as in area lakes and the Ohio River.

Spectator sports are a fun thing to do in Louisville. The University of Louisville Cardinals football team plays at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium, phone (502) 852-2779, while the college's **basketball** team schedules their games at the KFC Yum! Center downtown, phone (502) 690-9000.

The city has a AAA minor league baseball team, the Louisville Bats—the Cincinnati Reds' principal farm team—which plays April through September at Louisville Slugger Field on E. Main Street; phone (502) 212-2287.

Louisville City FC, or LouCity, a competing soccer franchise of The United Soccer League, plays at Lynn Family Stadium. The stadium holds over 11,000 seats and is located near Adams and Campbell streets in the Butchertown neighborhood; phone (502) 384-8799.

Besides the renowned "Run for the Roses." Churchill **Downs** offers Thoroughbred horse racing from late April through early July and September through November; phone (502) 636-4400.

Note: Policies concerning admittance of children to parimutuel betting facilities vary. Phone for information.

### Performing Arts

The Louisville Fund for the Arts, started in 1949 to provide financial assistance to theater, art, music and dance, was the first of its kind in the United States. It now supports more than 12 organizations. An example of the city's enthusiasm for the arts is evident at the Riverfront Plaza and Belvedere, home to The Kentucky Center (see attraction listing p. 88).

The Tony Award-winning **Actors Theatre of Louisville**, (502) 584-1205, is in a complex at 316 W. Main St. that includes three theaters: the Victor Jory, a converted Victorian warehouse; the Pamela Brown, a modern auditorium-style structure; and the 316-seat-in-the-round Bingham Theatre. This resident professional troupe performs September to May. Their annual Humana Festival of New American Plays draws international attention and is held late March through early April.

Kentucky Opera; Louisville Ballet; and Stage One: The Louisville Children's Theatre perform at The Kentucky Center. The opera, (502) 584-4500, presents works September through February, and the ballet, (502) 583-3150, performs September through April. Stage One presents plays for children September through May; phone (502) 589-4060. Repertory dance troupes and theatrical and musical companies from throughout the country also are drawn to the center and are fun things for couples to do.

The Little Colonel Players, (502) 241-9906, the area's oldest community theater, stages its productions in Pewee Valley, while the **Derby Dinner Playhouse**, in nearby Jeffersonville, Ind., (812) 288-8281, offers Broadway plays and a buffet dinner in a theater-in-the-round setting.

The free Kentucky Shakespeare Festival performances from mid-June through July are a must; phone (502) 574-9900. Enjoy a picnic in the park, then stroll over to the Ramey Amphitheatre at Fourth Street between Park and Magnolia. Other summer highlights are the musicals, movies and other things to see at the Iroquois Amphitheater in Iroquois Park; phone (502) 368-5865.

Though classic films are a given, **The Louisville Palace** (625 S. 4th St.) also features an assortment of live entertainment and special engagements inside the historic 1928 theater; phone (502) 583-4555.

The Louisville Orchestra, (502) 587-8681, performs September through May at The Kentucky Center. Louisville also invests in the musical talents of its young people through the Louisville Youth Orchestra, which performs at various locations; phone (502) 896-1851. The Mercury Ballroom, 622 S. 4th St., is a venue for concerts and shows; phone (502) 583-4555.

The Chamber Music Society sponsors concerts by international artists at the University of Louisville's School of Music; phone (502) 852-6907.



### **Explore Things To Do,** visit AAA.com/tripcanvas

**21C MUSEUM,** downtown and within the 21c Hotel at 700 W. Main St., features more than 9,000 square feet of permanent and changing exhibit space emphasizing contemporary art created by artists from around the world. Text Rain, an interactive exhibit in which visitors may interact with individual letters presented on a projection screen, is one of nine permanent museum installations. Private and public collections, pieces on loan from other museums as well as group and individual performances by live artists constitute the changing exhibits.

AMERICAN PRINTING HOUSE FOR THE BLIND (APH) is .3 mi. e. of jct. I-64 and US 42/Mellwood Avenue at 1839 Frankfort Ave. Founded in 1858, APH is one of the largest and oldest non-profit organizations designing and manufacturing products for the visually impaired. It has been the main supplier of educational materials for blind or partially sighted students in the United States since 1879. Ninety-minute guided tours feature the Braille production area, the studios where audio books are made, and a visit to an interactive museum that focuses on the international history of education for those who are blind.

**Time:** Allow 1 hour, 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (800) 223-1839 for reservations. GT

The Museum of the American Printing House for the **Blind** is in the American Printing House for the Blind at 1839 Frankfort Ave. Among the museum's interactive exhibits are early printing equipment, an operable mechanical Braille writer on which guests can write in Braille and take away a copy, computer software designed for people with blindness or low vision and an area in which visitors may compare Braille to alphabets using raised letters. A copy of the book "An Essay on the Education of the Blind," published in France in 1786 and the first to include raised letters, the Book of Psalms from Helen Keller's bible and the piano used by Stevie Wonder when he was a student at the Michigan School for the Blind are displayed.

CATHEDRAL OF THE ASSUMPTION, 433 S. 5th St., between Muhammad Ali Blvd. and Liberty St., is one of America's oldest cathedrals in continuous use. Built in 1852, the interior of the imposing red brick edifice features Gothic arches, ornate columns and a vaulted ceiling with more than 8,000 24-karat gold leaf stars on a blue field, as well as a fresco of cherubs surrounding the Virgin Marv.

The sanctuary is lined with oil paintings sent to Louisville in the mid-19th century by Pope Gregory XVI. Across the street from the cathedral is the Archdiocese of Louisville History Center. Time: Allow 30 minutes minimum. Phone: (502) 582-2971. GT

**CHURCHILL DOWNS,** at 700 Central Ave., is the historic racetrack where the Kentucky Derby is run. Racing seasons are late April through early July and late October through November; Derby Day is the first Saturday in May. A 30-minute guided walking tour of Churchill Downs is available through the Kentucky Derby Museum (weather permitting). **Phone:** (502) 636-4400.

Kentucky Derby Museum, 704 Central Ave., adjacent to Gate 1 at Churchill Downs, showcases the thoroughbred industry and the Kentucky Derby. Two floors of hats, fashion, racing artifacts and interactive exhibits share the tradition and exhilaration of Derby Day. A 360degree high-definition film of "The Greatest Race" narrates the life of a Thoroughbred, from foal to Derby champion, while owners, trainers and lockevs relive their Derby moments in "The Winner's Stable."

Other exhibits feature race footage of every Derby since 1918, trophies, commemorative Derby glasses, riding silks and a live Thoroughbred and miniature horse. Visitors may test their Derby knowledge in an interactive trivia

game and attempt to maintain a jockey's stance for 2 minutes on a mountable simulated horse. The Barn and Backside Track Tour allows guests to visit the track's stables and infield, while the Inside the Gates Tour takes visitors through the clubhouse and non-public areas of the track.

THE CONRAD-CALDWELL HOUSE MUSEUM, 1402 St. James Ct., is a Victorian Romanesque Revival mansion built in the 1890s by architect Arthur Loomis for businessman Theophilus Conrad. The carved stone exterior is complemented by the interior woodwork, which includes carved paneling and parquet floors. The surrounding neighborhood, known as Old Louisville, is noted for its turn-of-the-20th-century homes.

Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (502) 636-5023.

FARMINGTON is off I-264 at 3033 Bardstown Rd. Built in 1816, this 14-room Federal-style home was the center of the 550-acre hemp plantation owned by John and Lucy Speed and sustained by nearly 60 slaves. The restored house is furnished with Kentucky furniture and period antiques. A summer kitchen, springhouse, stone barn and re-created early 19th-century garden are on the 18-acre grounds.

The "Lincoln and Farmington: An Enduring Friendship" exhibit explores the friendship of Joshua Speed, one of John and Lucy's 11 children, and Abraham Lincoln, whom Joshua befriended while both young men were beginning their careers in Springfield, III. The two became close friends, and in 1841 Lincoln spent about 3 weeks at Farmington during a break in his relationship with Mary Todd. The exhibit's documents, letters and photographs chronicle Lincoln's visit, likely his sole experience on a slave-based plantation; an invitation to Lincoln's 1865 funeral also is displayed.

FLAME RUN GLASS STUDIO & GALLERY is at 815 W. Market St. This facility displays contemporary glass art and figures created by glass-blowing, or pipe-working, which entails a pipe or tube being used to inflate molten glass into a bubble so that it may be shaped. A gallery showcases glassworks crafted by local and international artists. Demonstrations may be seen during guided studio tours, and visitors may create their own pieces in a variety of workshops offered.

FRAZIER KENTUCKY HISTORY MUSEUM is at 829 W. Main St. at 9th St. The Frazier documents stories from history using exhibits, artifacts and live performances. The permanent collection highlights a wide array of historically significant artifacts of Kentucky and America, including Teddy Roosevelt's "big stick," Geronimo's bow and arrows and the arrest warrant of Mary Todd Lincoln. Other noteworthy objects include a surplus grave marker from the Battle of Little Bighorn, a first edition of *Uncle Tom's Cabin* and Bourbon history artifacts dating from pre-prohibition to today.

Cool Kentucky spotlights artists, craftsmen. scientists, chefs, musicians and other notable figures from the Bluegrass State. The Commonwealth: Divided We Fall depicts the lives of everyday Kentuckians from the Ice Age to the present. The Stewart Historic Miniatures Collection houses one of the largest collections of toy soldiers and historic miniatures on permanent public display in the world. The Spirit of Kentucky takes a look at America's only native spirit, while the Lewis and Clark Experience allows visitors to view a Sioux tipi replica and a 55-foot cutaway of Lewis and Clark's keelboat, or by trying their hands at animal tracking and exploring secret passages.

The official starting point on the *Kentucky Bourbon Trail*, the museum offers *The Spirit of Kentucky* exhibition which features an in-depth look at Bourbon whiskey. A covered bridge-style path leads visitors into the 3rd floor exhibit that starts with the state's physical features that are conducive to Bourbon making and ends in Bottle Hall where every brand of Bourbon currently produced in the state is displayed—some 500 bottles. Bourbon tastings and tours are offered in the Welcome Center on the first floor of the museum. The multimedia production *KentuckyShow!* is presented daily and takes a look at the people, sights and sounds of the state.

KENTUCKY SCIENCE CENTER, 727 W. Main St., is housed in a restored, four-story 19th-century is housed in a restored, four-story, 19th-century former warehouse and features hands-on science exhibits and a four-story digital theater.

Permanent exhibits include The World Within Us, which explores the wonders of the human body: The World We Create, which celebrates how creative thinking makes scientific achievements possible; and The World Around Us, with exhibits about natural and earth sciences. Encompassing the entire first floor is the Science in Play exhibit, which is geared towards the under age 7 crowd.

LOCUST GROVE, .5 mi. w. on US 42 from jct. 1-264 exit 22, then n. following signs to 561 Blankenbaker Ln., is the restored 1790 Georgian mansion of early Kentucky settlers William and Lucy Clark Croghan. Croghan was a surveying partner of frontiersman and Revolutionary War general George Rogers Clark, who also was his brother-in-law.

The farm and residence, on 55 acres, provide insights into westward expansion and the lives of the Croghans and their African American slaves. General Clark lived at Locust Grove the last 9 years of his life. The site includes outbuildings, an 18th-century-style garden and a visitor center with exhibits. An introductory video and 45-minute tours are available.

The 1,200-square-foot gallery and permanent exhibit—A Country Worth Defending: Land & Family in Early Kentucky—focuses on the surveying work of Clark and Croghan and features a re-created 1810 log building and surveyor's office.

68,000-pound steel version of his creation. The bat, a scale model of Babe Ruth's Louisville Slugger, rests against the wall of the famous implement's manufacturing plant and headquarters.

Visitors can view collections of baseball memorabilia before moving on to the Hillerich & Bradsby Co. manufacturing facility to see bats being produced. Visitors receive a souvenir mini-bat and are able to partake in interactive exhibits and batting cages.

LOUISVILLE ZOO is off I-264 exit 14 following signs to 1100 Trevilian Way. More than 1,500 exotic animals are presented in naturalistic indoor and outdoor habitats arranged by geographic region within the zoo's 134 acres. Exhibits feature a rare white alligator, giraffes, lions, rhinos, zebras, African and Asian elephants, a petting zoo and playgrounds.

Gorillas and pygmy hippos can be found at the Gorilla Forest; polar and grizzly bears reside at Glacier Run; the Island Village is home to orangutans, Sumatran tigers, tapirs, siamangs, penguins, Cuban crocodiles and a Komodo dragon; and the HerpAquarium displays rare amphibians, fish and reptiles in native settings. Lorikeet Landing, in the Australian area, features the brightly colored birds in a walk-through aviary. A tram, miniature train, ropes course, splash park, camel rides and a 1919 carousel also are on the premises.

MARK PAYTON GLASS CENTER, downtown at jct. 9th and Market sts. at 815 W. Market St., brings fun and education together, allowing visitors to see the procedures and techniques used to produce torch work glass creations. A self-guiding tour includes a video presentation and a chance to see flameworking, glassblowing and two galleries.

MUHAMMAD ALI CENTER, downtown at 144 N. 6th St. between Main St. and River Rd., is a cultural attraction and education center inspired by the ideals of the heavyweight boxing champion, humanitarian, international icon, peace activist, United Nations Messenger of Peace and Louisville native. The center's two-and-a-half levels feature exhibits that spotlight the core principles that Ali embraced: confidence, conviction, dedication, respect, giving and spirituality.

Visitors may train in an interactive boxing area, explore Ali's life inside the five-screen Orientation Theater, survey

RIVERSIDE, THE FARNSLEY-MOREMEN LANDING is 10 mi. w. on SR 841 (Gene Snyder Frwy.) from jct. I-65 to Lower River Rd., then .1 mi. s. to 7410 Moorman Rd. This 300-acre site on the banks of the Ohio River depicts the importance of agriculture and river transportation in the nation's development. Two prosperous farm families cultivated the land and traded goods from their landing with people traveling down the river. The restored 1837 two-story red brick "I" house features a Greek Revival portico and is furnished in period with some original pieces.

The grounds include a garden, planted with vegetables, herbs and flowers similar to those the Moremen family might have grown; a reconstructed 19th-century detached kitchen; a visitors center; a sheltered pavilion; and a modern boat landing.

THE SPEED ART MUSEUM, 2035 S. 3rd St., is next to the University of Louisville campus, .75 mi. w. off I-65 Eastern Pkwy. exit. The building, recently renovated, is considered one of the finest neoclassic structures in the South. New features include the North Building, the South Building and cinema, and the art park and piazza on the grounds.

Displays include modern and old masters paintings and sculptures, European tapestries, furniture, decorative art, American Indian objects, African cultural exhibits and contemporary works as well as a 16th-century English Renaissance room.

The Laramie L. Leatherman Art Learning Center offers hands-on exhibits. Art Sparks, the center's interactive core, contains interactive stations that educates visitors. The museum also offers special traveling exhibitions. **Phone:** (502) 634-2700.

WHITEHALL HOUSE AND GARDENS is off I-64 exit 8; take Grinstead Dr. .2 mi. s., then 1.2 mi. e. to 3110 Lexington Rd. Built in 1855, the house was originally a two-story, eightroom brick building. In 1909 the Middleton family remodeled and expanded the building, creating a 15-room Classical Revival mansion reminiscent of an antebellum plantation house. The 10-acre grounds feature a 2-acre formal Florentine garden.





Clarksville was established in 1783 on land granted to Col. George Rogers Clark and his men, who defended the territory from British assaults 1778-79. Clark strategically positioned an outpost at the head of an unnavigable section of the Ohio River-2.5 miles of cascading rapids, or cataract falls, created by rock reefs. Though they provided a natural defense, the falls of the Ohio impeded early commerce. Goods had to be portaged around until the Portland Canal was completed at Louisville in 1830.

In 1803 Clark's brother William met up with Corps of Discovery co-commander Meriwether Lewis in Clarksville to make final preparations for the historic expedition to the Pacific Ocean. The Lewis and Clark Park, off Harrison Avenue, features interpretive panels detailing the journey; a half-scale replica of the keelboat the explorers used also is on the grounds.

Falls of the Ohio National Wildlife Conservation Area. more than 1,400 acres of river bottom between Indiana and Kentucky, contains a coral reef of great geologic importance. Overlooking the conservation area is Falls of the Ohio State Park.

# MAMMOTH CAVE NATIONAL PARK

Elevations in the park range from 450 ft. at river level to 950 ft. at Mammoth Cave Ridge.

Northeast of Bowling Green, northwest of Park City and 10 miles west of Cave City via SR 70, Mammoth Cave National Park occupies 52,830 acres. Much of the park is in its natural state, providing shelter to a large variety of birds and other wildlife.

A tributary of the Ohio River, the scenic Green River traverses this well-forested, rugged terrain for 25 miles. More than 80 miles of back-country trails, all of which can be used for hiking and some available for horseback riding and mountain biking, run along the river's bluffs, ridges and valleys. Biking trails also are available. In the northwestern section of the park is the 7-mile-long Nolin River. Several scenic driving tour routes wind through the park.

Within the park is Mammoth Cave, which has yielded archeological evidence of humans approximately 5,000 years ago. During the War of 1812 the cave furnished saltpeter used to manufacture gunpowder.

Mammoth Cave contains more than 400 miles of underground passages charted on five levels. Said to be the longest cave system known, it was hollowed out by the seepage of ground water and the flow of underground streams. The cave contains diverse passageways, some of which contain remnants of 5,000-year-old stick cane torches, woven sandals and names written on the cave walls by guides during the 19th century using candle smoke.

### **General Information and Activities**

Informal campfire programs are held at the amphitheater nightly during the summer and as scheduled in the spring and fall. During the summer and other months of heavy visitation, park interpreters conduct nature walks. The Green and Nolin rivers provide 31 miles of fishing and canoeing waters.

Camping and picnicking facilities are near the visitor center and at Houchin Ferry. Free permits for backcountry camping can be obtained at the visitor center. Food is available at the camp store.

The park and self-guiding nature trails are open yearround. The visitor center is open daily 8-6:30, June-Aug.; 8:30-4:30, rest of year. Closed Christmas. Phone (270) 758-2180 daily 9-4:15. See Recreation Areas Chart.

**ADMISSION** to the park is free. Fees are charged for cave tours and camping.

**PETS** are permitted in the park only if leashed, crated or otherwise physically restricted at all times. No pets, with the exception of designated service animals, are allowed in the cave or visitor center; kennels are available.

**ADDRESS** inquiries to the Superintendent, Mammoth Cave National Park, Mammoth Cave Pkwy., P.O. Box 7, Mammoth Cave, KY 42259.

MAMMOTH CAVE, about 10 mi. w. of Cave City and 8 mi. n.w. of Park City off I-65, has more than 400 miles of known passageways with an average temperature of 54°F; bring a light jacket. Some underground rooms are as wide as 200 feet; the tallest dome is 192 feet high; the deepest pit is 105 feet. Guided cave tours, ranging from 1.25 to 6 hours, vary in degree of difficulty. Visitors should select the tour that best suits their physical abilities and dress appropriately. The cave is inhabited by creatures who have adapted to the darkness, including fish, cave crickets and eyeless crayfish. Tour schedules are available at the visitor center, from which all tours depart.

Wear sturdy shoes with good traction; some passages are wet and slippery. Phone: (270) 758-2180 for park information, or (877) 444-6777 for the reservation service.

### **MAYSVILLE**

Maysville, first known as Limestone, is on the south bank of the Ohio River; the city was renamed and incorporated in 1792. The influence of the river trade during the 1800s is evident in Maysville's architecture—the iron grillwork of the row houses along Third Street is reminiscent of New Orleans. In front of the old county courthouse is Old Tip, a cannon used in the Battle of Tippecanoe during the War of 1812.

The history of Maysville is depicted through a series of murals painted on the city's floodwall. Beginning near Limestone Landing with an illustration of a 17th-century Native American hunting party, the murals progress to show visits by the Marquis de Lafayette and Henry Clay, the Underground Railroad, mid-19th- and early 20thcentury street scenes and the grandstand at an annual fair. A 2007 addition pays homage to actress and singer Rosemary Clooney, born in Maysville in 1928.

KENTUCKY GATEWAY MUSEUM CENTER is at 215 Sutton St., in the downtown historic district. The museum, housed in the 1881 town library, features dioramas depicting the earliest settlement of Maysville, a map collection, slides of area scenes and architecture, exhibits about area agriculture and industry, an art gallery, a rotating exhibit gallery and a genealogical research library. The Kathleen Savage Browning Miniatures Collection is housed in 3,200 square feet of exhibit space and contains thousands of one-twelfth scale homes, mansions and vignettes. An adjacent pioneer graveyard dates to 1800.

NATIONAL UNDERGROUND RAILROAD MUSEUM, 38 W. 4th St., is in the Bierbower House, a mid-19th-century "safe house" where runaway slaves were concealed. Maysville was on one of the main escape routes used by fugitive slaves as they headed north to freedom. The museum features historical artifacts, records and documents depicting life on the Underground Railroad. Of note is "Sampson," an original Parker Tobacco Press.

In 1911 Morehead furnished the locale for the first of Cora Wilson Stewart's "moonlight schools." A forerunner of modern adult education, these schools enrolled students from 18 to 86, held classes on moonlit nights, taught the basics-reading and writing-and within 2 years largely eliminated illiteracy in eastern Kentucky.

The little schoolhouse in which Stewart began her teaching career stands next to the public library on First Street in tribute to the dynamic impact on national and international education that began in this small community.

At the northern end of Daniel Boone National Forest (see place listing p. 41) and close to Cave Run Lake, the Morehead area provides many recreational opportunities, including trails for hiking, bicycling and horseback riding, and a sanctuary for Canada geese.

Murray is the home of Murray State University, which has a wide variety of facilities open to the public. The Clara M. Eagle Gallery presents changing exhibits of fine arts and crafts in a range of styles and media. The Wrather-West Kentucky Museum contains university and Jackson Purchase memorabilia. The Curris Center on Chestnut Street serves as a student and conference center as well as a community gathering place.

The MSU Libraries house reference sources, government documents and historical materials about the area in addition to some Jesse Stuart manuscripts, first editions and items related to the Kentuckian's career as a writer and educator. The libraries are open daily 7 a.m.-9 p.m. Also on the MSU campus is the CFSB Center, which hosts sporting events and concerts throughout the year.

One mile west of the campus on MSU's 254-acre University Farm is the Bill Cherry Agricultural Exposition Center. used for such events as rodeos, concerts, horse shows, circuses, motorcycle races and various exhibitions.

In town, Playhouse in the Park offers a variety of productions in the 1907 Freight Depot in the city park. In addition Murray is convenient to nearby Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley Park (see Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area p. 63).

### **NEWPORT**

- Hotels p. 111
- Part of Cincinnati area— see map p. 169

Named after Admiral Christopher Newport, the commander of the first English settlement at Jamestown, Virginia, in 1603, Newport's location at the confluence of the Ohio and Licking rivers was a natural stopping point for pioneers heading west. Founded in 1795, Newport and its neighbor Cincinnati grew and prospered as a result of riverboat traffic along the Ohio.

The early 20th century, however, saw a change in the city's character. Coinciding with the invention of the Thompson machine gun ("Tommy Gun") by Newport native John Thompson, the city became a haven for gangsters in the 1920s. Gambling halls, glitzy nightclubs and prostitution followed and earned Newport the nickname "Sin City" from the 1940s through the '80s.

Reform, coupled with renovation and redevelopment, has transformed the city. The East Row Historic District is graced with tree-lined streets and elegant 19th-century homes, and the riverfront has been revived with the addition of trendy shopping and entertainment areas and the Newport Aquarium (see attraction listing).

The city's Levee District is home to the World Peace Bell, which was the world's largest free-swinging bell 2000-2016. One of 20 worldwide, the bell within the transparent Freedom Tower, 425 York St., commemorates the 50th anniversary of the 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights and rings each morning around noon and during special occasions. Guided tours are available for a fee Mon.-Fri. 10-4; phone (859) 655-7700. Also nearby

are the Northern Kentucky Firefighters Memorial and a scaled version of the two World Trade Center towers, honoring Sept. 11, 2001, and the valor of firefighters.


Shopping: Newport on the Levee, 1 Levee Way on the banks of the Ohio River, is an entertainment district featuring shopping, dining and clubs.

NEWPORT AQUARIUM, off I-471 exit 5 (SR 8), then w. following signs to the Newport on the Levee complex, displays thousands of aquatic creatures from every continent and ocean. Canyon Falls is home to Asian small-clawed otters while Turtle Canyon features a diverse collection of more than 14 species of turtles spanning three continents—from the Galapagos tortoise, said to be the largest tortoise species in the world, to the Egyptian tortoise, reputedly the smallest tortoise species in the Northern Hemisphere. A turtle corral allows quests to touch multiple species of turtles. Surrounded by Sharks takes guests through the underwater tunnels of a 385,000-gallon tank filled with six shark species, four rare and exotic shark rays, 300 fish and Denver, a nearly 200pound loggerhead sea turtle.

In the Frog Bog exhibit, kids can crawl through a play area designed to introduce them to more than 20 different species of frogs from around the world. The Jellyfish Gallery features walk-around tanks and interactive games as a means of learning about the various species.

Gator Alley is a swampland showcasing eight species of crocodilians from four continents, including Mighty Mike, one of the biggest American alligators outside of Florida. Other exhibits include Shark Central, a touch tank where visitors can pet a shark; Shore Gallery, with a touch pool populated by starfish, crabs and urchins; Dangerous & Deadly, inhabited by piranhas, poison dart frogs and puffer fish; and Kroger Penguin Palooza. African penguin encounters as well as the Backstage Animal Experience showing the inner workings of the aquarium are available for additional fees. A coral reef, five acrylic tunnels, murals and the Shark Ray Bay theater showcasing dive shows daily also are featured. Ring of Fire: World of the Octopus gives visitors a peek into the world of the shape-shifting, color-changing giant Pacific octopus and his underwater home of towering volcanoes along the Pacific Ring of Fire.

### NICHOLASVILLE

**CAMP NELSON HERITAGE NATIONAL MONUMENT** is 6 mi. s. on US 27 at 6614 Old Danville Rd. A supply and recruitment camp during the Civil War, Camp Nelson also was home to the families of enlisted African American soldiers during that conflict. The circa 1850 white-columned Oliver Perry mansion, the only remaining building of the original 300 in the camp, was seized in 1863 and used as officers' quarters.

The 525-acre park also contains a museum, a reconstructed fort and a replica of a barracks, as well as more than 5 miles of trails. The nearby Camp Nelson National Cemetery has the graves of 1.600 of the camp's soldiers. including 600 African Americans. The largest city in western Kentucky, Owensboro is on the banks of the Ohio River. Agriculture and industry play important roles in the economy. The agricultural basis centers on the production of corn, soybeans and tobacco. Industrial plants produce a diversity of manufactured products.

Known as Kentucky's Festival City as well as being designated a sports town. Owensboro holds more than 20 annual festivals and events. The Edge Ice Center, 1400 Hickman Ave., features ice skating, while the Diamond Lake Resort, west of town off SR 56, has 157 acres for fishing, camping and pedal-boating.



### **PADUCAH**

### • Hotels p. 115

Paducah (puh-DOO-ka), at the confluence of the Ohio and Tennessee rivers, was named by its founder, Gen. William Clark—of Lewis and Clark expedition fame—who named the settlement after the Padouca Indian Nation, A statue at Jefferson and 19th streets crafted by noted sculptor Lorado Taft honors the legendary and peaceful Chickasaw Indian leader Chief Paduke.

A series of colorful floodwall murals painted by internationally recognized artist Robert Dafford and the Dafford Murals Team give an account of the city's history; the murals are downtown between Kentucky Avenue and Jefferson Street.

A memorial statue of Alben W. Barkley, a native son who served as U.S. vice president under Harry Truman 1949-53, is at 28th Street and Jefferson Boulevard. Also notable is the city hall at 300 S. 5th St.; the building, a replica of the U.S. embassy in New Delhi, India, was designed by noted architect Edward Durell Stone.

Bob Noble Park, 3 miles northwest on US 60, has a medieval gate, winding driveways, a lake with a fountain, an outdoor theater, a swimming pool, picnic tables, a children's playground, a jogging trail, a skate park, disc golf course, tennis courts and a basketball court; phone (270) 444-8508.

Quilters from around the country converge on Paducah in late April for the American Quilter's Society Quilt Show & Contest. More than 500 guilts are displayed at the event, which also features vendor booths, a guilt making school, an auction and awards. Paintings, jewelry and other arts and crafts can be found in the colorful studios and galleries lining the streets of the 26-block Lower-Town Fine Arts District, located in one of Paducah's oldest neighborhoods. The Carson Center for the Performing Arts, 100 Kentucky Ave., offers traveling Broadway hits, theater, dance and musicals. Historic restoration in downtown Paducah is evident in the Historic Market House Square area. The Market House Theatre, 141 Kentucky Ave., hosts plays and musicals with local actors.

The Hotel Metropolitan, 724 Jackson St., was run by an African American woman, Maggie Steed, in 1909; the hotel closed in 1996. The hotel has attracted such distinquished quests as musicians Louis Armstrong, Cab Calloway, Duke Ellington and B.B. King, Major League Baseball Hall of Famers James "Cool Papa" Bell, Josh Gibson and Leroy "Satchel" Paige and U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall. The building now houses a museum with permanent exhibits focusing on

African American heritage, area history and the hotel's prominent guests; its rooms are furnished in varying periods to depict how they may have looked during the hotel's operation. Tours are available by appointment; phone (270) 443-7918.

**Shopping:** Kentucky Oaks Mall, with more than 100 shops, including Best Buy, Dillard's, JCPenney and Old Navy, is at I-24 exit 4. The historic downtown, midtown and southside areas offer antique shopping and specialty boutiques.

PADUCAH RAILROAD MUSEUM is at 200 Washington St. The museum offers a large collection of vintage railroad artifacts including tools, photographs, maps, signals, communication and dispatching equipment, a locomotive simulator and a large model train layout. Time: Allow 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (270) 908-6451.

RIVER DISCOVERY CENTER, 117 S. Water St., features interactive displays including a boat simulator; 24 Hours on the River; a river boat timeline; a rain table; a lock and dam; a dredge model; river habitats including turtles and other wildlife; a 16-minute river film; a Civil War exhibit; and a restored 1920s calliope. In a renovated two-story, brick, 1843 antebellum structure built to house a bank, the museum overlooks the confluence of the Ohio and Tennessee rivers.

THE NATIONAL QUILT MUSEUM is at 215 Jefferson St. The museum's permanent collection of more than 600 contemporary guilts and fiber art is one of

the country's largest. Three climate-controlled galleries celebrate the fabric medium and rotate 50-60 guilts of extraordinary and pictorial design, including a selection from the award-winning collection as well as changing exhibits featuring antique and thematic guilts. Another gallery displays to-scale miniature guilts, all 24 inches or smaller in size. The museum lobby's eight stained-glass windows are highlighted with designs inspired by guilt patterns.

A self-guiding tour delves into the origins of the guilts and their creators and explores traditional guilting styles and techniques. Activities, events and workshops are offered for experienced and novice guilters.

WHITEHAVEN, jct. I-24 and US 45 exit 7, at 1845 Lone Oak Rd., is an 1860s mansion remodeled in 1903 in the Classical Revival style. It contains a collection of Vice President Alben Barkley's memorabilia, including the first U.S. vice presidential flag.

Lee, furniture used by Ulysses S. Grant and the Lincolns, and highlights from landmark businesses and notable Paducah natives including Vice President Alben W. Barkley and John T. Scopes. 



### **PARIS**

### • Hotels p. 118

Paris, seat of Bourbon County, was first settled in 1776. Both the town and the county were named in appreciation for French aid during the Revolution, one for the capital of France and the other for the French ruling house. One of Kentucky's earliest distilleries named the liquor it produced for the county. Later "bourbon" was applied to any corn whiskey made with this distillery's formula.

The Duncan Tavern, 323 High St, has been in continuous use as a tavern or boarding house since its construction in 1788, four years prior to Kentucky being admitted into the union as the fifteenth state. Frontiersmen and pioneers Daniel Boone, Simon Kenton and Michael Stoner, as well as statesman Samuel Adams, were among the prominent visitors to the three-story stone building. The attached Anne Duncan house, built in 1801, features a genealogical library. The library is open and guided tours of the tavern are offered April through mid-December; phone (859) 987-1788.

Nearby horse farms include Denali Stud, Hillcroft Farm, Indian Creek Farm and Claiborne Farm, the spot where Triple Crown winner Secretariat is buried. They can be visited by appointment only. Also see Bluegrass Country p. 30.

CANE RIDGE MEETING HOUSE is 9 mi. e. via US 460 to SR 537/1655 Cane Ridge Rd. Built of blue ash logs by Scots-Irish pioneers in 1791, it was the site of an 1801 revival that led to the 1804 dissolution of the Springfield Presbytery. From this act came a new movement, the precursor to several modern-day churches including the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), the Christian

Churches and the Churches of Christ. The meeting house is encased in a limestone superstructure for preservation and unrestricted access.

### **PARK CITY**

HISTORIC DIAMOND CAVERNS, 1.2 mi, n, on SR 255 (Mammoth Cave Pkwy.) off I-65 exit 48, is one of the nation's oldest show caves. The caverns, with a constant temperature of 58°F, contain stalactite and stalagmite formations and drapery and flowstone deposits. One-hour, .5-mile guided tours are offered.

### **PIKEVILLE**

Pikeville, county seat to the state's largest county, is named for Gen. Zebulon M. Pike, a U.S. Army officer and explorer who discovered Pike's Peak in Colorado. A statue dedicated to Col. James A. Garfield, Union Army officer and 20th president of the United States, can be viewed in the Pikeville City Park.

The town is home to the Pikeville Cut-Through and Scenic Overlook, purportedly the second largest earthmoving project north of the Panama Canal. It took some 14 years to physically re-route the river and the railroad system to relieve the town from flooding when it was completely underwater 1957-77.

**Self-guiding tours:** A map for a self-guiding driving tour outlining the Hatfield-McCoy feud sites is available at the tourism office. One of the sites along the tour is the Historic Dills Cemetery, a resting place for several of the McCoy family members as well as the first integrated cemetery in eastern Kentucky.

BIG SANDY HERITAGE CENTER MUSEUM is at 172 Division St. The museum, in Pikeville's railroad depot, has exhibits that relate the history of this eastern Kentucky area. Visitors can see an 1860s log home, Civil War artifacts, early 20th-century railroad memorabilia and a tool collection. **Phone:** (606) 766-1025.

### RICHMOND

• Hotels p. 120

Named after the capital of Virginia, Richmond was the scene of a decisive Confederate victory in Kentucky. This major Civil War battle, waged Aug. 29-30, 1862, pitted Gen. William Nelson's Union forces against Gen. Kirby Smith's Confederate troops. Although the conflict originated 6 miles south of Richmond, a sharply contested retreat through the town left many buildings scarred.

Richmond is a farming, cattle ranching and industrial center as well as the home of Eastern Kentucky University. Arnim D. Hummel Planetarium, on the university's campus, offers shows on the first Saturday of the month; phone (859) 622-1547 for information.

FORT BOONESBOROUGH STATE PARK, off SR 627 to SR 388, contains a re-creation of the fort built by Daniel Boone in 1775. Artisans demonstrate 18th-century trades and skills, April through October. Films shown in the orientation blockhouse depict the pioneers' struggle at the fort. The Kentucky Museum offers insight into the lives of the families who lived in the area in the 1900s. Riverside interpretive trails pass native plants and unusual geological sites. Picnicking, camping, fishing, swimming and a miniature golf course are available. See Recreation Areas Chart.

WHITE HALL STATE HISTORIC SITE is off I-75 exit 95, w. .25 mi. on SR 627 to White Hall State exit 95, w. .25 mi. on SR 627 to White Hall State Shrine Rd., then following signs for 2 mi. An imposing 44room estate house in two architectural styles. White Hall was the home of emancipationist Cassius Marcellus Clay. The site, which is near the Kentucky River, covers 13 acres.

The first section, Clermont, was built by Clay's father in 1798 in a Georgian design. During the 1860s Cassius Clay annexed an Italianate front and side addition to the house, more than doubling the home's size. White Hall was the first house in the area to have central heating and indoor plumbing. Guides conduct 1-hour tours of the home.



### SHEPHERDSVILLE

Founded in 1793, Shepherdsville is the oldest town in Bullitt County and has served as its county seat since its inception in 1796. It is named after Adam Shepherd, a Maryland native who regularly visited the area to tend to

his father's interests, which included land grants and surveying. Shepherd built a mill and store and also designed the streets of the town, part of a 900-acre area he owned just north of the Salt River.

The salt production industry—the state's first—was Shepherdsville's focus in its earliest days. The area's abundance of salt was the result of a receding shallow ocean which covered Kentucky more than 350 million

years ago. Those who continued westward utilized the salt to preserve meats and other foods on their journeys. Mineral water from the Paroquet Springs spa, which opened in 1836, was said to have medicinal value; sufferers of a variety of ailments traveled to the town to drink and bathe in the spa's water. The iron-smelting industry also was prominent in Shepherdsville from 1830-80. The Belmont Iron Furnace, 3 miles south off SR 61, supplied much of the pig iron used during this time. It is one of the state's last remaining standing furnaces.

Shepherdsville Country Music Show, off I-65 exit 117 on SR 44, features live bluegrass and country music performed by local musicians. The bluegrass show is offered on Fridays from October through late April; the country show is held on Saturdays throughout the year. Phone (502) 543-6551 for show schedules and reservations.

BIG SOUTH FORK SCENIC RAILWAY, 1 mi. w. of US 27 on SR 92, offers a scenic 16-mile tour along Big South Fork, a branch of the Cumberland River, in enclosed and open-air excursion cars. Founded in 1793, Winchester was named after the former Virginia home of frontiersman John Baker who donated 66 acres of land for the town's creation. The town was given distinction by Henry Clay, "The Great Compromiser," when he made both his first and last Kentucky speeches in the city.

Early on, Winchester became the marketing center of the agricultural inner Bluegrass Region. Industrial enterprises and manufacturing supplement the economy. Also see Bluegrass Country p. 30.

Of interest off SR 1924 is the Civil War Fort at Boonesboro. Built by Union soldiers in 1863, the earthwork fortification was used to defend the ford and ferry at Boonesboro. Today visitors can hike the scenic trail with views of the Kentucky River and see a mural depicting the history of the river. Guided tours are offered by appointment; phone (859) 744-0556. Located on 240 acres of land, the Lower Howard's Creek Nature Preserve offers quided tours of its environment of native flora and fauna: phone (859) 744-4888.

Like the proverbial coin, there are two sides to Ohio. On one side you have the "three C's"—Cleveland, Cincinnati and Columbus. These major metropolitan areas offer big-city attractions: top-notch art museums, child-friendly science centers, world-class zoos, pro sports teams, ethnic festivals and razzle-dazzle annual events. It's a prominent facet of the Buckeye State.

But flip the coin and you'll discover the small towns and family-owned farms of Middle America. Here the reminders of a simpler time are evident in painstakingly restored historic villages and Amish-populated rural areas. Craft demonstrations, barn raisings and horsedrawn buggies are more characteristic of this side. Question: Which is the "real" Ohio? Answer: Both.

"Our position in the nation," one 19th-century historian wrote of his adopted state, "is peculiarly felicitous as to soil, climate and productions, and it will be our own fault if we are not the happiest people in the Union." And to many early settlers, success in this new frontier likely seemed guaranteed. As immigrants pushed westward along the Ohio River, river towns boomed. This wave of settlement came after the Revolutionary War, and Ohio became the first state to be carved from the Northwest Territory.

Due to an advantageous location on the Ohio River, Cincinnati became the first industrial city in what was then—before the era of westward expansion—

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considered the American West. By the late 19th century it was Cleveland's turn to boom. Proximity to coal fields in West Virginia and Pennsylvania and iron mines in Minnesota transformed this Great Lakes port into one of America's leading manufacturing centers. Recent decades have unfortunately not been as prosperous for this corner of the so-called "rust belt." It does, however, offer its share of tourist-worthy fare.

The Cleveland Museum of Art has ancient Egyptian statues as well as Impressionist masterpieces, while the Cleveland Museum of Natural History has dinosaur skeletons as well as a skeleton of an Australopithecus, a prehuman hominid known as "Lucy." And standing on the Lake Erie shoreline is the eye-popping glass-and-steel monument to a 4/4 backbeat: the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. You'll probably find at least a few of your faves among hall of fame inductees that range from Alice Cooper to ZZ Top.

### The Simple Life

On the other side of the Ohio coin are rustic locales that hark back to a time when life was less complicated

and moved at a slower pace. Surrender to nostalgia at Roscoe Village in Coshocton, a restored 1830s canal town where costumed interpreters demonstrate skills like candle dipping and tin punching. Hale Farm and Village, near Bath, and Historic Sauder Village, in Archbold, are other places to experience living history.

These restored villages carefully re-create the past, but if it's the real thing you're after, visit Amish country. The Amish and Mennonites of eastern Ohio shun modern conveniences, continuing a farming tradition that beguiles anyone who's ever bemoaned the harried pace of contemporary life. Note that the Amish do not like to be photographed, as their faith emphasizes modesty. Berlin is a good place to hop on a buggy, relax and get a taste of how the Amish handle their day. So flip a coin; either way you win.

### Recreation

Resorts along sandy stretches of Lake Erie beach offer activities for powerboaters and fans of other personal watercraft, and charter boats embark on fishing trips and diving excursions to shipwreck sites. When temperatures drop and the water freezes, ice shanty camps set up off the west shore of Put-in-Bay between Rattlesnake and Middle Bass islands.

Mohican State Park, near Mansfield, encompasses both the meandering Clear Fork River and dramatic Clear Fork Gorge. The river teems with brown trout, creating a paradise for fishing. The lower section of the river is the most accessible; a trail that follows the magnificent gorge (more than 1,000 feet wide and 300 feet deep) passes two waterfalls, offering both spectacular scenery and easy access for anglers.

In southern Ohio, Hocking State Forest has a climbing and rappelling area that challenges daredevils and those in enviable shape with formidable cliffs and sheer rock faces; the climbs range in height from 20 to 120 feet. Less adventurous outdoor enthusiasts can head to Hocking Hills State Park, where a concrete trail—accessible to the physically impaired and suitable for young kids—snakes past sandstone cliffs, carved gorges and a 90-foot waterfall on its way to Ash Cave.

Cleveland's 100-mile chain of metropolitan parks, known as the "Emerald Necklace," offers places to hike, boat, golf and go horseback riding and in-line skating during warm weather. Winter activities include tobogganing, cross-country skiing, sledding and

ice fishing. Cleveland Metroparks' Lakefront Reservation includes Edgewater Park, which is close to downtown and has two beaches, a **fishing** pier and boat ramps; scuba divers can explore a freshwater reef created by remnants of demolished Cleveland Municipal Stadium.

Go **biking**, hiking or cross-country skiing along the Ohio and Erie Canal Towpath Trail. Running the 22-mile length of Cuyahoga Valley National Park from Cleveland to Akron, it passes locks, spillways, an aqueduct and historic homes.

If you'd rather ride in a golf cart than lace up a pair of hiking boots, head for The Golf Center at Kings Island, in Mason (right outside Cincinnati). Take your pick of two courses: the Bruin is easy on duffers, while the challenging Grizzly is a championship layout designed in part by the Golden Bear himself, Jack Nicklaus. And for those not interested in following a little white ball, Kings Island has a day's worth of theme park thrill rides, roller coasters and other family-friendly diversions.

**SEAT BELT CHILD RESTRAINT LAWS:** Seat belts are required for driver and front-seat passengers ages 15 and over. Children ages 8-14 are required to be in either a child restraint or seat belt. Children ages 4-7, over 40 pounds and under 57 inches are required to be in a booster seat. Child restraints are required for children under age 4 or less than 40 lbs. AAA recommends the use of seat belts and appropriate child restraints for the driver and all passengers.

**CELLPHONE RESTRICTIONS:** Text messaging while driving is prohibited. Temporary instruction permit holders under age 18 and probationary license holders are prohibited from using any type of wireless device while driving. The use of handheld cellphones while driving is prohibited in several municipalities, including Beachwood, Brooklyn, Marietta, North Olmsted, North Royalton, South Euclid, Walton Hills and Woodmere.

**HELMETS FOR MOTORCYCLISTS:** Required for riders under age 18, all drivers during their first year of licensure and all passengers of riders required to wear a helmet.

**RADAR DETECTORS:** Permitted. Prohibited for use by commercial vehicles.

**MOVE OVER LAW:** Driver is required to slow down and vacate the lane nearest stopped police, fire, rescue and road maintenance vehicles using audible or flashing signals. The law includes recovery vehicles such as tow trucks, municipal vehicles and road maintenance vehicles.

The center of global rubber empires, Akron once led the world in the manufacturing of rubber products. Although local production is now minimal, Akron is still the corporate home of Goodyear. Akron also is a merchandising center—a vital distribution gateway between the industrial East and Midwest.

From the standpoint of scientific research, Akron is perhaps the nation's fastest growing city. The Firestone and Goodyear laboratories specialize in research involving rubber and plastics. Bridgestone Americas Center for Research and Technology is one of the leading labs in the field of polymers. The original space suits worn by U.S. astronauts were made and fitted at B.F. Goodrich. The University of Akron's College of Polymer Science and Polymer Engineering has gained renown for its work in combining molecules through chemical reactions.

The Akron area offers a variety of cultural and sporting activities, including events at The University of Akron's E.J. Thomas Hall. The Akron Civic Theatre, with its opulent design and ceiling replete with blinking stars and floating clouds, is one of the few remaining "atmospheric" theaters. Guided tours are offered monthly on the third Tuesday; phone (330) 535-3179.

The 1837 Greek Revival Perkins Stone Mansion, 550 Copley Rd., was home to Simon Perkins, the son of Akron founder Gen. Simon Perkins; he lived in the house with his wife and 11 children. Perkins and John Brown (who later became the famed abolitionist) were partners in the wool company Perkins and Brown for 10 years; Brown lived across the street 1844-46. Tours of both houses are available Wed.-Sat. 1-4, Apr.- Dec.; phone (330) 535-1120.

April through September, the Akron RubberDucks, the AA minor league baseball team affiliated with the Cleveland Guardians, plays at state-of-the-art Canal Park, on the corner of S. Main and W. Exchange streets.

In July Derby Downs is home to the annual All-American Soap Box Derby championship race. August brings the Bridgestone Invitational World Series of Golf.

AKRON ART MUSEUM, One S. High St. at jct. E. Market St., occupies a late 19th-century brick Italian Renaissance Revival structure—formerly the post office—and the 2007 John S. and James L. Knight Building, which integrates part of the historic building. The museum's permanent collection presents a distinctive look at regional, national and international art from 1850 to the present, with a strong focus on paintings, sculpture and photography. Artists represented include Chuck Close, Childe Hassam and Andy Warhol. Nearly a dozen changing exhibits are presented each year.

The 1-acre Bud and Susie Rogers Garden is on the grounds. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (330) 376-9185.

**AKRON ZOO** is at 505 Euclid Ave. Among the zoo's 700 animals are red pandas, Humboldt penguins, snow leopards, jaguars and three species of lemurs. The interactive Tiger Valley exhibit includes Sumatran tigers, sloth bears and lions. Grizzly Ridge features grizzly bears, bald eagles, otters, red wolves, coyotes and an aviary. Komodo dragons and Galapagos tortoises are among the favorites at Komodo Kingdom. Children may feed the animals at the Ohio Farmyard Encounter or take a train ride. The Lehner Family Zoo Gardens include more than 7,000 plants and flowers. The zoo is decked out in holiday lights during the Wild Lights event in December.

THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF PSYCHOLOGY is at the Drs. Nicholas and Dorothy Cummings Center for the History of Psychology, 73 S. College St., on The University of Akron campus. This museum is loaded with displays, hands-on exhibits and video clips of psychological tests, turn-of-the-century scientific instruments and visual illusions. Phone: (330) 972-7285.

STAN HYWET HALL & GARDENS, 714 N. Portage Path, is considered one of the finest examples of Tudor Revival architecture in the country. It was built 1912-15 for Frank A. Seiberling, co-founder of Goodyear and founder of Seiberling Rubber companies. The 65-room manor house contains art treasures from around the world. Features include an impressive music room and the three-story Great Hall. The Gate Lodge near the front gate was originally the estate superintendent's home. It was in the Gate Lodge that the first discussion of what would become Alcoholics Anonymous took place. An exhibit highlights the historic event.

Self-guiding and 1.25-hour guided tours are offered. The 1.5-hour Nooks & Crannies Manor House Tour takes visitors to additional areas of the house, including the

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domestic and service areas. The property also offers a restored English garden, a Japanese garden, a lagoon and scenic vistas. The 2.5-hour Grand Estate Tour includes



#### **ALLIANCE**

The Carnation City is home to the University of Mount Union (formerly Mount Union College), a small liberal arts school. The showpiece of this beautiful campus definitely worth driving through if you're in the area—is the five-story brick Chapman Hall. If you follow NCAA Division III football, you know about the Purple Raiders. The team holds 12 national titles, more than any other team in any division.

#### **ARCHBOLD**

In a region once known as the Great Black Swamp, Archbold is surrounded by fertile farmland. About 5 miles northwest of town is the 321-acre Goll Woods State Nature Preserve, an old-growth woods reminiscent of the Great Black Swamp; go north on SR 66 for 1.5 miles to Township Road F, then west for 3 miles to Township Road 26 and go south about a quarter-mile.

Archbold is home to one of the country's largest furniture manufacturers, Sauder Woodworking, and to ConAgra Foods, makers of such brands as La Chov. Healthy Choice and Chef Boyardee.

HISTORIC SAUDER VILLAGE is on SR 2, .5 mi. e. of SR 66. This living-history village tells the story of the early settlers of Ohio's Great Black Swamp. The village includes more than 40 historic homes and shops.

Costumed guides bring history to life in the homes, schools, barbershop, doctor's office and more.

There are cooking, farming and other period demonstrations that change with the season. Working craftspeople include a potter, glassblower, blacksmith, woodworker, spinner, weaver, cooper, broom maker and tinsmith. The village also includes a turn-of-the-20th-century homestead with a barn and animals, a Native American village, a pioneer settlement area and a museum. At Little Pioneers Homestead children can "play pioneer" in the cabin, barn and garden. Carriage and train rides are available. The village also hosts many events during the season.

Founded in 1815 and situated in the rolling hills of mainly agricultural Ashland County, Ashland maintains a prosperous economy thanks to light industry and its location off I-71 approximately halfway between Cleveland and Columbus. The city is home to the 6,000-student Ashland University, the Ashbrook Center and Ashland Theological Seminary.

During the summer months, a variety of free concerts are performed Thursdays and Sundays at the Guy Chase Myers Memorial Band Shell. The city also serves as a base for visitors to Charles Mill Lake and Pleasant Hill Lake recreational areas, Mohican State Park and Malabar Farm State Park, all of which lie in towns within 20 miles south of Ashland, See Recreation Areas Chart.

## **ASHTABULA**

Moses Cleaveland's 1796 discovery of a harbor in northeast Ohio on Lake Erie led to the settlement of Ashtabula, a major coal and iron port. In addition to its role as a manufacturing center, the city also is a waterfront resort and home to a 1,500-student regional campus of Kent State University.

Walnut Beach, on Lake Erie at Walnut Boulevard and Lake Avenue, is a municipal park with a white sand beach, tennis courts, a playground and picnic facilities: food is available. Lake Shore Park, northeast of Walnut Beach on SR 531, has a boat ramp, picnic area, playground and concessions. The parks close at dusk.

Nearby countryside offers opportunities for scenic drives visiting the county's covered bridges. In late August 2008 a dedication ceremony took place for the county's 17th bridge, which, at 613 feet, makes it the nation's longest covered bridge. The structure—Smolen-Gulf Bridge, Ashtabula County Highway 25—spans the Ashtabula River and was named for former Ashtabula County engineer and longtime covered bridge advocate John Smolen.

The 43-mile Western Reserve Greenway trail begins in Ashtabula and heads south to Warren. The trail offers opportunities for biking, hiking and horseback riding.

**Self-quiding tours:** Brochures outlining Ashtabula County's scenic charms—five self-guiding driving tours featuring Western Reserve architecture, 18 covered bridges, more than 60 quilt barns and nearly two dozen wineries—are available from the Ashtabula County Convention and Visitors Bureau in Austinburg. Quilt barns display colorful guilt patterns on barn exteriors for passersby to enjoy; they celebrate the area's guilting and rural heritage.

**Shopping:** Historic Ashtabula Harbor District, 5 miles north of I-90 on SR 11, then 1 mile west on SR 531, features specialty shops.

HUBBARD HOUSE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD MU-SEUM is at jct. Walnut Blvd. and Lake Ave. The 1840s brick house was an important stop on the Underground Railroad, the network of abolitionist-run safe houses that helped slaves escape to freedom before the Civil War. Fugitive slaves waited in the house until a ship arrived to take them to Canada. The house, furnished in period, contains exhibits relating to the Underground Railroad, the Civil War and local history.



#### BAINBRIDGE

Once the land of the Shawnee, Bainbridge was founded in 1805 by surveyor Nathaniel Massie, a wealthy landowner from Chillicothe. This rural trade center became known as the "cradle of American dentistry" after the profession's first school was established by Dr. John Harris in 1827.

The David Berger National Memorial recognizes the Cleveland-born weightlifter, who was among the 11 Israeli athletes killed by Palestinian terrorists at the 1972 Munich Olympics. The sculpture by David E. Davis, which features five broken rings, is open daily 24 hours on the grounds of the Mandel Jewish Community Center of Cleveland, at 26001 S. Woodland Rd.

MALTZ MUSEUM OF JEWISH HERITAGE is off GEN I-271 Chagrin Blvd. exit, 1 mi. w. on Chagrin Blvd., then .6 mi. n. to 2929 Richmond Rd. The structure was built with Golden Jerusalem limestone, which was mined and hand-chiseled in southern Israel. In the lobby, a timeline introduces visitors to key events in world history, but it may not always be on view. Artwork, artifacts, films, interactive exhibits, oral histories and photographs are all put to use telling stories about Cleveland history, Jewish heritage and the corrosive effects of hate and intolerance. A 7-minute orientation film is shown in a 60-seat theater.

Each of seven themed areas is dedicated to sharing a piece of the main story-from immigration to assimilation—and all the culture, religion, joys and heartaches that accompanied the process are woven throughout. An emphasis is placed on Cleveland's Jewish immigrants, the role they played in the city's history and how they were affected by the atrocities of World War II. A highlight of the facility is the Temple-Tifereth Israel Gallery, where Judaica is displayed, including textiles, sacred objects, works of art and Israeli stamps. Special exhibitions from museums around the country, as well as those created in-house, are presented year-round.





The magnificent late 19th-century Wood County Courthouse at E. Court and N. Prospect St. is a must-see if you're visiting or just passing through Bowling Green. A highlight of the structure is the 185-foot granite clock tower.

The city is probably best known as the home of Bowling Green State University, founded in 1910 and now home to more than 20,000 students on its main campus. The northwest entrance to the campus (Poe Road at N. College Dr.) features a piece of public art entitled "The



#### BURTON

Burton, the oldest settlement in the Western Reserve, was founded in 1798. The town retains its historic charm, being built around a typical New England village green, with school, church and several lovely 19th-century homes. The town is on the western edge of the fourth largest Amish community in the world, and horse-drawn buggies can be seen traveling around the square. The square is also home to the Burton Log Cabin, a working sugar house. It was built in 1931 and several additions were added through 1962. During the maple sugaring season, sap is collected from nearby trees and then boiled to make maple syrup. Maple candy is made yearround. The gift shop sells maple products made on-site.

Burton is the home of The Great Geauga County Fair, Ohio's oldest fair. The fair was founded in 1823 and is held Thursday through Monday every Labor Day weekend. More than 2,000 exhibitors enter more than 13,000 exhibits to intrigue and delight more than 200,000 visitors. For more information phone (440) 834-1846.





Cambridge was the boyhood home of actor William Boyd, born in nearby Hendrysburg in 1895, who became famous for his film and television role as Hopalong Cassidy.

The Guernsey County Historical Society Museum, 218 N. 8th St., is a restored early 19th-century house containing Cambridge memorabilia from the town's beginning through the present; phone (740) 439-5884.

The holidays are particularly festive in downtown Cambridge. From November 1 to early January the Dickens Victorian Village is set up along Wheeling Avenue. Ninetythree scenes populated by handcrafted mannequins dressed in period clothing are set up at each lamppost and bench between 6th and 11th streets; they depict Dickens-era activities and some of his literary characters, including Bob Cratchit and Tiny Tim. Downtown retailers have brochures available. For more holiday merriment, stop by the 1881 Guernsey County Courthouse on an evening from early November to early January; each night it is lit with 30,000 lights set to holiday music.

Canton derived its name from the wealthy estate near Baltimore, where Bezaleel Wells lived before settling in Ohio around 1805. Although Canton grew into a major industrial center, the city maintains an informal neatness dating from the 19th century, when immigrant Swiss and German watchmakers influenced city planning.

Canton was the home of President William McKinley. He attended the Church of the Savior United Methodist at Cleveland Avenue and W. Tuscarawas Street. Four memorial windows presented by Mrs. McKinley adorn the structure.

In 1918, after delivering a speech in Canton, one-time Socialist presidential candidate Eugene V. Debs was arrested for violating the Espionage Act of 1917.





Founded in 1796, Chillicothe served as capital of the Northwest Territory and was governed by Gen. Arthur St. Clair 1800-02. The city was host to the state's first constitutional convention in 1802, and Chillicothe was Ohio's first capital. Today it is an industrial center surrounded by a productive agricultural region.

Chillicothe is at the junction of two scenic highways. A picturesque portion of SR 159 runs 34 miles southwest from Lancaster, while an impressive portion of US 50 runs 19 miles northeast from Bainbridge.

At 90 W. Sixth St. you'll find the Lucy Hayes Heritage Center, which was the birthplace and childhood home of First Lady Lucy Ware Webb Hayes, who was born Aug. 28, 1831. In 1852 she married Rutherford B. Hayes, who was later elected the nation's president in 1877. The restored house has period furnishings and photos of the family, but there are no items that belonged to them. Tours are given Fri.-Sat. 1-4, Apr.-Sept.; other times by appointment. Phone (740) 775-5829.

A 12,500-square-foot visitor center offers interactive exhibits about early 1800s life in Ohio; five outbuildings and formal gardens are on

the grounds. An overlook provides a view of the hills that are reproduced on the state seal. The mansion may only be seen via a guided tour.

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# Then & Now

Winston Churchill called Cincinnati "the most beautiful of America's inland cities." Its location has much to do with its aesthetic appeal and stable business community. On the Ohio River's north shore, the downtown section is in a basin surrounded by hills.

Cincinnati was platted in 1788 by three land speculators. In 1789 Fort Washington was built to protect the settlers from the Native Americans, but the area only became open for further settlement with the defeat of the Ohio Indians at Fallen Timbers in 1794. Cincinnati's accessibility increased in 1811 with the arrival of the *New Orleans*, the first steamboat to reach its shores.

The construction of the Miami and Erie canals in the late 1820s provided farmers with transportation to the city where they could market their produce. Businessmen created new industries to process raw products into marketable whiskey, pork and flour. Plagued by religious and political conflicts, many Germans immigrated in the 1830s, followed in the 1840s by Irish driven from their country by the potato famine.

By 1850 Cincinnati was the world's largest pork-packing center, a status that brought the nickname Porkopolis.

The South became the city's major market. This caused residents' loyalties to be divided with the approach of the Civil War, but the city eventually supported the Union forces. For a long time it had been a major stop on the Underground Railroad.

Following the war, Cincinnati experienced another burst of prosperity as the resumption of trade between North and South created heavy river commerce. In the 1870s Cincinnati businessmen arranged for the building of a railroad to reach their southern markets.

Modern Cincinnati attracts many companies, including many corporate headquarters and Fortune 500 companies like Kroger, Macy's, Procter & Gamble and Convergys. Fountain Square is the hub. Centered on the historic 1871 Tyler Davidson Fountain, which tops a large underground garage, the square is surrounded by modern office buildings, hotels, shops and restaurants.

Cincinnati is also home to the 45,000-student University of Cincinnati, founded in 1819, and 7,000-student Xavier University, founded in 1831.

**RAIL SERVICE:** The Amtrak station, (800) 872-7245, is at 1301 Western Ave. inside historic Union Terminal.

**BUSES:** Greyhound Lines Inc., (800) 231-2222, 1005 Gilbert Ave., is the major company serving the city. Megabus, (877) 462-6342, offers routes to several cities.

**TAXIS:** Taxis are metered and charge \$4 for a pickup and \$2 per mile. There is no charge for additional passengers. Taxis can be hailed at downtown hotels or ordered by phone. Companies include Cincinnati Taxi Inc., (513) 666-2184, and Towne Taxi, (513) 761-7700.

**PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION:** Metro operates buses throughout the metropolitan area. The base fare is \$1.75. Exact change is required, and zone and transfer charges are additional. Signs at many bus stops list the numbers of the routes that stop there.

It's not all business in Cincinnati, though. Washington Park offers abundant green space and performance areas. The riverfront is a great destination for finding fun things to do outdoors. Bicentennial Commons at Sawyer Point features playgrounds, a skating pavilion, and tennis and volleyball courts as well as two performance venues and plaques relating tidbits of Cincinnati history. Yeatman's Cove is adorned with the Serpentine Wall, which runs along the river. A 30-foot steamboat paddle wheel that blows steam and plays music is a monument acknowledging the city's riverboat heritage.

The Newport Southbank Bridge, known as the Purple People Bridge thanks to a distinctive paint choice, is a pedestrian bridge linking the Cincinnati riverfront with Newport, Ky., and a nice place to watch river traffic. Smale Riverfront Park enhances the riverfront with a promenade, playground, carousel, gardens, interactive fountains, an event stage and a monument to the Black Brigade.

There are many fun places to go for indoor entertainment, too, including the complex at the Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal, a beautiful restored Art Deco-style train station. One stop offers the Cincinnati

History Museum, the Cincinnati History Library and Archives, the Duke Energy Children's Museum, the Museum of Natural History & Science and the Robert D. Lindner Family OMNIMAX Theater.


For fans of the performing arts who are looking for fun things to do, Cincinnati offers venues both large and small. Catch the Cincinnati Ballet, Broadway shows and children's theater at The Aronoff Center for the Arts downtown.

A trio of sports venues parallels the Ohio River. The Reds play baseball at Great American Ball Park, football's Bengals compete in the Paul Brown Stadium and hockey and other events take place at U.S. Bank Arena.

# Must Do: AAA Editor's Picks

- Clip-clop through downtown on a horse-drawn carriage ride offered by one of the companies stationed near Fountain Square (Fifth and Vine sts.), Cincinnati's entertainment hub where you'll find plenty of things to do. Don't forget to snap some photos of the iconic 1871 Tyler Davidson Fountain before or after your tour.
- Pay a visit to the ☆ Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal (1301 Western Ave.), home to three stellar museums and a state-of-the-art theater. Learn about the Queen City's past at the ☆ Cincinnati History Museum, stroll through prehistoric landscapes at the ৵ Museum of Natural History & Science, let the kids take charge at the The Children's Museum and become immersed in breathtaking films at the Robert D. Lindner Family OMNIMAX Theater.
- Meet all sorts of fascinating creatures—from Bengal tigers to horned puffins to dart frogs—in a beautiful garden setting at the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden (3400 Vine St.). Be sure to check the schedule for the always-amusing shows and feedings, and if you happen to be visiting during the holiday season, don't miss the spectacular PNC Festival of Lights event.
- See a Reds—the world's first pro baseball team—ballgame or go on Great American Ball Park Tours' (100 Joe Nuxhall Way) guided behind-the-scenes tour of the Reds' 42,271-seat stadium.
- Reflect on Cincinnati's role in the fight for freedom at the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center (50 E. Freedom Way). Interactive exhibits, professional displays, special-effects films and a children's gallery portray the history of slavery in North America, focusing on the secret network followed by thousands of fugitive slaves seeking liberty.

- Shop 'til you drop, then linger over food or drinks in Mount Adams (just north of downtown), one of Cincinnati's most exclusive residential and business districts. Reminiscent of San Francisco, this hip, architecturally stunning hilltop community features narrow streets and an eclectic mix of places to eat, bars and specialty stores. Many restaurant decks afford panoramas of downtown, the Ohio River and parts of Kentucky.
- Explore Eden Park (950 Eden Park Dr.), a lovely 186-acre green space linked to Mount Adams by the Art Deco-style Ida Street Viaduct. Walk or jog along worn paths and soak up views of the lakes, gardens, memorial tree groves and other landmarks; peruse 6,000 years' worth of captivating art and artifacts at the ☆ Cincinnati Art Museum (953 Eden Park Dr.); enter greenhouses filled with tropical and desert plants, orchids and bonsai at Krohn Conservatory (1501 Eden Park Dr.); or watch a modern American or European drama at Playhouse in the Park (962 Mt. Adams Cir.).
- Get tickets to see a show at either the Aronoff Center for the Arts (650 Walnut St.) or Music Hall (1241 Elm St.)—stylistically different but equally lovely

buildings. The pair houses many of the city's music, theater and dance companies.

- Eyeball some world-class pieces at the Taft Museum of Art (316 Pike St.). Displayed in an 1820 Palladian mansion that's a work of art in itself, the museum's outstanding collection includes sculpture, Chinese porcelains, old masters paintings, European decorative arts, antique watches and more.
- Brave The Beast and the Diamondback, two roller coasters guaranteed to make you scream, or perhaps the Banshee, the world's longest inverted roller coaster. Kings Island in nearby Mason (6300 Kings Island Dr.) is a destination that thrills families not only with hair-raising rides but also with live stage shows, animatronic dinosaurs, a Peanuts-themed kiddie area, and a water park featuring slides, wave pools and tropical lagoons.

# **Arriving**

# By Car

Cincinnati straddles I-75, one of the nation's major north-south routes, shuttling traffic from the Canadian border to the north and Florida's Gulf Coast to the south. A shorter artery, I-71, angles through the city, providing a fast route from Louisville, central Ohio and Lake Erie cities.

Both routes join in the Kentucky suburbs to cross the river via the Brent Spence Bridge. From the north they follow separate alignments to the river but are connected across Ohio suburban areas by the Norwood Lateral Expressway (SR 562) and the Ronald Reagan Cross County Highway (SR 126).

I-71 and I-75 provide good access from I-70, a major transcontinental route that bisects Ohio some 55 miles north of the city, and each interchanges with primary city streets.

US 50 and scenic US 52 funnel east-west travelers to the city from the Indiana and Ohio countrysides; these older roads accommodate mostly local traffic. US 52 offers a scenic trip along the Ohio River east of Cincinnati.

I-74 is the principal link from the west, collecting traffic from some of the nation's busiest thoroughfares, I-80 and I-70, as well as highways from the Chicago area. SR 32 (Appalachian Highway) is a good route from rural areas east of the city.

I-275 (Circle Freeway) swings in a full orbit through the Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana environs. It provides a complete bypass of the city proper and interchanges with all major intersecting routes for easy access to downtown. I-471 offers an additional spur from the Kentucky portion of this circumferential highway into downtown via the Daniel Carter Beard Bridge (colloquially known as the Big Mac Bridge).

# **Getting Around**

# Street System

With the aid of a good city map, driving in Cincinnati is relatively easy. The downtown area is laid out in a grid pattern with streets running either north-south or eastwest. The numbered streets run east-west beginning with 2nd Street near the Ohio River; named north-south streets intersect them. East-west address numbers start at Vine Street.

Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit on most streets is 25 or 30 mph. Rush-hour traffic, 7-9 a.m. and 3-6 p.m., should be avoided. Right turns on red are permitted unless otherwise posted.



# **Parking**

Metered parking is found on many downtown streets; be sure to check signs and meters for restricted times and limits. There are several commercial garages and lots, and most hotels provide parking for guests. Municipal garage rates vary but generally are \$2 for the first 2 hours, \$1 for each additional hour up to \$15 per day.

# **Shopping**

Whether you are looking for designer fashions or clothing from grandmother's attic, it can be found in Cincinnati's array of department stores, boutiques and specialty shops. Downtown offers Brooks Brothers, Macy's, Saks Fifth Avenue and Tiffany & Co.

Trendsetters will want to plan a trip to **Mount Adams**, a San Francisco-style hillside shopping and dining destination. Novelty shops and fashion boutiques are scattered among local restaurants, nightspots and parks. Collegiate-style attire is found in **Clifton**, where many shops cater to University of Cincinnati students.

Consumer frenzy also can be satisfied at shopping malls, including **Eastgate Mall**, I-275 exit 63B; **Florence Mall**, in Florence, Ky.; **Kenwood Towne Centre**, off I-71N exit 12 or I-71S exit 11 at 7875 Montgomery Rd.; **Northgate Mall**, I-275 exit 33; and **Tri-County Mall**, I-275 exit 42. **Rookwood Commons & Pavilion**, off I-71 exit 6, houses around 45 upscale shops, and **Crestview Hills Town Center** in Crestview Hills, Ky., offers 300,000 square feet of shops and places to eat.

Bargain hunters will love the **Cincinnati Premium Outlets** only 30 miles north of downtown. Die-hard discount shoppers can travel 60 miles northeast to **Tanger Outlets** in Jeffersonville, Ohio (8000 Factory Shops Blvd.).

**Findlay Market**, Race and Elder streets, is an open-air marketplace that is a Cincinnati tradition. In operation since 1852, it offers a variety of ethnic foods within an old world atmosphere.

# **Big Events**

May is a busy event month. The **Cincinnati Flying Pig Marathon**, held the first weekend of the month, draws runners of all abilities, and entertainment and events are offered, too. The **Appalachian Festival**, held at **Coney Island**, is said to be the largest craft show in the nation.

During two weekends in May, the city's renowned music community celebrates **May Festival**, the oldest continuing festival of choral and orchestral music in the United States. The tradition began in 1873; performances consist of a 150-voice chorus accompanied by the Cincinnati Symphony and joined by top-name guest conductors and opera singers.

Restaurateurs show off their talents on Memorial Day weekend during the **Taste of Cincinnati**, a sidewalk smorgasbord along **Fifth Street at Fountain Square**.

Cincinnati heralds the summer season with its **Summerfair** in early summer. More than 300 artists gather at Coney Island and display their works, while musicians perform classical, pop, country and jazz music.

Summer also offers music festivals. The 3-day **Bunbury Music Festival** in June features alternative music acts at **Sawyer Point** and **Yeatman's Cove.** The **Cincinnati Music Festival** in July offers 2 days of hip hop, R&B, jazz and soul music at **Paul Brown Stadium.** The summer draws to a close in September with Cincinnati's **Riverfest** on the Sunday of Labor Day. In honor of their river heritage, more than 500,000 people gather along the riverfront in both Ohio and Kentucky to watch water skiing, sky




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diving and air shows, and enjoy riverboat cruises. The festival climaxes with a spectacular fireworks display accompanied by a soundtrack broadcast by radio station WEBN (102.7 FM).

Another major end-of-summer event is the **Green Township Harvest Home Fair**, held the weekend following Labor Day in nearby Cheviot. A parade marks the traditional kickoff for what is dubbed "the biggest little fair in Ohio." Fairgoers can view horse, artwork and flower shows or attend a 4-H auction, among other fun things to do. Food, drink and stage entertainment are available.

With more than half the city's population of German ancestry, it is little wonder **Oktoberfest Zinzinnati** is celebrated with almost as much vigor as its counterpart in Munich, Germany. Attracting more than 500,000 people, it is said to be the largest such celebration in the country.

During a mid-September weekend, six blocks of downtown around Fountain Square are transformed into a German biergarten, complete with music, dancing, singing and, of course, lots of sauerkraut and beer. Be sure to take part in one of the world's largest chicken dances.

Coney Island celebrates autumn with its **Fall-O-Ween Festival**, held several weekends in October.

At the PNC Festival of Lights at the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden, more than 2 million lights bedeck the grounds from late November to early January. Visitors and locals alike enjoy ice-skating at the ice rink on Fountain Square from November through February. Another festive winter event is Holiday Junction featuring the Duke Energy Holiday Trains display at the Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal. This is one of the largest portable train models in the world with 1,000 feet of track.

# Sports & Rec

Cincinnati's city parks, Hamilton County's 17 parks and several state parks are easily accessible to Cincinnati visitors looking for adventurous things to do. Among these choices, the sports-minded can find facilities for almost any activity. Many of the parks have tennis courts, camping sites and lakes for boating, fishing and swimming.

**Bicycling** fans can rent a bike at **Smale Riverfront Park's** Cincinnati Bike Center (120 E. Mehring Way); phone (513) 282-4260. Red Bike has many bike rental locations throughout Cincy and northern Kentucky; phone (513) 621-2453.

Hiking trails are plentiful, especially at Mount Airy Forest. Eden Park, 186 acres off Gilbert Avenue between Elsinore and Morris, offers picnic facilities, lakes for ice-skating and an exercise course. An enjoyable activity is a stroll along the riverfront at Bicentennial Commons at Sawyer Point or Yeatman's Cove Park. For information about city park facilities phone (513) 352-4080.

There are many **golf** courses in the area, including seven city-owned and seven county-owned courses. The most well-known course is **The Golf Center at Kings Island**, (513) 398-7700, with two Jack Nicklaus-designed courses.

For those more interested in spectator sports, the city has much to offer. When in the Queen City, if your favorite **baseball** team is not the **Cincinnati Reds**, it is best to keep that fact under your hat. World Series winners in 1919, 1940, 1975, 1976 and 1990 and National League division champs in 2012, the Big Red Machine has a large following. The Reds play at **Great American Ball Park** 

(see attraction listing p. 178); for ticket and schedule information phone (513) 765-7000.

When all eyes turn from the diamond to the gridiron, **football's Cincinnati Bengals** become the city's stars. The team plays at **Paul Brown Stadium**, which opened in 2000. They gained a lofty status when they captured the 1981 and 1988 American Football Conference championships. For ticket and schedule information phone (513) 621-8383 or (866) 621-8383.

Hockey fans can head to U.S. Bank Arena October through March to root for the ECHL's two-time Kelly Cup winner Cincinnati Cyclones; phone (513) 421-7825 for ticket information. Tennis fans won't want to miss the Western & Southern Open in August in nearby Mason; phone (513) 651-0303 or (800) 745-3000 for ticket information.

Perhaps because of Cincinnati's proximity to Kentucky, horse racing events are popular. Belterra Park, (513) 232-8000, at 6301 Kellogg Ave., offers Thoroughbred racing late April through Labor Day and simulcast racing daily year-round. Miami Valley Gaming, about 30 miles northeast in Lebanon at 6000 SR 63, features live harness racing early January to early May and simulcast racing daily year-round; phone (513) 934-7070 or (855) 946-6847. Turfway Park, about 10 miles south off I-75 exit 182 at 7500 Turfway Rd. in Florence, Ky., is the scene of Thoroughbred racing September to mid-October and December through March; phone (859) 371-0200 or (800) 733-0200 for dates. The **Kentucky Speedway**, in nearby Sparta, Ky., hosts automobile racing June through September; phone (859) 578-2300 or (888) 652-7223 for ticket information.

**Note:** Policies vary concerning admittance of children to pari-mutuel betting facilities. Phone for information.

# **Performing Arts**

The city's premier arts and entertainment destination is the **Aronoff Center for the Arts**, 650 Walnut St. between 6th and 7th streets; phone (513) 721-3344 or (513) 621-2787 for tickets. The center's three theaters present more than 10,000 exhibits and performances throughout the year, including Broadway shows and children's theater. In addition, the center is the main performance hall for the **Cincinnati Ballet**; phone (513) 621-5219 for information or (513) 621-5282 for tickets.

Other professional theaters include **Playhouse in the Park**, (513) 421-3888, with its two theaters, the **Robert S. Marx** and the **Thompson Shelterhouse**, on Mount Adams Circle in Eden Park. These stages present modern American and European plays September through June.

The **Ensemble Theatre of Cincinnati**, (513) 421-3555, downtown at 1127 Vine St., presents live theatrical shows from September through May. Performances of new plays and well-known modern works are given Tuesday through Saturday evenings and Sunday afternoons.

The **Cincinnati Shakespeare Company**, at 719 Race St., performs eight to nine classic plays as well as some free traveling performances throughout the summer months; phone (513) 381-2273 for additional information.

Music Hall, 1241 Elm St., was built by philanthropic leaders in 1878 and is fondly referred to as the Grand Dame of the Queen City. The interior of the red brick building is adorned with crystal chandeliers. The hall is a fitting home to the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra and the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra; phone (513) 381-3300. The Cincinnati Opera, America's second oldest opera company, also performs in Music Hall; its mid-June to late July season includes grand operas, operettas and musicals. Phone (513) 241-2742 for more information.

The **University of Cincinnati's College-Conservatory of Music** at Jefferson Avenue and Corry Boulevard makes impressive contributions to the area's music scene. A prominent music school, the 1,400-student college offers a variety of performing arts entertainment, ranging from opera and musical theater to dance and drama. If you're looking for things for couples to do, the conservatory offers more than 1,000 performances a year and many of them are free; phone (513) 556-4183 for schedule and ticket information.

Concerts by popular entertainers and groups are often held at the **Riverbend Music Center**, (513) 232-6220, the summer home of the Cincinnati Symphony and the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra. The **Cincinnati Gardens**, (513) 631-7793, and the **U.S. Bank Arena**, (513) 421-4111, also host many entertainment and sporting events.

**AMERICAN SIGN MUSEUM** is at 1330 Monmouth Ave. in the Camp Washington neighborhood. This impressive collection of 19th- and 20th-century American signs features an array of themes and is very well organized. Visitors will journey through the history of signage and learn all about the types of signs that have graced walls and buildings over the years, including gold leaf on glass signs, non-illuminated painted signs, plastic signs and neon signs.

The collection also includes equipment, materials and tools as well as architectural models, archival material,

artwork, photographs and sales samples. **Phone:** (513) 541-6366. GT

CINCINNATI ART MUSEUM is off I-71 exit 2 at 953 Eden Park Dr., following signs to Eden Park. The museum's more than 67,000 objects showcase visual arts from major civilizations over the past 6,000 years through sculpture, paintings, prints, photographs, textiles and decorative arts. Masterpieces from such artists as Claude Monet, Pablo Picasso and Vincent van Gogh are on display as well as artifacts from Ancient Egypt, Rome and Greece. Asian, African and Native American works of art also are included.

The Cincinnati Wing features more than 500 works of art by, for and about Cincinnatians from 1788 to the present. **Phone:** (513) 721-2787 or (877) 472-4226.

CINCINNATI MUSEUM CENTER AT UNION TER-MINAL is off I-75 at Ezzard Charles Dr. to 1301 Western Ave. The center hosts traveling exhibitions and is home to Cincinnati History Museum; Duke Energy Children's Museum; Museum of Natural History & Science; Cincinnati Historical Society Library; and Robert D. Lindner Family OMNIMAX Theater. The restored 1933 Art Deco-style train station was a major departure point for troops during World War II. The building features several large mosaic tile murals created in the 1930s.

The Children's Museum is on the grounds of Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal at 1301 Western Ave. The museum's hands-on exhibit areas are designed for infants to 10-year-olds. Kids can explore a two-story tree house in The Woods; explore the power of simple machines in The Energy Zone; discover how a community works in Kids' Town; let imaginations run wild through science, play, art, creativity and exploration in the interactive KidSpace; and practice proper oral health while climbing into a giant mouth in Inside the Grin. Also included are indoor play areas for infants and toddlers.

Cincinnati History Museum is on the grounds of Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal at 1301 Western Ave. Exhibits relate the history of Cincinnati and include a re-creation of the 1850s Public Landing, with a 94-foot side-wheel steamboat that can be boarded; vintage automobiles; a 1920s streetcar; and an S-scale model of the city 1900-40, complete with working trains and trolleys. A research library contains local historical

Museum of Natural History & Science is on the grounds of Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal at 1301 Western Ave. Permanent and changing interactive exhibits include a replica of a limestone cavern with underground waterfalls and 500 feet of trails, dinosaur fossils, a hands-on discovery center for children and an Ice Age trail that re-creates a prehistoric environment. Note: The museum is closed Tues.-Wed. Phone: (513) 287-7000.

The Nancy & David Wolf Holocaust & Humanity Center, 1301 Western Ave., is in the historic Union Terminal, the site where many Holocaust survivors arrived in Cincinnati to rebuild their lives. The Holocaust and Humanity Center aims to ensure the lessons of the past inspire action today. Through innovative storytelling, interactive experiences and genuine artifacts, visitors witness the strength and courage of the human spirit set against the backdrop of one of the darkest chapters in Human History. Note: The exhibit is not recommended for children under age 10. The center is closed Mon-Tues. Phone: (513) 487-3055.

Robert D. Lindner Family OMNIMAX Theater, on the grounds of Cincinnati Museum Center at Union Terminal at 1301 Western Ave., features a 5-story dome screen and a digital state-of-the art sound system. Exciting new films typically open every four months. Phone: (513) 287-7000.

CINCINNATI ZOO AND BOTANICAL GARDEN is reached via I-75 exit 6, following signs to 3400 Vine St. In a garden setting, the zoo houses some of the world's rarest animals, including cheetahs, elephants and manatees. Nearly two dozen areas include Manatee Springs, where the residents include manatees, alligators and crocodiles; the Jungle Trail's orangutans; Elephant Reserve; Giraffe Ridge; and Lords of the Arctic, featuring an underwater view of two polar bears.

In Night Hunters, observe the behaviors of clouded leopards, vampire bats and a Burmese python. Come face-to-face with the zoo's big cats at Cat Canyon, home to tigers, snow leopards and cougars. At Spaulding Children's Zoo kids can have close encounters with gentle creatures. Africa Habitat offers open-air views of a sprawling savanna, African painted dogs, African lions, giraffes and meerkats. Africa's newest addition is Hippo Cove, where visitors are treated to underwater views of the famous baby hippo Fiona and her mother, Bibi.

More than 3,000 varieties of plants grace the 75-acre grounds. Themed gardens include a butterfly garden, an



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African violet garden, a rain garden and an endangered plant species garden. Seasons determine the types of items you'll see; for instance, the more than 100,000 spring tulips are a highlight and in winter fruits and berries set the holiday tone. A botanical center offers interactive children's displays.

Train rides are available as well as seasonal carousel rides, Kanga Klimb climbing course and animal encounters. Brochures for themed self-guiding tours can be picked up at the Harold C. Schott Education Center. **Phone:** (513) 281-4700.

CONEY ISLAND is off I-275 exit 72 at 6201 Kellogg Ave. The park offers a huge range of recreational activities. Visitors can swim in Sunlite Adventure, which features Sunlite Pool, Typhoon Tower and four waterslides.

**KROHN CONSERVATORY** is off I-71 Reading Rd. exit, then 1 mi. e. to 1501 Eden Park Dr., following signs. The Art Deco-styled greenhouse features six collections, including seasonal floral displays among citrus trees in the Floral House. Bromeliads and ferns as well as papaya, vanilla and guava plants tempt the senses in the Tropical House, and each week a different species of orchid blooms in the Orchid House. Palms thrive in the Palm House's tropical rain forest setting, complete with a waterfall, while the Desert House displays yuccas, agaves, cacti. and aloes.

A bonsai collection also is included. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (513) 421-4086.

NATIONAL UNDERGROUND RAILROAD FREEDOM CENTER is at 50 E. Freedom Way. Located on the banks of the Ohio River, which once marked the border between slave and free states, this 158,000-square-foot facility houses a collection that tells about slavery in America, highlighting the role of the Underground Railroad. The perseverance, courage and multicultural cooperation that led to the freedom of so many is celebrated with interactive exhibits and multimedia. The center also addresses modern abolition, connecting the past to the present.

Visitors see an actual 1830 two-story log slave pen, with wrought-iron shackles intact, which was moved from Kentucky. Professional displays and interactive, thought-provoking exhibits trace 300 years of slavery in North America. A series of five powerful short films is shown. One gallery is geared toward children. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (513) 333-7500 or (877) 648-4838.

SPRING GROVE CEMETERY & ARBORETUM is off I-75 exit 6, .3 mi. w. on Mitchell Ave., then .3 mi. s. to 4521 Spring Grove Ave. A National Historic Landmark, this 733acre cemetery was founded in the 1840s and is the burial site of numerous notable persons, including governors, business leaders, Revolutionary War soldiers and Civil War generals. The grounds contain 15 lakes, a waterfall, 1,000 labeled trees and shrubs, and a 10-acre woodland. Historical information brochures and maps for a 33-stop self-guiding tour that highlights the history, art and architecture of the facility are available from the office. Special event tours are held throughout the year.

TAFT MUSEUM OF ART is at 316 Pike St. The 1820 Palladian-style mansion, once the home of art patrons Charles and Anna Taft, features landscape murals by Robert S. Duncanson, a noted 19th-century African American artist. Twelve rooms display impressive visual arts. A permanent collection boasts old masters paintings, more than 200 Chinese porcelains from the Ming and Qing dynasties, medieval and Renaissance European art. Italian Renaissance ceramics and intricate watches crafted by 17th-through 19th-century watchmakers.

The Dutch Masters collection includes works by Rembrandt, Pieter de Hooch and Jan Steen. Landscapes by Thomas Gainsborough and portraits by Joshua Reynolds and John Singer Sargent are highlights. Changing exhibitions and special events are presented. A formal garden graces the grounds.

WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE is at 2038 Auburn Ave. The Greek Revival brick house is the birthplace and boyhood home of the 27th president and 10th chief justice of the United States. Four rooms are furnished to reflect the Taft's family life 1851-77. Other rooms have exhibits depicting the Taft family and the president's devotion to his public career. Tours begin in the Taft Education center next door.







Lawrenceburg, founded on a bend in the Ohio River in 1803 by Capt. Samuel Vance, grew quickly after the advent of steamboat shipping. During this era the city's Gamblers' Row was notorious from Pittsburgh to New Orleans. In 1819 Lawrenceburg became the site of the state's first "skyscraper"—The Jessie Hunt House, a three-story brick building at Walnut and High streets. Due to its location, Lawrenceburg offers many scenic views of the river as well as numerous year-round recreational activities.

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# Cleveland

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# Then & Now

In 1796 surveyor Moses Cleaveland picked his townsite on Lake Erie. By 1832 the Ohio and Erie Canal was completed, and Cleaveland, the northern terminus, had doubled its population. Over the next 10 years it grew by almost 500 percent. It also acquired a trimmer name when *The Cleaveland Gazette and Commercial Register* had to drop a letter from its masthead.

During the 1800s Cleveland was an important stop on the Underground Railroad. The city's port provided a route to freedom across the Canadian border for slaves fleeing the South.

With the canal came Cleveland's first wave of immigrants, the backbone of its labor force. The city transformed from a bustling port to a shipping and industrial giant. The Civil War halted the city's progress, but the subsequent demand for iron spurred new growth.

From 1910-20 Cleveland was the country's second largest center for automobile production. Behind this growth were great industrialists like John D. Rockefeller, the world's first billionaire.

The Cleveland Union Terminal complex with its 52-story Terminal Tower was built in the 1920s. Tower City Center, a three-level mall, now fills the former railroad station. Key Tower on Public Square is Ohio's tallest building at 948 feet tall with 57 stories.

The city is headquarters for more than 20 major corporations—including American Greetings Corp. and The Sherwin-Williams Co.—and many smaller companies. Case Western Reserve and Cleveland State universities as well as The Cleveland Clinic, which administers some of the world's most advanced medical treatments, are other intellectual highlights.

Year-round recreation opportunities include more than 23,000 acres of metropolitan parks districts; surrounding rivers, streams and lakes; and nearby Cuyahoga Valley National Park.

For culture, there's University Circle. This neighborhood's large cluster of cultural goodies includes the Cleveland History Center, the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, and the Cleveland Museum of Art as well

as the Cleveland Orchestra, which plays at the exquisite historic Severance Hall.

Visit some of Cleveland's neighborhoods. The Historic Warehouse District offers dining and entertainment with a backdrop of 19th-century architecture. Little Italy is a charming area with places to eat, bakeries and art galleries. The Flats East Bank, a riverfront area once known

for heavy industry, is now a mixed-use district with office, dining, entertainment and residential space along with a public park and an extensive riverfront boardwalk.

Progressive Field, occasionally called "the Jake" after the original name of Jacobs Field, and the adjacent Rocket Mortgage FieldHouse, homes of the Cleveland Guardians and Cleveland Cavaliers, opened in 1994. The

Cleveland Browns moved to Baltimore in the late 1990s but returned in 1999 to play at the Cleveland Browns Stadium (now FirstEnergy Stadium), reenergizing the city's dedicated fans.

Last but not least, remember that Cleveland rocks! Rock stars of the past and present are immortalized in The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, which resides in a modern I.M. Pei-designed building on the shore of Lake Erie.

#### Must Do: AAA Editor's Picks

- If you remember the theme song to "The Drew Carey Show," then you already know that "Cleveland rocks." But see for yourself at the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame (751 Erieside Ave.). The massive collection of stage outfits, concert posters, instruments, handwritten lyrics and personal items tells the always interesting and often juicy history of rock and roll. When you need a little break from wandering galleries, have a seat in the theater where a trio of screens continually plays clips and music of each inductee.
- Cleveland rocks in more ways than one, and you don't have to go far to see how. Right next door is the Great Lakes Science Center (601 Erieside Ave.), where you can explore hundreds of science exhibits as well as the NASA Glenn Visitor Center, chock full of space history. The center is right on Lake Erie; head outside to tour the Steamship William G. Mather.
- Visit The RainForest at Cleveland Metroparks Zoo (3900 Wildlife Way). The re-creation of tropical rain forests is a visual and aural delight with a waterfall and simulated thunderstorms in addition to the 600-plus animals in residence. Once you experience this environment, you'll better understand the importance of saving the world's rain forests, which is the goal of this exhibit.
- If you're a fan of "A Christmas Story" and looking for things to do in Cleveland, you'll have a blast at A Christmas Story House & Museum (3159 W. 11th St.). Tour the house, where some scenes were filmed, and check out the movie props and memorabilia.
- Spend some time in University Circle (4 miles east of downtown). In addition to medical and education facilities (including the Cleveland Clinic, Case Western Reserve University and the Cleveland Institute of Art), University Circle is a renowned destination for its many cultural sites, including the next four on the list.
- The Cleveland Museum of Art (11150 East Blvd.)
  has a collection that is amazing in quantity, quality
  and diversity. A highlight is the European arms and
  armor collection.

- Explore the Cleveland Museum of Natural History (1 Wade Oval Dr.) galleries for a jam-packed crash course in archeology, astronomy, ecology, geology, human evolution and prehistoric life as well as Ohio's native plants and animals.
- Spend some time relaxing at the Cleveland Botanical Garden (11030 East Blvd.), where each season brings its own reason for visiting. Many of the individual gardens, like the Japanese and restorative gardens, are designed with serenity in mind, but one is intended to promote activity: the Hershey Children's Garden, which features a maze and tree house.
- Local history is front and center at The Cleveland History Center (10825 East Blvd.). One of the center's highlights is the Crawford Auto Aviation Museum. Temporary exhibits of clothing and textiles are always on view as well.
- Experience the area's beautiful natural scenery and recreation opportunities at one of the 18 reservations making up Cleveland Metroparks.
- Admire the city's architecture and public art either on a self-guiding tour (pick up a brochure at Cleveland Visitors Center, 334 Euclid Ave.) or a guided Trolley Tours of Cleveland (2000 Sycamore St.) tour.

- Mingle with Clevelanders at the West Side Market's (1979 W. 25th St.) more than 100 vendor stalls.
- Theater in Cleveland is a pretty big deal. Not counting New York's venues, PlayhouseSquare (1501 Euclid Ave.) is the country's largest performing arts center. Plan to spend a night at the theater during your time in the city; it's a great option for those interested in things for couples to do.

# **Cleveland 1-day Itinerary**

AAA editors suggest these activities for a great short vacation experience.

#### Morning

 Museums don't open first thing, so start at West Side Market (1979 W. 25th St.) in the Ohio City neighborhood. The building, which opened in 1912,

- features a vaulted Guastavino tile ceiling and a 137-foot clock tower. More than 100 vendors sell baked goods, produce, meat, seafood, dairy items, flowers and other specialty products.
- The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame (751 Erieside Ave.) is a must-see. Its massive permanent collection showcases everything you'd want to know about rock and roll, and temporary exhibits enhance the already impressive experience. The story of rock unfolds in creatively themed exhibit areas—highlighting musical giants like Elvis, the Beatles, the Rolling Stones all the way down to one-hit wonders. Memorabilia, films, interactive exhibits and video and audio clips fill the galleries of I.M. Pei's dramatic building on the shore of Lake Erie.
- You could easily spend the whole day here, and why not if you are a big-time music fan? But if you want to see what else the city offers, save the afternoon for something else.

#### Afternoon

- Head to University Circle, a square mile jam-packed with cultural, educational and health institutions; Wade Oval and Wade Lagoon are beautiful spaces to enjoy the scenic area. You can't go wrong with any of the AAA GEM attractions: Cleveland Botanical Garden (11030 East Blvd.), Cleveland Museum of Art (11150 East Blvd.), Cleveland Museum of Natural History (1 Wade Oval Dr.) and The Cleveland History Center (10825 East Blvd.). Our pick: the art museum. The beautiful 1916 building, home to one of the country's best collections, has recently undergone a major expansion.
- The art spans 6,000 years. Major artists represented among the more than 45,000 works include Mary Cassatt, Claude Monet, Pablo Picasso, Jackson Pollock, Nicholas Poussin, Andy Warhol and a variety of Hudson River School artists. African, Ancient Egyptian, Ancient Near East/Greek/Roman, Chinese, Indian and Southeast Asian, Islamic, Japanese and Korean works of art also are displayed. The medieval collection contains coins, glass, jewelry, manuscripts, metalwork, paintings and sculpture among other objects. The highlight is an extensive arms and armor collection. It features body armor, helmets, crossbows, daggers, knives, swords and shields.
- Have lunch at the museum or head to Little Italy, adjacent to University Circle. The neighborhood offers restaurants, bakeries and art galleries.

### **Evening**

Cleveland has quite the theater scene.
 PlayhouseSquare, the country's largest performing

arts center outside of New York's offerings, features several resident companies, including Cleveland Play House (the country's first regional theater), and also brings in touring productions. Many restaurants are nearby; consider exploring the East 4th Street district, where there's a good nightlife scene.

- For a more casual outing, head to Ohio City. Bars and breweries offer plentiful nightlife. Tour the Great Lakes Brewing Co. (2516 Market Ave.) and then enjoy some of its creations. You'll feel like a Clevelander yourself after sampling the beers with fun, creative names related to all things Cleveland. Another option is McNulty's Bier Markt, serving more than 100 American and Belgian craft beers. Have dinner at the attached Bar Cento (1948 25th St.), where the European-inspired menu changes seasonally so the chefs can always use local ingredients. If you're in the mood for a pizza, this is a great place to order one.
- Not ready to call it a night? Jack Cleveland Casino (100 Public Sq.) is open 24 hours. You'll be focused on winning big, but take a minute to look around. The building was once the Higbee Co., one of Cleveland's many beautiful—but long gone—department stores.

# Arriving

# By Car

Cleveland sits in the middle of a "Y" formed by two of the nation's major transcontinental routes: I-90 and I-80. I-90 passes through the heart of the city, bringing traffic along the lakeshore from the east; I-80 channels motorists from the interior through the southern suburbs. From the west, these routes combine over the Ohio Turnpike, with the "Y" beginning at neighboring Elyria.

Both highway systems interchange with important intersecting routes for easy access to the suburbs, and I-90 links conveniently to important city streets. Other supplemental east-west roads are SR 2, US 6 and US 20. These routes primarily serve local traffic, but also follow some of the major city arteries.

Downtown Cleveland is the northern terminus of I-71 and I-77, which bring traffic from the southwest and the south, respectively. I-490, south of the city, provides a connector for I-71 and I-77. SR 176 also channels traffic from the south connecting to I-480 and I-71. Approaching the city, each interchanges frequently with other routes, including I-80 (toll), before joining I-90 near the city's center.

Other routes from the south include SR 8, SR 21 and US 42, which are used chiefly by local traffic. Upon entering Cleveland, these roads constitute some of the principal thoroughfares.

I-271, forming an irregular arc between I-71 and I-90, provides a bypass around Cleveland's east side. I-80 (the Ohio Turnpike), I-480 and I-271 that bypass the city to the east and south, provide connections for I-90 corridor traffic.

# **Getting Around**

### **Street System**

Cleveland's streets are in a grid pattern that centers on Public Square, from which all major avenues radiate. Euclid Avenue is the major business thoroughfare, running from the square through downtown to the eastern suburbs. Ontario Street, running north-south through Public Square, divides the city into east and west. North-south routes are numbered streets, while the majority of east-west thoroughfares are named avenues, roads or boulevards. Right turns on red are permitted unless otherwise posted.

### **Parking**

On-street metered parking is available. Meters operate Monday through Friday from a minimum of 20 minutes to a maximum of 4 hours from 7 a.m. or 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. The cost to park at a meter ranges from 50c to \$1 per hour. Parking is available in the municipal parking lot on the Memorial Shoreway (SR 2) just east of the 9th Street exit; this affords easy access to the Waterfront Rapid Transit Train serving Tower City Center, The Flats and other Cleveland attractions. Parking lot and garage charges can vary from \$2 to \$10 daily, and up to \$25 for special events. Park and ride lots are at some RTA stations.

# **Shopping**

Tower City Center, 230 W. Huron Rd., is a shopping, dining and entertainment complex surrounding a modernized

commuter rail station. Skylights, light and water shows, marble staircases, historic brass storefronts and a glass dome accent the three levels of retail stores and places to eat. **The Arcade**, 401 Euclid Ave., was one of the first indoor malls in the country. This 1890 landmark has been renovated to include a hotel but continues to offer a variety of shops and boutiques. **Galleria at Erieview**, 1301 E. 9th St. at St. Clair St., offers a small collection of shops and galleries.

**Antique Row**, Lorain Avenue from W. 25th to W. 117th streets, and Detroit Avenue from Westwood Avenue to W. Clifton Boulevard, are popular with antiques hunters. The **Little Italy** neighborhood offers shops and galleries along Murray Hill and Mayfield roads.

Some of the Victorian houses in **Ohio City** serve as boutiques and antique shops. On select Saturdays from June through October, the district hosts music and an urban art market in Market Square.

The **West Side Market** at W. 25th Street and Lorain Avenue sells fresh fruit, vegetables, meats, fish, poultry, cheese and ethnic foods Mon. and Wed. 7-4, Fri.-Sat. 7-6 and Sun. 10-4. **Coit Road Farmers Market** is at Coit Avenue and Woodworth Street and offers Ohio produce and products. It is open Sat. year-round 8-1 as well as Wed. 10-1 and 4-7, June-Oct.

**Shaker Square**, at the junction of Van Aken Boulevard, Shaker Boulevard and E. 130th Street, offers shops, food and entertainment.

Take a trip down memory lane at **b. a. Sweetie Candy Co. Inc.** at 6770 Brookpark Rd. The candy warehouse has a huge inventory, including nostalgic brands.

In the surrounding suburbs are shopping centers and malls offering such department stores as Dillard's, Macy's, Neiman Marcus, Nordstrom and Saks Fifth Avenue as well as many smaller shops. Among the more popular malls are **Beachwood Place**, 26300 Cedar Rd. at Richmond Road in Beachwood; **Great Lakes Mall**, 7850 Mentor Ave. in Mentor; **The Shoppes at Parma**, 7899 W. Ridgewood Dr. in Parma; **Great Northern Mall**, 4954 Great Northern Mall at I-480 in North Olmsted; and **SouthPark Mall**, 500 Southpark Center in Strongsville. The site of the former Westgate Mall in Fairview Park is now the home of **Westgate**, an open-air shopping center at the intersection of W. 210 Street and Center Ridge Road/US 20.

The local vicinity also offers further shopping opportunities to add to your travel plans. **Legacy Village Shopping Center** is in Lyndhurst, 1 mile west of I-271 Cedar Road exit at 25333 Cedar Rd. The village features a main street reminiscent of a 1950s-era small town and includes Crate & Barrel and Restoration Hardware among its many stores and local restaurants. There are more than 80

shops in the outdoor shopping area of **Crocker Park**, a quarter-mile south of I-90 Crocker Road exit in Westlake. At Coventry Road in **Cleveland Heights** between Mayfield and Euclid Heights roads, colorful shops and boutiques offer offbeat clothing, artworks and crafts.

In Rocky River, **Beachcliff Market Square**, 19300 Detroit Rd., offers upscale retailers and eateries. Also in Rocky River is **Old River**, on Old Detroit and Wooster roads, where shops specialize in gifts, antiques, spa services, gourmet food, wines and specialty clothing.

# **Big Events**

One of Cleveland's most popular traditions is the St. Patrick's Day parade on March 17. The Geauga County Maple Festival in nearby Chardon features crafts, parades, carnival rides, contests and the Sap Run marathon in late April.

In May the **Tremont Greek Fest**, near downtown Cleveland, offers a variety of Mediterranean cuisine and fun things to do with friends.

Parade the Circle Celebration is an art parade that takes place in June in University Circle, the heart of the culture area of Cleveland. Also in June, the Tri-C Jazz Fest showcases local and regional jazz artists at PlayhouseSquare.

In late June, the **Star-Spangled Spectacular** features performances by the Cleveland Orchestra and a fireworks display. Nearby Cleveland Heights offers music and art during mid-July's **Cain Park Arts Festival.** 

In mid-August the **Feast of the Assumption** is held in the **Little Italy** section of Cleveland (also known as Murray Hill). Also in August is the **Cuyahoga County Fair**, one of the largest fairs in the state, at the fairgrounds in nearby Berea. On Labor Day weekend the **Cleveland National Air Show** takes place at **Burke Lakefront Airport**. Throughout the downtown area in late September, **Ingenuity Fest** mixes performing and visual artists with inventive high-tech creations. Little Italy residents and visitors celebrate Columbus Day with the annual **Columbus Day Parade** in October.

The Christmas season is welcomed by **Winterfest**, a holiday lighting program at PlayhouseSquare and fireworks display held the Saturday after Thanksgiving.

# **Sports & Rec**

The more than 23,000 acres of Cleveland Metroparks constitute one of the largest concentrations of parkland per capita in the nation. The 100-mile chain of metropolitan parks known as the "Emerald Necklace" is one of the largest park districts in the country. The 18 reservations offer opportunities for biking, boating, fishing, geocaching, golfing, hiking, horseback riding, picnicking,

**skating, swimming, water sports** and many **winter sports**. The more than 60 miles of all-purpose trails are designed for walking/hiking, running, biking, horseback riding and skating. There are wildlife management areas, waterfowl sanctuaries and seven outdoor education facilities. Some of the reservations fall within the boundaries of **Cuvahoga Valley National Park.** Phone (216) 635-3200.

**Biking** is a great way to scoot around town whether for recreational enjoyment or as a means to get from one point of interest to another. Bicycles can be rented from **Bike Rack** at 2148 E. 4th St. The facility is open Mon.-Fri. 6:30-6:30. and Sat.-Sun. noon-6, Mar.-Oct.; phone (216) 771-7120.



Stables offering horseback riding lessons and boarding are at **Rocky River Stables**, (216) 267-2525, and **Brecksville Stables**, (440) 526-6767. **Swimming** can be enjoyed at the sandy Lake Erie beaches, such as the ones found in Cleveland Metroparks Lakefront Reservation (Edgewater Park) and at the Cleveland Metroparks

Huntington Reservation in Bay Village as well as Headlands Beach State Park (see Recreation Areas Chart). Swimming also is available at Ledge Pool and Recreation Area in Hinckley.

Fishing and boating are among the popular things to do on **Lake Erie.** Public boat rentals and ramps are at the Cleveland Metroparks **Rocky River and Hinckley reservations**, and fishing piers are at Huntington. Great Lakes Watersports, 1148 Main Ave., offers boat, Jet Ski and kayak rentals by the hour; phone (216) 771-4386. Trident Marine Corp. offers fishing charters; phone (216) 771-2628. **Wildwood Marina** offers public and private fishing excursions; phone (216) 481-5771. The Cleveland Visitors Center can provide additional fishing charter companies if you're interested in taking a fishing trip; phone (216) 875-6680 or (800) 321-1001.

Skiing, snowboarding and tubing are popular at several nearby sites. Peninsula offers Boston Mills Ski Resort, Sagamore Hills has Brandywine Ski Resort and Polar Blast snow tubing park, and Chesterland has Alpine Valley. Several Cleveland Metroparks offer crosscountry skiing and sledding.

The outdoor **Rink at Wade Oval** in University Circle has a polymer surface and is open for **ice-skating** Fri. noon-9, Sat. noon-7, Sun. noon-5, late Nov. to mid-Feb.; closed Jan. 1, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Skate rental is \$3; phone (216) 791-3900.

Various recreational opportunities also are found at the Cuyahoga Valley National Park, just southeast of the city (see place listing p. 241 and Recreation Areas Chart).

Because Cleveland is home to several professional sports teams, spectator sports enthusiasts can choose from a variety of activities and fun places to go. At Progressive Field (see attraction listing p. 199), Carnegie Avenue between Ontario Avenue and E. 9th Street, the Cleveland Guardians play baseball in the spring, summer and early fall. Guided stadium tours are offered late April through early September; for tour information or game tickets phone (216) 420-4487. The Rocket Mortgage FieldHouse, hosts basketball and hockey October through April with both the NBA's **Cavaliers** and the AHL's Lake Erie Monsters. Arena football's Cleveland Gladiators also play at Rocket Mortgage FieldHouse late March to mid-July. For Cavaliers, Lake Erie Monsters or Gladiator tickets phone (216) 420-2200 or (800) 332-2287.

Cleveland Browns football fans head to FirstEnergy Stadium at 1085 W. 3rd St. near the North Coast Harbor to watch their team in action; phone (440) 824-3434 or (800) 745-3000.

Thoroughbred racing is held throughout the year at the Thistledown Racing Club, 21501 Emery Rd. in North

Randall, (216) 662-8600. **Harness races** are featured year-round at **Northfield Park**, 10705 Northfield Rd. in Northfield; phone (330) 467-4101.

# **Performing Arts**

Those looking for music, theater, opera and other performances will find plenty of options and things to do in Cleveland. The world-renowned **Cleveland Orchestra** performs mid-September through early June in historic **Severance Hall,** opened in 1931, in the University Circle area and at the open-air **Blossom Music Center** in Cuyahoga Falls (see place listing p. 240) early July through Labor Day weekend; phone (216) 231-1111 or (800) 686-1141 for tickets. Food is available at both facilities, and the patrons of Blossom Music Center can opt to bring a picnic.

The Cleveland Chamber Music Society performs at the Plymouth Church October through May. The Cleveland Contemporary Players, performing in the Music and Communications Building of Cleveland State University, gives concerts of contemporary music; phone (216) 802-3054 for scheduled programs.

Musical events are presented regularly at various sites across the city, including **The Cleveland Music School Settlement**, **Rocket Mortgage FieldHouse**, the **Wolstein Center** at Cleveland State University and the civic auditorium at Lakewood High School.

The students and faculty of the **Cleveland Institute of Music** as well as visiting artists perform a variety of musical types—including chamber, orchestra and opera—throughout the year on campus (11021 East Blvd. in University Circle) and at other locations in the city; phone (216) 791-5000 for schedule information.

PlayhouseSquare, on Euclid Avenue between E. 14th and E. 17th streets, is a performing arts destination that began in the 1920s with five theater, vaudeville and movie venues: Ohio Theatre, State Theatre, Allen Theatre, Connor Palace Theatre and Hanna Theatre. In the 1970s these theaters were saved from demolition by the community. Today the complex boasts nine performing spaces, including the Westfield Insurance Studio Theatre inside the Idea Center at PlayhouseSquare. Among the types of performances offered are Broadway shows. opera, concerts, comedy, family shows and dance programs. PlayhouseSquare is home to resident companies DANCECleveland, Opera Cleveland, Great Lakes Theater Festival and Tri-C. For ticket information phone (216) 241-6000, or (800) 766-6048 outside the Cleveland area.

PlayhouseSquare recently jazzed up its neighborhood with the outdoor GE Chandelier, which suspends 44 feet above the E. 14th Street and Euclid Avenue intersection. As you can imagine, this 20-foot-tall beauty is a must-see at night.

The Cleveland Play House was established in 1915 as America's first permanent regional theater company. The original facility at 8500 Euclid Ave. was built in 1927 and housed two theaters. A 1983 expansion was designed by internationally acclaimed architect Philip Johnson and made it the country's largest regional theater complex. In 2011 the company kicked off the season at a new facility located at PlayhouseSquare's Allen Theatre Complex at 1407 Euclid Ave. The season runs September through May, with productions ranging from the classics to new plays and from comedies to musicals; phone (216) 241-6000.

Also established in 1915 was **Karamu House.** The company offers multicultural performances and programs at 2355 E. 89th St.; phone (216) 795-7070.

The Gordon Square Arts District is an emerging arts scene on Cleveland's West Side; it is home to Cleveland Public Theatre, (216) 631-2727, at 6415 Detroit Ave. Near West Theatre, (216) 961-9750, performs community theater at 6702 Detroit Ave. The 1921 Capitol Theatre has been restored and now shows independent, foreign and documentary films on three screens.

Cleveland Shakespeare Festival puts on about a dozen performances of free outdoor plays from mid-June to early August in Cleveland and several surrounding cities; the Cleveland venues include Lincoln Park.

CLEVELAND BOTANICAL GARDEN is at 11030 East Blvd. in University Circle. Ten acres of beautifully landscaped grounds include the Japanese, herb, theme, natural woodland and rose gardens as well as the popular Hershey Children's Garden. The Eleanor Armstrong Smith Glasshouse is an 18,000-square-foot crystalline conservatory that houses two re-created ecosystems: the Madagascar desert and the butterfly-filled Costa Rican cloud forest.

Stone slab walkways meander through the site, which also features a gardening library, gallery space and seasonal exhibits. Gardening lectures, classes and public programs are offered. **Time:** Allow 2 hours minimum. **Phone:** (216) 721-1600.

CLEVELAND METROPARKS ZOO is at 3900 Wildlife Way. The zoo is home to thousands of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish in naturalistic habitats. Giraffes, lions, ostriches and zebras are in the African Savanna; Wolf Wilderness features a pack of Mexican gray wolves and a beaver lodge; and Australian Adventure is home to kangaroos, koalas and wallabies. African Elephant Crossing is a five-acre elephant habitat and education village. In addition to a herd of five elephants the exhibit features meerkats, naked mole rats, an African rock python and an aviary of African birds. The Asian Highlands exhibit gives guests the opportunity to get nose-to-nose with snow leopards and red pandas.

The RainForest is just outside the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo entrance at 3900 Wildlife Way. The RainForest features more than 600 animals and 10,000 plants, trees and shrubs from around the jungles of Africa, Asia and the Americas. The elaborate 2-acre, bi-level recreation of a tropical habitat includes a 25-foot waterfall and a simulated thunderstorm every 15 minutes.

The depiction of the rain forests of Africa, Asia and the Americas reveals their importance as well as our responsibility to protect them. Exhibits showcase a variety of wildlife, including orangutans, capybaras, giant anteaters, ocelots, fishing cats and sloths. An insectarium and an aviary also are included.

In the zoo, picnicking is permitted and food is available. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (216) 661-6500 or TTY (216) 661-1090.

CLEVELAND MUSEUM OF ART is at 11150 East Blvd. in University Circle. This renowned museum's collection encompasses 6,000 years of history with more than 45,000 works of art. Some of the thousands of artists represented in the more than 40 galleries include Caravaggio, Edgar Degas, El Greco, Childe Hassam, Hans Holbein, Michelangelo, Raphael, Rembrandt, Pierre Auguste Renoir and Benjamin West.

The second floor of the neoclassical 1916 building includes 17th- through 19th-century European art and 18th-and 19th-century American art as well as the Armor Court, a collection of European arms and armor from the 15th-through 18th centuries. The Ancient Egyptian and Ancient Near East, Classical Greek and Roman, Early Christian and Byzantine, Medieval, Sub-Saharan African, prints and drawings collections also are on view in the historical building. The East Wing includes additional European art as well as photography, contemporary art, Cleveland art and American modern art.

The North Wing houses art of the Americas, textiles and Japanese and Korean art. The West Wing features Chinese, Indian and Southeast Asian art. The Ancient Egyptian and Ancient Near East, Classical Greek and Roman, Early Christian and Byzantine, Medieval, Sub-Saharan African, prints and drawings collections also are on view. Ingalls Library has a noncirculating art research collection. The Atrium serves as the centerpiece of the museum with a large courtyard and soaring glass canopy.

CLEVELAND MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY is at 1 Wade Oval Dr. in University Circle. The museum makes science relatable with such exhibits as Amazing Insects, Audubon's Birds of America and The Kirtland Hall of Prehistoric Life (temporarily off exhibit for reconstruction) where a Haplocanthosaurus delfsi, T. rex and triceratops dinosaurs reside..

The Andy Warhol Endangered Species exhibit is in the reopened Corning Gallery and serves as a new home for rotating exhibits that highlight the intersection of art and nature. The Ralph Perkins II Wildlife Center and Woods Garden—Presented by KeyBank includes flora and fauna indigenous to Ohio, including oak and maple trees, bald eagles, bobcats, owls and river otters plus innovative overhead animal trailways. Other exhibits showcase Ohio archeology, birds, dinosaurs and cultural artifacts from seven continents.

The Shafran Planetarium features more than 5,000 stars, nebulae, galaxies and planets; the Muller Observatory contains a 10.5-inch refracting telescope which provides an excellent vantage point for visitors to observe astronomical events. The hands-on learning Smead Discovery Center, Birdly flight simulators, 3-D movies and live animal shows also are offered.

GREATER CLEVELAND AQUARIUM is at 2000 Sycamore St., in the lower levels of the Powerhouse on the west bank of The Flats. More than 50 exhibits feature themed sections: Ohio Lakes & Rivers, Lakes and Rivers of the World, Rainforest Discovery Zone, Indo-Pacific, Coastal Boardwalk, Tropical Reef, Shark SeaTube (with three species of sharks), Shark-Cam and Imagiquarium

Coastal. At the Coastal Touch Pool visitors can pet stingrays and invertebrates. Themed tours and experiences are offered for additional fees. **Time:** Allow 1 hour, 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (216) 862-8803 or (855) 602-3040. GT

GREAT LAKES SCIENCE CENTER is at 601 Erieside Ave., between the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and FirstEnergy Stadium. Through hundreds of interactive exhibits, daily science demonstrations, traveling exhibits and educational programs, the center lets visitors explore aeronautics and space exploration, biomedical technology, renewable energy and the Great Lakes.

The NASA Glenn Visitor Center, which focuses on space exploration and the resulting scientific discoveries, features more than 50 exhibits, including a moon rock and the Apollo command module from its 1973 Skylab 3 mission. The center also incorporates the six-story giant-screen Cleveland Clinic Dome Theater. People can make parachutes, a race car and a rocket in the Cleveland Creates Zone maker space and kids under age 8 can play and learn in the Polymer Funhouse. The Steamship William G. Mather (see attraction listing) is on the grounds as well.

Steamship William G. Mather is docked at Great Lakes Science Center at 601 Erieside Ave. The restored 1925 Great Lakes freighter has been preserved as a floating museum ship. Visitors can explore the historic cargo holds, four-story engine room, elegant dining rooms, galley, and the brass and oak pilothouse of this 618-foot vessel. Exhibits and introductory videos focus on the Great Lakes and the history of the Great Lakes shipping industry.



A large collection of images, artifacts and instruments from current performers, Hall of Fame inductees and other legends is imaginatively presented.

Visitors can listen to the songs that shaped rock and roll, a sample of the most popular and influential recordings in the history of the genre. Inside the Hall of Fame gallery, in addition to an exhibit featuring the current class of inductees, visitors will also find The Power of Rock Experience featuring induction performance clips using moving screens, concert lighting and shaking seats. 

# Then & Now

Author James Thurber said of his birthplace, "Columbus is a town in which almost anything is likely to happen and in which almost everything has."

Yet Columbus is a city that almost wasn't. When Ohio gained statehood in 1803, it hadn't yet chosen a permanent capital. Political maneuvering almost landed the state government in Zanesville and Chillicothe. In 1812, however, the residents of Franklinton, a county seat in the heart of Ohio along the Scioto River, tempted the state with 1,200 acres of land and a commitment to spend \$50,000 to construct a capitol building and a penitentiary. Within a matter of days the general assembly accepted the offer, and Columbus was born on the opposite bank of the river.

The Civil War initiated a wave of unprecedented growth; the population soared and manufacturing and government became the city's primary industries.

The opening in 1873 of Ohio Agriculture and Mechanical College, later renamed The Ohio State University, spawned a new outlook for the city. Education was thrust to the forefront, and the intellectual atmosphere helped contribute to the forerunner of the computer, the development of the xerography process and numerous advancements in the medical treatment of the physically impaired.

Today the phrase "state of the art" is synonymous with Columbus, which ranks with Silicon Valley as a center for scientific and technological information. Ohio's capital built its solid reputation over several decades; it was one of the first cities in the country to offer citywide cable television and introduced such technology as the 24-hour banking machine, interactive cable television and the electronic newspaper. Thousands of high-tech companies, including Battelle Memorial Institute, Mettler-Toledo International and Vertiv, now call Columbus home.

Besides its well-deserved reputation in the high-tech world, the city houses the headquarters of several Fortune 1000 companies, including Aflac, Big Lots, Express, L Brands and Nationwide Insurance. Columbus also is



The state of the city's visual arts deserves equally high praise. Ohio's capital offers an assortment of art-centered attractions, including the Billy Ireland Cartoon Library & Museum and the Columbus Museum of Art. The Franklin

Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens cleverly displays thousands of otherworldly glass pieces by artist Dale Chihuly in artfully presented gardens. And the Topiary Park in Old Deaf School Park interprets the 1884 oil painting "A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte" by Georges Seurat with larger-than-life topiary bushes snipped into the shapes of Parisians at leisure near the Seine River.

In addition, colorful murals clothe many of the city's brick walls. A majority of these are in the thriving SoHolike Short North Arts District, a once-blighted area now filled with independently owned boutiques, many local places to eat and pubs that owes its present-day popularity to citywide revitalization projects begun in the 1980s.



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The same efforts resulted in the urban renewal of downtown's Arena District, transformed from its former neglected state to an area brimming with restaurants, shops and nightspots as well as Nationwide Arena, home to the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets.

The city's proud residents have lovingly preserved a host of 19th-century homes in Victorian Village and German Village. More examples of Columbus's exquisite architecture include the Greek Revival Ohio Statehouse along with an array of churches, office buildings and homes in Art Deco, Gothic, Italianate and Queen Anne styles.

#### Must Do: AAA Editor's Picks

- Hear the Victory Bell ring at a football game at The Ohio State University. Weighing 2,420 pounds, the bell sounds at **Ohio Stadium** (411 Woody Hayes Dr.) after every Buckeye win. Get into the spirit of things by donning scarlet and gray, OSU's official school colors.
- Visit the "Umbrella Girl" in German Village (588 S. 3rd St.), one of the city's oldest neighborhoods. In the 1950s, this bronze statue mysteriously disappeared from Schiller Park. The village dedicated a new version of the young girl, garbed in traditional Bavarian dress and carrying an umbrella, in 1996.
- Taste such Mediterranean staples as tabbouleh and baklava, inhale pungent spices, bite into a juicy locally-grown tomato and snap up some snapdragons at the **North Market** (59 Spruce St.), one of the area's best places to eat. This public farmers market on Spruce Street is the last of its kind in central Ohio.
- Take a tour of a tropical rain forest, the Himalayan Mountains or an arid desert at Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens (1777 E. Broad St.), which also features the Palm House, a 12,500-square-foot glass structure built in the style of the Glass Palace at Chicago's World Fair and Columbian Exposition in 1893.
- While in German Village, get some sweets for you and your sweetie pie at Pistacia Vera (541 S. Third St.), where glass cases are filled with delicate creations like melt-in-your-mouth macarons and cookies, tantalizing tarts and tortes, and buttery croissants and brioche.
- Lift a car all by yourself at COSI Columbus (333 W. Broad St.), a science center boasting a mix of education and fun. At COSI's outdoor Big Science Park, the Big Giant Lever exhibit lets you raise a 2,437-pound automobile. Or ride a unicycle on a tightrope several stories high in the center's atriumyes, you can do it!

- Coo at koalas at the ♥ Columbus Zoo and Aquarium (4850 W. Powell Rd.), one of the few U.S. zoos permanently housing the marsupials. Like the kangaroo, the koala carries its newborn, which is only about the size of a jelly bean, in a pouch. You can also go on a walkabout with gallivanting kangaroos, ogle polar bears swimming in icy waters and giggle at manatees and penguins cavorting in the aquarium.
- Watch a newsreel from the 1920s while exploring the 271,000-square-foot Ohio History Center (800 E. 17th Ave.). The expansive collection includes animal and plant specimens (including the extinct ivory-billed woodpecker), prehistoric Native American art, Civil War artifacts and classic cars. A gigantic mastodon skeleton greets visitors at the entrance.
- Unearth a few gems in the Short North Arts District. This urban neighborhood on North High Street embraces an eclectic array of art galleries, restaurants, antique shops, coffee bars and hip boutiques selling everything from Indonesian baskets and Native American jewelry to vintage clothing and designer fashions.

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- Dip a spoon into a cup of Graeter's Ice Cream (2555 Bethel Rd.). Heralded as the best ice cream around, the creamy dessert is a lasting tradition in the Midwest. Try Graeter's best seller, Black Raspberry Chip, or Oprah Winfrey's personal favorite, Butter Pecan. Another sweet favorite is Jeni's Splendid Ice Creams (714 N. High St.). Flavors include salty caramel and Riesling poached pear sorbet as well as such seasonal offerings as sweet corn and black raspberries.
- Pose among the figures sculpted from shrubbery at The Topiary Park (480 E. Town St.) in Old Deaf School Park; it's one of many fun things to do with friends in Columbus. You'll feel like you're actually inside the painting "A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte" by post-impressionist artist Georges Seurat. The park's beautiful landscaping

lends itself nicely to a relaxing picnic and some Frisbee-tossing.

# Columbus 1-day Itinerary

AAA editors suggest these activities for a great short vacation experience. Those staying in the area for a longer visit can access a 3-day itinerary at AAA.com/TripCanvas.

#### Morning

 One of the country's top-rated zoos. Columbus Zoo and Aquarium (4850 W. Powell Rd.), in nearby Powell is a must-see. It's preferable to spend a day here, but even a few hours will give you a good sampling of the zoo's top exhibits. Arrive early as there's a lot to see. If time only allows an abbreviated tour, don't miss the kangaroos; dozens of these bouncy marsupials hop about freely on the grass or lounge under trees in a fenced-in area. A roped-off path is all that separates you from the roos. Be sure to also see the polar bear and the koala; for the rest of your tour, choose your favorites from a cornucopia of wild beasts, birds, and reptiles, including moose, gorillas, bison, a variety of wild cats, African lions, Asian elephants, Arctic foxes, sharks, manatees, penguins and flamingos.

#### Afternoon

- Head back to the Short North Arts District for lunch and stimulate your taste buds with Asian fusion dishes at Lemongrass Fusion Bistro (641 N High St.) (think sushi, lemongrass soup and pad thai).
- While away the afternoon with a stroll on North High Street. Wander in and out of independently owned shops in this bohemian district; you'll find merchandise ranging from affordable antiques to trendy and expensive designer denim.
- The North Market (59 Spruce St.) is a mostly-indoor farmers market that will delight foodies. Marked by a huge neon sign, the bustling market holds local vendors hawking everything from farm-fresh produce to spices to bakery treats.
- If time allows, drive over to German Village (588 S. 3rd St.) for a little taste of old Europe. The charming brick homes and shops complete with flower-filled window boxes are a visual treat; just watch your step as you tread along the village's equally charming yet uneven cobblestone sidewalks. Stop in at Kittie's Hand-Crafted Cakes (495 S. 3rd St.) for a coffee-and-cupcake break, then wend your way through 32 rooms at block-long The Book Loft (631 S. 3rd St.), a literature-lover's delight.

#### **Evening**

- Time for dinner? Martini Modern Italian (445 N. High St.) wins points for its ambience alone, with red and white modern décor, white leather chairs and massive sparkling chandeliers, but its menu earns it a gold star. Albeit pricey, the restaurant offers a palate-pleasing range of pasta, chicken veal and seafood entrées as well as martinis in offbeat flavors.
- If you're near the German Village, try Schmidt's Sausage Haus (240 E. Kossuth St.), with German favorites like Wiener schnitzel, bratwurst, potato pancakes and Schmidt's signature jumbo cream puffs. On weekends, the high-energy oompah duo Squeezin' n' Wheezin' performs.
- For a more casual evening, grab a brew and a hot dog while cheering on the National Hockey League's Columbus Blue Jackets at Nationwide Arena (200 W. Nationwide Blvd.). If minor league baseball is your thing, watch the Columbus Clippers, Triple-A National Champions in 2010 and 2011, play at Huntington Park Stadium (330 Huntington Park Ln.).
- Time for dessert? If you've supped at one of the fine restaurants of the Short North, walk off your recently consumed calories and make room for the frozen treats at Jeni's Splendid Ice Creams (714 N. High St.). It's open till 11 p.m. daily, and the menu features such out-of-the-ordinary flavors like wildberry lavender, beet cake with black walnuts, and coriander raspberry.
- For the incurable chocoholic, stop in at Le Chocoholique (601 N. High St.) open until 10 or 11 on most nights. A bakery case holds a massive collection of exquisitely decorated chocolates that look like miniature works of art. The flavors are equally artful and include Velvet Elvis (peanut butter, banana and bacon-flavored), chipotle cherry and limoncello espresso. Or have a Picasso-esque slice of cake with a cappuccino; it's all served by chic, well-mannered college girls. Take a window seat to watch the locals stroll by.

# **Top Picks for Kids**

#### Under 13

- View more than 10,000 animals, from beasts that roam the African savanna to animals that traverse the Arctic plains, at the Columbus Zoo and Aquarium (4850 Powell Rd.) in nearby Powell, one of many fun things to do with kids here. Have a close encounter with land and sea animals by enjoying animal rides, shows and a tide pool touch tank.
- If the kids are craving a cold treat, take them to Jeni's Splendid Ice Creams (714 N. High St.) at the North Market (59 Spruce St.). While you browse for

- fresh-picked produce, they can choose from a variety of flavors that change with the seasons. Local bakers, butchers, chocolatiers, farmers, fishmongers and florists sell their wares at the indoor market Tues.-Sat. 9-7 and Sun.-Mon. 10-5.
- Even if your little ones aren't familiar with Georges Seurat's pointillism masterpiece "A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte" that inspired The Topiary Park (480 E. Town St.), they will certainly think the many topiaries representing the figures from the painting are pretty cool. Ducks—always popular with kids—hang out by the water. This a great picnic locale.
- At the Ohio State Fair, held from late July through early August at Ohio Expo Center (717 E. 17th Ave.), kids will be amazed after touching exotic animals at the free petting zoo and riding with their

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parents on Kiddieland rides. See agriculture and creative arts exhibits, witness livestock competitions, ride a few of the more than 70 thrilling midway rides and work up an appetite for some of the hundreds of fair foods, including 30 types of food on a stick.

#### **Teens**

- Teens will be thrilled zipping around town on a Segway tour while learning about many of the city's popular sites. Guides at SegAway Tours of Columbus (400 N. High St.) provide instructional/ practice sessions before leading a guided tour.
- Easton Town Center (160 Easton Station) is an open-air shopping mall with nearly 200 dining, shopping and entertainment venues, including a 30-screen AMC & IMAX theater. After shopping at favorites like American Eagle, Hollister and PacSun,

- nosh on a burger and fries at **Flip Side** (3945 Easton Station.).
- Have a couple hours? Try one of the several zipline experiences offered at ZipZone Canopy Tours (7925 N. High St.). You'll soar above 20 acres of central Ohio's forests.
- Graeter's Ice Cream (2555 Bethel Rd.) boasts that it has the world's best ice cream; fussy foodies and persnickety teens will agree. The craft ice cream and gelato will tempt your taste buds. This dense ice cream is created in spinning French Pot freezers.
- Can't wait for St. Patrick's Day? Teens can don green garb and head to Dublin for the **Dublin Irish Festival** (5200 Emerald Pkwy.) held in August; it offers more than 20 activities, games and inflatables as well as Highland sports competitions and energetic Celtic dancing and music. Fun contests include the most freckles, greenest eyes and reddest hair.

#### All Ages

- Demonstrations, exhibits, movies, a planetarium and live shows at ♥ COSI Columbus (333 W. Broad St.) teach science concepts and take the mystery out of technological advancements. Build a bridge, control waves in a tank, dissect computers, lift a car using a lever, maneuver a rover on a Mars-like landscape and split a laser beam. Daredevils can ride a unicycle on a wire suspended 17 feet above ground.
- German Village (588 S. 3rd St.) has enough small-town charm to captivate the entire family. Take a self-guiding tour past parks, residences, restaurants and shops along the red-brick paved, tree-lined streets and you might glimpse fossils in the limestone stoops and foundations. Dine on hearty German fare at Schmidt's Sausage Haus (240 E. Kossuth St.).

# **Arriving**

# By Car

The intersection of two interstate highways and a number of lesser routes makes Columbus accessible from all directions. The primary east-west highway is I-70, which spans about two-thirds of the nation and connects such cities as Baltimore, Md., Wheeling, W.Va. and Indianapolis, Ind.; I-70 passes through downtown Columbus, with convenient interchanges at major streets.

Closely paralleling the freeway is old US 40, which serves local traffic and provides a link to other downtown avenues. US 62 approaches Columbus from the northeast and southwest to bring the city a steady flow of instate traffic, as does SR 16, combining with US 40 coming in from the northeastern suburbs.

Mainly an intrastate interstate, I-71 links Cleveland to the north and Cincinnati to the south, passing through Columbus and continuing southward to Louisville.

Running north-south through the city is US 23, which collects traffic from northern Ohio and Michigan as well as from southern Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia. US 33, leading directly downtown, connects towns northwest and southeast of Columbus.

I-270 is a circumferential freeway that swings in a wide path around Columbus and, with interchanges with all major highways, provides a bypass of the city. I-670 combines with I-70 and I-71 to form a tight rectangle around downtown Columbus, offering the usual convenient interchanges.

# **Getting Around**

### Street System

Despite Columbus' growth to big-city status, driving in and around the city is not as hectic as in many metropolitan areas. Driving from one end of downtown to the opposite end averages 25 minutes, and few suburban commutes take more than 45 minutes at non-peak traffic hours. Right turns on red are permitted unless otherwise posted.

Streets are organized on a grid system, with addresses beginning at 1 at the corner of Broad and High streets in the center of downtown and increasing as routes go out of the city. Numbered streets, running north-south, are divided by Broad Street; numbered avenues, running eastwest, are divided by High Street.

# **Parking**

Parking lots and garages are plentiful downtown, with rates ranging from \$2 to \$10 Monday through Friday and generally decreasing on the weekends. Higher rates may apply during special events. On-street metered parking, costing 50c to \$1 per hour, can be found along most downtown streets; parking is restricted to 3 hours or less at most meters. Park and Ride lots are at many suburban shopping centers. Credit and debit cards can be used at many of the lots and at parking meters. The city's ParkColumbus app allows visitors to use smartphones to pay for parking on meters that display the ParkColumbus sticker.

# **Shopping**

Columbus is a natural for discovering bargains and hard-to-find items. If you like the time-saving convenience of shopping at malls, choose from these: **Easton Town Center**, off I-270 exit 33 at Easton Way; **The Mall at Tuttle Crossing**, off I-270 and Tuttle Crossing Blvd. (in

Dublin); and **Polaris Fashion Place**, off I-71 and Polaris Parkway.

The sprawling Easton Town Center, off I-270 exit 33 at Easton Way, is a shopper's delight. Set up as an old-fashioned open-air village market, the upscale center has more than 200 retailers and restaurants, including Banana Republic, Barnes & Noble, Burberry, Chico's, Coach, The Container Store, Crate & Barrel, Gap, H & M, Macy's and Nordstrom. Quaint, British-style red phone booths and fountains sprinkled throughout the center add panache to this already chic center. Five free parking garages allow for plentiful parking.

If you'd rather ferret out more unique merchandise, explore the city's shopping districts and specialty shops. Local bakers, butchers, chocolatiers, fishmongers, florists, farmers and ice cream makers sell their wares at the **North Market**, 59 Spruce St. On Saturdays during

growing season (May-October), more than 20 farmers set up shop. Saturdays also feature live music, and festivals are held throughout the year. In operation since 1876, the indoor market is open Tues.-Sat. 9-7 and Sun.-Mon. 10-5.

Step into the brick-fronted shops in the restored 19thcentury **German Village**, south of I-70/I-7 on 3rd Street, where shopkeepers will give you a warm "Wilkommen" as you sort through their delightful collections of books, home decor and even baked goods. Wandering through the 32 rooms of books in the labyrinthine **The Book Loft**, 631 S. 3rd St., might make you feel like a mouse in a maze. Instead of finding cheese, though, you'll find countless numbers of books, many with a discounted price. Be forewarned: Some staircases are narrow and you may have to step aside to let another customer pass.

The relaxing scent of French lavender bath products infuses the air on the first floor of Caterina Ltd., European Housewares, Art & Gifts, 571 S. 3rd St., where armoires and tables are stacked with vibrantly colored Italian ceramics, Polish pottery, and French and German linens; the shop also showcases local artists in galleries on the second and third floors. Pistacia Vera, 541 S. 3rd St., is a modern French patisserie; try melt-in-your-mouth pastel macarons in flavors like lavender honey and black raspberry hibiscus, flourless passion fruit Chambord and chocolate bombe tortes, and pastries such as pain au chocolat and orange brioche.

The Short North Arts District, along N. High Street from Poplar Street to Smith Place, offers boutiques, antique shops, restaurants and eclectic art galleries behind restored 1930s facades. Posh Pets Boutique, 743 N. High St. treats pet lovers to irresistible items like pearlstudded kitty collars, dog T-shirts with cute sayings like "favorite grandchild," fruit-shaped crocheted toys and The Ohio State University pet beds and hooded sweatshirts.

**Tigertree**, 787 N. High St., deals in trendsetting apparel for 20- and 30-something women and men by Fred Perry and Ben Sherman as well as newer labels like Dear Creatures and Ace & Jig. Sweet floral dresses and cute tops for the gals, and plaid shirts and casual pants for the guys are mixed in with pendants, backpacks, vases and pillows. Rowe Boutique, 718 N. High St., carries a welledited collection of contemporary fashions by lines such as Lauren Moffatt and Foley & Corinna, curated by former PR director Maren Roth, who earned her stripes in New York City handling accounts for fashion designers.

One man's trash is another's treasure at **Rag-O-Rama**, 3301 N. High St., a consignment shop where you can also find patent leather go-go boots, candy-colored Afro wigs and a sea of racks filled with gently used vintage and modern clothes, most contributed by college students.

Among some recent findings: Paige Denim jeans, an Odile top and Chloe sunglasses.

It's practically a rule that college towns have to have a used record store, and Columbus is no different. Used Kids Records, 2500 Summit St., fills the bill with a collection ranging from Nat King Cole to Florence + the Machine. Vinyl geeks can excavate for quasi-buried treasure to stock their collection, quite cheaply in fact; most used records and CDs sell for under \$10. Used Kids' wellinformed clerks are not the pretentious music snobs you might expect and will gladly help you in your search for hard-to-find discs. The go-to shops for avid Buckeye boosters are College Traditions, 286 W. Lane Ave., and Conrads College Gifts, 316 W. Lane Ave., which carry everything from sweatshirts to dog collars to footballshaped soap dishes with The Ohio State University logo.

Behold beautiful objects from decades and centuries past at Columbus-area antique malls. Try Eclectiques Antique Mall, 3265 N. High St.; Grandview Mercantile, 873 N. High St., in the Short North District; Greater Columbus Antique Mall, 1045 S. High St., and Heritage Square Antique Mall, 1865 Brice Rd.

# Nightlife

You might think that Columbus would be hard-pressed to satisfy the entertainment needs of its diverse populace of college students, entrepreneurs and suit-and-tie business types, but guess again. Whether you're a mellowed-out jazz aficionado, a fist-pumping rock fan or you just want to dance until you drop, you'll find a night spot in Columbus that suits your fancy.

Sometimes the best place to experience a city's music scene and feel its flavor is a local "dive" bar. You can hear live jazz almost every night of the week at the saloon-like Ruby Tuesday (not affiliated with the national chain restaurant), 1978 Summit St. This long-lived local haunt has been open since 1973 and yes, it was named after that song. Phone (614) 291-8313.

Dick's Den, 2417 N. High St., also fits right in to the "dive" category and is a favorite with the college crowd since it's on The Ohio State University campus. Roughhewn wood and an old jukebox mark the décor of this fairly nondescript hangout. It's not a rock and roll bar as you might expect of the usual college juke joint; instead, blues, soul and jazz bands play Wednesday through Monday and there are bluegrass jams on Tuesday. Phone (614) 268-9573. Also on the OSU campus is the Wexner Center for the Arts, High Street and 15th Avenue, where you can catch underground acts like indie songstress St. Vincent, or enjoy screenings of alternative and foreign films; phone (614) 292-3535.

The **Short North Arts District** has its fair share of evening entertainment and is easy to spot, especially at night, with colorfully lit high arches that stretch over North High Street from one side to the other, luring lounge lizards and barflies like moths to a flame.

If it's cold outside, baby, **Barrel**, 1120 N. High St., has just the thing to warm you up. Have the barkeep mix you a hot toddy from its more than 80 varieties of whiskey, or, if the weather calls for something on the rocks, go for an Old-Fashioned or a Rusty Nail (just like Dad used to drink). This whiskey bar and restaurant is located in a building that was a speakeasy and brothel more than 100 years ago, which adds to its mystique. Phone (614) 564-9058.

Restaurant by day, nightclub by night (and they make a darn good hamburger), **Skully's Music & Diner**, 1151 N. High St., hosts one of the most popular theme nights in town: Thursday's Ladies' 80s. A large, 1950's-style sign grabs your attention outside; inside, leopard print and the color red highlight the décor. Crowds of revelers gather on the large dance floor to groove to alternative, indie and reggae bands; phone (614) 291-8856.

Going downtown? The Arena District has a small but diverse mix of entertainment choices. Conveniently, three of them reside within just a few steps of each other. The Basement, 391 Neil Ave., is the place to go to see the coolest underground acts, both locally and nationally known (at least to those "in the know"), including acts like Fall Out Boy and The Whigs. The dark, intimate space comes complete with thrift-store sofas and graffiti-covered walls. EXPRESS LIVE! (formerly LC Pavilion), 405 Neil Ave., is a concert venue where bands that are too famous to play at the Basement perform. Arctic Monkeys, Buddy Guy, Indigo Girls, Insane Clown Posse and The Killers are just a few current acts that have played here. The walls at A & R Music Bar, 391 Neil Ave., are plastered with 30 years' worth of concert posters and photos of well-known performers. Live bands don't play here, but it's a popular pre- or postgame gathering spot convenient to nearby Huntington Park or Nationwide Arena, as well as a perfect place to stop in for a cocktail after a concert at EXPRESS LIVE!, right next door. Phone (614) 461-5483 for all three Neil Avenue venues.

For something completely different, make your way to **The Big Bang Dueling Piano Bar**, 401 N. Front St. Despite its name, it's not just a couple of pianists having a faceoff. The show, which mixes music and comedy (and alcohol if you so choose), almost always requires audience participation, so be prepared to take part in a singalong or even go on stage, all in the name of a good time. Phone (614) 233-9999.

R Bar Arena, 413 N. Front St. is not your usual sports bar. Yes, it has pool tables, sports memorabilia everywhere you look, beer-drinking sports fans and flat-screen TVs, but take a closer look. This bar is devoted to the sport of ice hockey and the memorabilia (jerseys, hockey sticks, pucks, framed autographs) are covered with the logo of the Columbus Blue Jackets, who play at Nationwide Arena. R Bar is within walking distance of the arena, so it's a natural gathering spot for hockey fans. Phone (614) 221-4950.

### **Big Events**

The **Ohio State University Jazz Festival** in March features college and high school bands. Origami, kitemaking, cultural displays, martial arts performances, cooking demonstrations and an open market selling exotic Asian goods are on tap at the **Asian Festival**, held Memorial Day weekend in Franklin Park.

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The Memorial Tournament in late May and early June epitomizes the rich history and traditions of golf. Started in 1976 by Columbus native Jack Nicklaus, the PGA Tour event takes place at Muirfield Village Golf Club in nearby **Dublin.** A portion of the proceeds benefits Ohio charities.

In June the Columbus Arts Festival features music, dance and theater performances, arts, crafts and food. On the last Sunday in June a walking tour of the renovated homes of German Village is offered in the Haus und Garten Tour. Festivities include gardening demonstrations and a watercolor competition. The city celebrates our nation's independence with Red, White and Boom in July.

If there's one don't-miss festival in town, it's the Columbus **Jazz and Rib Fest** in July. Some 400,000 people bring their bibs to this event, which boasts performances by premier jazz artists and local bands—plus 50 tons of

barbecued ribs. After sampling the award-winning food, relax to mellow tunes.

In late July to early August, Columbus is the home of the **Ohio State Fair,** probably the biggest shindig in the state and one of the largest fairs in the nation. Held at the **Ohio Expo Center** off I-71 between 11th and 17th avenues, the 12-day event, which is attended by more than 800,000, has livestock displays, exhibits, midway rides, entertainment and food. The fair has been held since 1850.

Early August's **Festival Latino** attracts growing crowds with Latin American music and food as well as educational workshops and cultural performances. Traditional and modern music and dance are highlights of the 3-day **Dublin Irish Festival** in August. Cultural draws include Irish storytelling and English Civil War reenactments. Also in August, Reynoldsburg residents celebrate the birth of the commercially sold tomato at the **Reynoldsburg Tomato Festival**.

In September private residences are opened during the Short North Tour of Homes & Gardens. Polka bands, bratwurst, beer and thousands of people combine at the Ohio Expo Center in September to give Columbus one of its grandest celebrations: Columbus Oktoberfest. The month closes out with entertainment, food and music at the Columbus International Festival at Franklin Park Adventure Center.

The Columbus Italian Festival takes place Columbus Day weekend and revolves around St. John the Baptist Catholic Church. The convening of the All American Quarter Horse Congress also in October, brings one of the world's largest quarter horse shows to the city. It attracts more than 650,000 people to the Ohio Expo Center and includes horse-judging contests and educational lectures.

Stand on the sidelines to cheer thousands of runners in the **Columbus Marathon** in October. Ranked as one of the top U.S. marathons, the course is mostly flat with a clover-leaf design, looping through downtown and the surrounding suburbs.

In mid-October, head to Circleville for the **Circleville Pumpkin Show**, which hosts fall exhibits and activities centered around pumpkins.

Wildlights, held mid-November through New Year's in Powell, includes musical performances, animal exhibits at the Columbus Zoo and Aquarium, an ice-skating rink and a display of holiday lights. The year ends with First Night Columbus, a community-wide event featuring dancing, music and fun in downtown.

# Sports & Rec

Columbus does not lack sports enthusiasts. The Ohio State University football commands the attention of the

city on autumn Saturdays; tailgate parties, Buckeye banners and 100,000 fervent fans color horseshoe-shaped **Ohio Stadium** scarlet and gray with excitement. Ohio State also fields competitive **basketball** and **ice hockey** teams. For information contact the OSU ticket office in the Jerome Schottenstein Center at 555 Borror Dr.; phone (614) 292-2624 or (800) 462-8257.

The Columbus Blue Jackets, (614) 246-7825, play NHL hockey at the Nationwide Arena at 200 W. Nationwide Blvd. Two hours before each match, 250 \$10 tickets are released to the public at the box office.

The **Columbus Crew**, (614) 447-2739, plays major league **soccer** at the **MAPFRE Stadium** at the Ohio State Expo Center. The **Ohio Machine** plays major league lacrosse at **Panther Stadium** at Ohio Dominican University.

**Baseball** is also a popular spectator sport in Columbus. The **Columbus Clippers**, the Cleveland Guardians Triple A minor league affiliate, is part of the International League. Games are held downtown at **Huntington Park**; phone (614) 462-5250 or (614) 462-2757 for ticket information.

Horse racing fans have a variety of tracks and styles from which to choose. Harness racing is held May to mid-September at Eldorado Scioto Downs, (614) 295-4700, 6000 S. High St. The biggest pacing event of the year, the Little Brown Jug, is held the third Thursday after Labor Day at the Delaware County Fairgrounds.

For racing fans who demand more horsepower, **stock car racing** is held Saturday nights at 7 p.m. during the summer at the **Columbus Motor Speedway**, (614) 491-1047, at 1845 Williams Rd. **Drag racing** excitement revs engines May through October at **National Trail Raceway**, 2650 National Rd. S.W. in nearby Hebron; phone (740) 928-5706.

Columbus offers an abundance of public **golf** courses, including **Blacklick Woods**, (614) 861-3193, 7309 E. Livingston Ave. in Reynoldsburg; **Raymond Memorial**, (614) 645-3276, 3860 Trabue Rd.; and **Thorn Apple Country Club**, (614) 878-7703, 1051 Alton Darby Creek Rd. in Galloway.

The Memorial Tournament, a 4-day professional golf competition, is held at the end of May or early June at **Muirfield Village**, a course in Dublin designed by Columbus native Jack Nicklaus; phone (614) 889-6712.

Columbus operates an extensive park system with miles of trails for **bicyclists** and **joggers**. One of the most scenic routes takes bicyclists 8 miles along the Olentangy

River. Columbus hosts the Columbus Marathon in October and other long-distance running events throughout the year.

The **Scioto Mile,** running along the riverfront between the Arena District and the Whittier Peninsula, offers more than 145 acres of park space. Visitors can walk along the promenade for great views. There also are fountains, gardens, swings and benches.

**Tennis** courts are abundant in Columbus, with more than 140 run by the city and numerous others at local colleges and high schools. Phone Columbus' Department of Recreation and Parks at (614) 645-3300 for details.

Despite its moderate climate, Columbus is within about an hour's drive of several popular **skiing** areas. **Snow Trails**, (419) 774-9818, is 60 miles northeast near Mansfield and is considered to be Ohio's first ski area. **Mad River Mountain**, (937) 599-1015, or (800) 231-7669 outside Ohio, about 40 miles northwest in Zanesfield, is a large resort with night skiing. *See individual place listings*.

The ProMusica Chamber Orchestra also offers concert series at the Southern Theatre; phone (614) 464-0066. Aspiring musicians comprise The Ohio State University Jazz Ensemble, which performs on campus.

The **Columbus Symphony Orchestra** plays a regular 9-month concert season in the opulent Ohio Theatre, directly across from the Ohio Statehouse *(see attraction listing p. 222)*. The venue is decorated with plaster ceilings, brocaded paneling, gold leaf trim and a chandelier in the grand foyer; phone (614) 469-0939. The symphony also presents pops and chamber music concerts as well as youth concerts. Popular in the summer is Picnic with the Pops, an outdoor concert at the Columbus Commons downtown.

**BILLY IRELAND CARTOON LIBRARY & MUSEUM** is at 1813 N. High St. in Sullivant Hall on The Ohio State University campus. The museum features changing exhibits of artwork and artifacts related to the field of comics and cartoons, and the library contains newspapers, comic strips, cartoons, books and serials. **Time:** Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (614) 292-0538.

COLUMBUS MUSEUM OF ART, 480 E. Broad St., houses art that speaks to diverse interests and styles. The collection includes late 19th- and early 20th-century American and European modern art. The museum also features extraordinary photography and regional collections, where local artists George Bellows, Elijah Pierce and Aminah Brenda Lynn Robinson are represented. In addition, you will see contemporary art, folk art and glass. The new Margaret M. Walter Wing presents traveling exhibitions, and the Patricia M. Jurgensen Sculpture Garden is on the grounds.

COLUMBUS ZOO AND AQUARIUM—See Powell p. 306.

COSI COLUMBUS is off I-70W exit 100B, or I-70E exit 97, following signs to 333 W. Broad St. The dynamic hands-on science center features more than 300 interactive exhibits, and live shows are presented

throughout the themed exhibition areas. Exhibits are designed to teach science to all age levels through play. Some of the science concepts covered include the ocean, outer space, energy, engineering and health.

Daring types will want to ride the high-wire unicycle several stories aboveground across the atrium, a gravity-defying feat that provides a thrill for all visitors. Future doctors may unravel the mysteries of the human body in the Life exhibit, which covers such subjects as exercise, diseases and bones. At Labs in Life, visitors may see researchers using state-of-the-art diagnostic equipment to conduct various studies.

In the Progress exhibit, stroll down the same street as it appeared in 1898 and then in 1962 and see how everyday life changed drastically due to technological advancements. In 1898, exhibits include farm implements, telegraph equipment and a horse-drawn buggy. In 1962, faux storefronts display toys and drugstore products; behind another window, a deejay plays vinyl records at a radio station; and a gas station highlights a gleaming vintage automobile.

Submerse yourself into the world of underwater technology such as sonar and submarines in the Ocean exhibit. Little ones can enter a submersible for a glimpse of underwater life. Explore the concepts of water flow and water bells, and control waves in a tank filled with 1,000 pounds of H20. In the Space exhibit, aspiring astronauts may control a robot on Mars using a robotic rover, pilot a space capsule and learn about gravity and the laws of motion.

In the Gadgets Café, future engineers and scientists can discover the inner workings of machinery through dissecting computers and CD drives, or try their hand at splitting a laser beam or building a bridge. At Big Science Park, kids will feel like superheroes as they lift a car using a lever or move a 2.5-ton granite sphere. There also is a special area for babies up to youngsters in first grade.

Movies are shown on a digital screen in the National Geographic Giant Screen Theater. Live shows include Chemistry LIVE!, Gadgets LIVE!, rat basketball and an electrostatic generator show. The COSI Planetarium features state-of-the-art digital technology that offers a glimpse of the universe through several different experience options.

FRANKLIN PARK CONSERVATORY AND BOTANICAL GARDENS is in Franklin Park at 1777 E. Broad St. The site includes the John F. Wolfe Palm

House, built in 1895 and designed in the style of the Glass Palace at Chicago's World Fair and Columbian Exposition in 1893. Several modern glasshouses are interconnected. Visitors can view more than 400 plant varieties as they travel through simulated habitats of the world, including a tropical rain forest, the Himalayan Mountains, an arid desert and a Pacific Island water garden.

The conservatory also has a bonsai collection, a bride's garden, a 4-acre community garden campus, a 1-mile walking loop and sculptures.

The John F. Wolfe Palm House holds more than 40 species of palms (some are endangered species) and tropical flowers. Light artist James Turrell has dressed up the Palm House with his permanent installation of 7,000 LED bulbs that glow through a changing program each evening from sunset until dawn. Visitors can watch the free show from the Grand Mallway, a large outdoor botanical garden to the west of the Palm House.

Multiple installations from the conservatory's signature collection of Dale Chihuly glass artwork are on long-term display; it's reputedly the only botanical garden in the world to own such a large collection—about 3,000 pieces—by the artist. His glassworks are creatively placed in unexpected places throughout the gardens. Some pieces, tall and spear-shaped in brilliant reds, purples and greens, are interspersed in the foliage and look like they sprouted from the ground.

During the Blooms & Butterflies exhibition, held early March to mid-September, visitors can observe as newly hatched butterflies are released daily, adding splashes of color to the emerald foliage of the Pacific Island Water Garden. The conservatory's holiday exhibition, Merry & Bright, is held from mid-November through early January. Orchids are displayed from mid-January to early March. Glassblowing demonstrations are offered April through December.

JACK NICKLAUS MUSEUM is on The Ohio State University campus between Ackerman Rd. and Lane Ave. at 2355 Olentangy River Rd. The facility includes three theaters, vintage media footage and memorabilia tracing the life and career of the Columbus-born golfer. Among the more than 2,000 pieces on display are his six Masters trophies. Artifacts detail the history of golf from the 1400s to the present. Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (614) 247-5959.

KELTON HOUSE MUSEUM & GARDEN, 586 E. Town St., is a restored 19th-century brick house that reflects Greek Revival and Italianate architectural styles. Most of the furnishings are original and offer insight into the prominent upper-class family who lived here. The house also was a station on the Underground Railroad where escaped slaves from the South were sheltered on their journeys to Canada; an exhibit in the basement offers details about this part of the house's history. The Victorian garden features statuary.

OHIO HISTORY CENTER, off I-71 exit 111 at 800 E. 17th Ave., houses the Ohio History Connection's administrative offices, the state history museum, a historical research library and the state archives. Exhibits at the 271,000-square-foot museum include items related to Ohio's archeological, agricultural, industrial, social and natural history. Galleries feature the state's plants, animals, geology, geography and climate plus a history timeline stretching from the Ice Age through modern times. Touring exhibits also are featured.

Open since 1970, the center is designed in the mid-20th-century-modern Brutalist style and resembles a huge, concrete box floating in the air. As visitors enter the museum, a massive, life-size skeleton of the Conway mastodon welcomes them.

A large portion of the museum chronicles Ohio's role in wars in which the United States took part, from the War of 1812 through World War II, with an emphasis on the Civil War. Displays contain weapons, medical equipment, and uniforms and civilian clothing worn by men, women and children. Restored but well-worn Civil War battle flags are paired with narratives written by soldiers who survived the war. This 15,000-square-foot gallery also provides details about Ohio's progress in agriculture and industry with a collection of more than 5,000 artifacts, including newsreels from the 1920s and vintage 20th-century automobiles.

Ohio's Ancient Past delves into the history of the First Ohioans through displays of arrowheads, pottery, beads and animal effigy pipes. Visitors are invited to handle some of the pieces used regularly by the Native Americans.

Kids can fire up their imaginations through the museum's hands-on activities, such as using computers to learn about Ohio's natural history. A replica of a log cabin with a pioneer kitchen allows children to play dress-up with pioneer clothes and make yarn on a spinning wheel.

#### 222 COLUMBUS — DOWNTOWN COLUMBUS, OH

Ohio's natural history is preserved through a display of mounted animals which includes such specimens as a bear, wolf, cougar, bison, ivory-billed woodpecker and the world's last documented passenger pigeon. Other exhibits devoted to natural history explore Ohio's plant life, geology, geography and climate.

OHIO STATEHOUSE is at Broad and High sts. at 1 Capitol Square; tours depart from the Map Room on the ground floor. Considered to be one of the best examples of Greek Revival architecture in the United States, the 1861 building contains historical documents, portraits and other works commemorating Ohio's noted governors and U.S. presidents. A stained-glass Great Seal of Ohio is in the center of the rotunda dome.

The Ohio Statehouse Museum on the ground floor features a variety of interactive exhibits related to state government and history. The Ohio Holocaust and Liberators Memorial stands on the grounds. Phone: (614) 752-9777 or (888) 644-6123. GT



#### CONNEAUT

The first survey party of the Western Reserve Region reached Conneaut Harbor on July 4, 1796. As settlers arrived, the town adopted the name the Native Americans had given to the nearby river, Conneaut. The word is believed to have come from the Seneca Indians, but there have been several translations and it remains a name of disputed meaning. The body of water is now known as Conneaut Creek State Wild And Scenic River and is a good location for steelhead trout fishing.

The development of industry along Lake Erie's harbor made the town a busy port, with shipments running into millions of tons annually. Visitors can look down and watch the dock activities from the viewing area on Day Street, near Harbor Street.

To see the more recreational side of the lake as well as a good view of the lighthouse, follow Broad Street north to the Conneaut Port Authority. You can drive around the marina and stroll along the walkways; there is ample parking. Boat ramps are open daily May through October. Fishing right off the public dock might yield perch and walleye catches, and ice fishing is possible during winter. Nature trails and a bird observatory have been added to the sandbar that has developed.

Another good spot for lake and lighthouse viewing is nearby Conneaut Township Park, at the junction of Lake Road (SR 531) and Grove Street-both from the bluffs and on the public beach. Stairs lead from the bluff area down to the beach, which is about a half-mile long. There are no lifeguards; use extreme caution in the water due to known undertows. Other park amenities include picnic tables; grills; exercise walkways; boardwalks providing access to the water's edge; and various sports fields and courts, including two boccie courts. Each Thursday night during summer (6-9 p.m., generally the third week in May through September) an antique car show is held here. The number of cars varies, but occasionally it has

reached upwards of 100. The park is also the site of the annual D-Day Conneaut, usually held in mid- or late August. History buffs meet to re-create the Allied troops' June 6, 1944, amphibious landing during World War II in Normandy, France.

Other amenities include summer cottages and a golf course as well as covered bridges on Creek, Middle and State roads. The Conneaut Area Historical Society features local history displays and is open Fri.-Sun. noon to 5 from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Just across the railroad tracks is the Conneaut Historical Railroad Museum.

The Conneaut Arts Center—just above the harbor at 1025 Buffalo St.—offers monthly art exhibits and special events throughout the year, including free concerts on the lawn Wednesday evenings in July. Lake Erie can be seen in the distance. The building was originally known as Kilpi Hall, built in 1899 as a Finnish meeting hall; phone (440) 593-5888.

ROSCOE VILLAGE is at 600 N. Whitewoman St. The restored 1830s Ohio & Erie Canal town has living-history buildings, a museum, restaurants and quaint shops. The Living History Tour features costumed interpreters. Adjacent to the property are the milelong foot and bicycle Towpath trail and Lake Park, a recreational complex. Horse-drawn canal boat rides are offered at the Canal Boat Landing.

The visitor center includes a lock model and a gristmill model as well as dioramas depicting the construction of the canal. The center's theater shows the 15-minute "Ditches of Destiny" video. Annual festivals and special events are held throughout the year.

# CUYAHOGA VALLEY NATIONAL PARK

Between Cleveland and Akron, Cuyahoga Valley National Park encompasses 33,000 acres of valley along a 22-mile section of the Cuyahoga River. The area is characterized by a river flood plain, streams, creeks, forested valleys and upland plateaus. It offers picnicking, hiking, bicycle trails, horse trails, winter sports, ranger-guided programs and an excursion railroad. Special events are held throughout the year.

The reconstructed Ohio & Erie Canal Towpath Trail runs the length of the park and parallels remnants of the Ohio & Erie Canal and the twisting Cuyahoga River. Many historical structures, canal locks and wayside exhibits highlighting the history of the Cuyahoga Valley can be seen along the trail.

The 65-foot Brandywine Falls, on Brandywine Road in Sagamore Hills, is set amid red maple trees and is one of many spectacular natural features in the park. This popular site has a boardwalk leading into the waterfall's gorge, allowing for close-up looks. Tinkers Creek Gorge and the Ritchie Ledges are additional natural features where there are overlooks for sightseeing. A beautiful man-made structure can be found in the Everett Road Covered Bridge in Peninsula. This 1980s reconstruction of the late 19th-century one that used to occupy the site is about a half-mile west of Riverview Road.

Beaver Marsh, on Riverview Road in Cuyahoga Falls, is a good destination for wildlife viewing. You can park at Ira Trailhead and walk the Towpath Trail north to the boardwalk, where you might see beavers, otters, birds, frogs, muskrats and turtles.

The national park has one main visitor center and one canal-themed attraction (see attraction listings). The Boston Store Visitor Center is at 1550 Boston Mills Rd.. east of Riverview Road, in Peninsula. It offers a comprehensive overview of the national park and offers park planning. The Canal Exploration Center is in the northern tip of the park at 7104 Canal Rd. at jct. Hillside Road in Valley View. It features interactive and in-depth exhibits focused on canal history.

The Winter Sports Center, located within Kendall Lake Shelter on Truxell/Kendall Park Rd. between Akron Cleveland and Akron Peninsula roads in Peninsula, offers ski and snowshoe instruction programs and cross-country ski and snowshoe rentals on a first-come, first-served basis (weather permitting). Boston Mills Ski Resort in Peninsula as well as Brandywine Ski Resort and Polar Blast snow tubing park in Sagamore Hills offer additional winter fun. Special events, including lectures and concerts, are held at Happy Days Lodge, 1 mile west of SR 8 at 500 W. Streetsboro Rd. (SR 303) in Peninsula.

The park and Towpath Trail are open daily 24 hours except for Brandywine Falls, the Ledges, the Octagon shelter, Kendall Lake, the Kendall Hill area on Quick Road and the Happy Days south parking area, which are open dawn-dusk. Hours vary at Kendall Lake Winter Sports Center; phone ahead. Flooding after heavy rains may cause some sections of the park to close. Some areas may be closed part of the year to protect nesting bald eagles. Phone Boston Store Visitor Center at (330) 657-2752 to confirm hours of operations for park facilities.

**ADMISSION** to the park is free.

**PETS** must be restricted at all times, either in vehicles or by leash (no longer than 6 feet), and are not allowed in public buildings or on the train. Pet owners must clean up and dispose of pet waste and should not leave pets unattended in vehicles. Service animals are permitted in all areas of the park.

BOSTON STORE VISITOR CENTER is just e. of Riverview Rd. at 1550 Boston Mills Rd. in Peninsula. The circa 1836 Boston Store is the main visitor center for Cuyahoga Valley National Park. Interactive canal boatbuilding exhibits occupy the space that once served as a warehouse, a post office and the Boston Land and Manufacturing Company Store. The building features canal maps, tools, photographs, building diagrams and a cross-section of a canal boat made by a Hale Farm woodworker. Phone: (330) 657-2752.

CANAL EXPLORATION CENTER is 1.5 mi. s. of Rockside Rd. at 7104 Canal Rd. at jct. Hillside Rd. in Valley View. Once used as a tavern, a general store and a residence, it now is a newly revised center offering exhibits, some of which are interactive, about the Ohio & Erie Canal. The exhibits connect topics relating to progress in the canal era that are relevant today: immigration, transportation and a free market economy. The general store sells a selection of goods reminiscent of the canal era.

#### **DAYTON**

Dayton is at the confluence of three rivers and two creeks that drain the upper portion of the rich Miami Valley. The site was first surveyed in November 1795, and the following spring three small groups of settlers named the new settlement in honor of Gen. Jonathan Dayton. Today Dayton is home to more than 830 high-technology companies.

Many original buildings still stand in one of the city's first communities, now known as the Oregon Historic District. This 12-block area is bordered by E. 5th Street, Wayne Avenue, US 35 and S. Patterson Boulevard.

Dayton was the home of the Wright brothers. Both are buried at Woodland Cemetery and Arboretum, 118 Woodland Ave.

Wright-Patterson Air Force Base (see Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park attraction listings), contiquous to Dayton and Fairborn, is headquarters of the Air

Force Material Command, the acquisition, procurement, maintenance, transportation and supply agency for the U.S. Air Force. It also is the home of the Air Force Institute of Technology, the service's graduate school for engineers.

Courthouse Square, at 3rd and Main streets, is the center of downtown and the site of many events such as concerts and impromptu entertainment. At 130 Riverside Dr. is the Ohio Korean War Memorial and Veterans Walkway.

Dayton is the home of 17,000-student Wright State University as well as the University of Dayton. The Cincinnati Reds' Class A minor league team, the Dayton Dragons, play at Fifth Third Field.

Downtown Dayton features RiverScape MetroPark, an attractively landscaped park with gardens and reflecting pools. A host of activities such as free summer concerts, fitness programs, community festivals and family walks take place in the park. Bicycles and kayaks can be rented as well. In winter visitors can skate on an outdoor iceskating rink, enjoy festive light displays and partake in other family activities.

The five sites to visit are Carillon Historical Park, Huffman Prairie Flying Field and Interpretive Center at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base (also the site of the Wright Brothers Memorial), Paul Laurence Dunbar House, and The Wright Cycle Co. Complex (see attraction listings). Tours of Hawthorn Hill, home to Orville Wright for nearly 35 years, are available by appointment.

Carillon Historical Park, at 1000 Carillon Blvd., is part of the Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park. The 30 structures on the 65-acre campus relate America's development over the past 2 centuries, with emphasis on the contributions made by Dayton's heritage of creativity and invention in transportation. A presentation features animatronic figures representing the Wright brothers. Charles Kettering and two

other Dayton industrialists sharing the story of how Dayton changed the world.

The John W. Berry, Sr. Wright Brothers National Museum displays the original 1905 *Wright Flyer III*, the first practical airplane. Other displays include a 1930s print shop, vintage bicycles, antique automobiles and a 1903 Barney & Smith parlor car. The attraction is also home to the Deeds Carillon, a carousel, a restored canal lock and a 1796 log tavern, purportedly the oldest building in Dayton. **Time:** Allow 2 hours minimum. **Phone:** (937) 293-2841.

Huffman Prairie Flying Field and Interpretive Center is 5 mi. n. on SR 4 to SR 444, then e. on Kauffman Rd. to 2380 Memorial Rd., adjacent to Gate 16B on Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. The flying field, part of the Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park, was used by the Wright brothers for test flying and crafting their airplanes and piloting skills. Tests were conducted in 1904-05, and in 1910 the brothers established a school of flight on the site. The Interpretive Center contains exhibits about the Air Force Base and the brothers' perfection of flight.

Adjacent to the interpretive center is the Wright Brothers Memorial, erected in 1940. The 27-acre site overlooks Huffman Prairie Flying Field. **Time:** Allow 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (937) 425-0008.

Paul Laurence Dunbar House is at 219 N. Paul Laurence Dunbar St. and is part of the Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park. along with thousands of personal artifacts, photographs and documents. The museum showcases the early days of military flight to today's war on terrorism.

The collection includes the B-29 Bockscar that dropped the atomic bomb on Nagasaki, Japan, during World War II; Air Force One used by all presidents from Kennedy through Clinton; a B-2 stealth bomber; and NASA's first Crew Compartment Trainer, which aided in astronaut training. Visitors will find out how astronauts trained for their missions and get a detailed look at what their living quarters were like aboard the shuttle. Movies are shown in a digital 3-D theater, and special events are held throughout the year.

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

The bonny city of Dublin was originally settled by a German family in 1801, who were assisted in surveying the town by Irishman John Shields. To show their appreciation, they allowed Shields to name the area. In accepting, he said: "If I have the honor conferred upon me to name your village, with the brightness of the morn, and the beaming of the sun on the hills and dales surrounding this beautiful valley, it would give me great pleasure to name your new town after my birthplace, Dublin, Ireland."

The settlement began to flourish in 1833, when the National Road reached Columbus and canals were completed. However, when the Columbus, Piqua and Indiana Railroad bypassed Dublin its heydays ended and it became just a trade center for the nearby farmers. Prosperity once more came in 1970 when the I-70 bypass, I-270, linked Dublin with Columbus, and the transformation from a village of 861 residents into a city began.

Today, low limestone fences form a border between emerald-green lawns and local roads in this quaint Columbus suburb. Historic Dublin, on North and South High Street and South Riverview Street roughly between Bridge Street and Waterford Drive/Short Street, contains examples of 19th-century architecture on a streetscape as well-scrubbed as a Hollywood movie set. Fronted by brick sidewalks, the same 19th-century buildings now house lovely shops, galleries, pubs and cafés. Have the barkeep pour you an Irish whiskey or choose from a list of more than 60 imports, crafts and microbrews at Brazenhead Irish Pub, 56 N. High St.; the pub is named after Ireland's oldest pub, established in 1198, and its owners have faithfully created a near-perfect Irish pub experience, down to the drawing room fireplace and the bar itself. At Ha'Penny

Bridge Imports, 75 S. High St., experience shopping in Ireland without the expensive airfare and peruse the historic home's collection of Galway Irish crystal, fine jewelry, wool sweaters, and other fine imported goods from the motherland.

Have fun outdoors courtesy of the city's 1,500 acres of parkland and the town's proximity to the Scioto River. Ninety-six miles of bike trails connect 56 parks that feature hardwood forests and wetlands. Area parks feature playgrounds, basketball and tennis courts, and fishing ponds. Check out the fishing pier and pond, sensory garden and restored log cabin at the M.L. Red Trabue Nature Reserve, 6500 Post Rd. Test your disc-tossing skills at a 9-hole disc golf course across from Balgriffin Park, 5715 Norn St. Phone (614) 410-4400 for further park information.

Dublin's parks also are home to outdoor art installations. A 12-foot-tall sculpture of Wyandot Native American "Chief Leatherlips," made of stacks of native limestone, resides at Scioto Park; in the whimsical "Field of Corn (with Osage Orange Trees)," 109 gigantic ears of corn stand at attention in Sam and Eulalia Frantz Park.

Although their ancestry may not be entirely Irish, Dublin townspeople embrace the folklore of its namesake city. That includes hosting several Celtic-themed events each year. The 3-day Dublin Irish Festival is held in late July or early August at Coffman Park and has drawn more than 100,000 guests. The celebration showcases Irish culture with an assortment of entertainment and activities, including Irish storytelling, sporting events, musical performances, professional genealogy services and craft workshops; even the town's fire hydrants are painted green.

Do the jig, do a jog at the annual St. Patrick's Day Parade in mid-March. The event features an Irish breakfast,

a 5K run through town and a 90-minute parade with Irish dancers and marching bands playing traditional Irish music. The Blarney Bash, featuring live music, food trucks, beer and Irish dancers, begins immediately after the parade and continues into the evening. Venues throughout town also celebrate the day with Irish step dancing, classic Irish cuisine, music by bagpipe and drum corps, activities for wee ones and a pot of gold relay.

The Abbey Theater of Dublin, located in the Dublin Community Recreation Center, 5600 Post Rd., presents children's theater and holiday programs such as "A Christmas Carol." Phone (614) 410-4550 for schedules.

#### EAST LIVERPOOL

Founded in 1798 on the banks of the Ohio River, East Liverpool was once a leading producer of pottery. Surrounded by an area rich in natural clays and coal, the city manufactured about half the nation's pottery until the industry declined in the early 1930s. The city's downtown sits along the route of the Old Lincoln Highway and is near the first survey line for the Northwest Territory.

MUSEUM OF CERAMICS is at 400 E. Fifth St. in the renovated 1909 post office building. The Beaux Arts structure features decorated domed ceilings, antique glass pendant lamps, and marble and terrazzo floors. Exhibits trace the rise and decline of the ceramics industry in East Liverpool 1840-1930 and its effects on the town and its people. Since the late 19th century, area potteries in the town have been producing more than half of the nation's ceramic products.

The ceramics collection spans three centuries. The collection features WPA-era paintings and a large display of Victorian Lotus Ware porcelain, which won the gold medal at the 1893 Columbian Exposition in Chicago. A 10minute video introduces the history of East Liverpool and the pottery industry. Life-size dioramas include a jigger

shop, kiln and a decorating shop while photographs, charts and maps trace local history. Also displayed are an 1850s two-person potter's wheel, murals and paintings from the 1930s and early 1940s, six rare 1900s Craven Art Pottery objects, a 1930s Fiesta Ware tray with Art Deco handle and a 1940s Hall China Donut Teapot.

The 1835 Monteith Hall, now home to the Elyria Woman's Club, was built by Rev. John Monteith, an abolitionist who used his home as a station on the Underground Railroad. The basement led to the Black River via a tunnel, and fugitive slaves staved in the house until safe passage to Lorain and then to Canada could be arranged. The tunnel no longer exists as it was filled in to avoid an impending collapse. Phone (440) 322-0524.

The 1867 City Hall faces historic Ely Square, which is home to the Elyria Veterans' Memorial and the Civil War Memorial as well as a fountain, gazebo, picnic tables and benches. The fountain is not the original, but one has been on this site since 1851; it operates mid-May to mid-October. During summer there are live music performances and festivals, and it is decorated with a lovely light display during the holiday season.

A library (open by appointment only) at the Lorain County History Center, 284 Washington Ave., offers genealogical information; phone (440) 322-3341.

Author Sherwood Anderson, born in nearby Camden in 1876, lived in Elyria for several years in the early 20th century and supported his family by making and selling roofing products. One of his well-known works is "Winesburg, Ohio." Nearby Lorain was the 1931 birthplace and childhood home of author and Nobel Laureate Toni Morrison.

Founded as Fort Hamilton in 1791, Hamilton became a prosperous industrial community due to immigrant labor and canals. In the late 1820s a wharf basin was dug, linking the town to the Miami and Erie Canal. At the same time an influx of German and Irish immigrants provided the labor for new enterprises.

Heavy industry expanded when Hamilton Hydraulic was completed in 1852. In addition to industry, the Hamilton region enjoys the agricultural yields of the fertile Great Miami River Valley. Hamilton's historic houses and commercial buildings, which show a variety of architectural styles, are concentrated in three districts: Rossville, Dayton Lane and German Village.

On Monument Avenue, the Soldiers, Sailors and Pioneers Monument is topped by a 17-foot brass figure of a Civil War private. The monument contains a library with the names of all Ohioans who served in the Civil War and World War I as well as exhibits containing military weapons, uniforms and medals; phone (513) 867-5823.

In mid- or late January, WiceFest brings in ice sculptors from around the world for this exciting competition held downtown.

**NEWARK EARTHWORKS** is comprised of three sites: Great Circle is 1 mi. s.w. of SR 16 at 455 Hebron Rd. (SR 79); Wright Earthworks can be viewed from James Street, near jct. SR 79 and Grant St. in nearby Newark; and Octagon Earthworks is at jct. N. 33rd St. and Parkview Rd. in Newark. The memorial preserves a portion of the Newark Earthworks, a system of prehistoric mounds used for astronomical, ceremonial and social purposes; they are believed to be the largest such mounds ever built.

Great Circle is 1,200 feet in diameter with grasscovered earthen walls ranging from 8 to 14 feet in height. In the center are four lower connected mounds. On the

# HOPEWELL CULTURE NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

The park preserves six earthwork complexes concentrated in the Scioto River valley: High Bank Works, Hopeton Earthworks, Hopewell Mound Group, Mound City Group, Seip Earthworks and Spruce Hill Earthworks.

The Mound City Group is about 3 miles north of Chillicothe on SR 104. This 120-acre tract with a 13-acre earth wall enclosure preserves at least 23 prehistoric burial mounds that lie within a low embankment. Native Americans of the Hopewell Culture, who inhabited the area about 2,000 years ago, were noted for their artistry and their practice of building enormous geometric earthworks as ceremonial sites. These artisans fashioned ornaments from materials foreign to Ohio.

The Mound City Group visitor center contains exhibits and public facilities, including an auditorium with a 21minute orientation film and recorded description about the history of the site. Marked trails and trailside exhibits also can be found. Pets must remain on a leash.

Seip Earthworks, about 2 mi. e. of Bainbridge on US 50. is a 10-acre site containing the great central mound (240 ft. long, 160 ft. wide and 30 ft. high) of a group of geometric earthworks built by the Hopewell Indians for ceremonial purposes. A trail and wayside exhibits help visitors understand the park.

Allow 1 hour minimum. The Hopewell Mound Group, Mound City Group and Seip Earthworks are open daily dawn-dusk. High Bank and Hopeton earthworks are only open during special events. Mound City Group visitor center open daily 8:30-5 (also 5-6, Memorial Day-Labor Day); closed Jan. 1, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Free. Phone (740) 774-1126.

Jackson was settled by accident in the early 1800s when a group of Welsh immigrants traveling down the Ohio River was stranded in Gallipolis after its boats were stolen. Making the best of the situation, the six families decided to stay.

Copies of a pamphlet describing Welsh communities in America brought more Welsh settlers to the area. Many of the men took jobs working on the Gallipolis/Chillicothe

road and at the many coal mines and iron furnaces in Jackson County. The region's once-great iron industry has since diversified into aluminum, wood and plastic products, and food processing.

### **KENT**

Established in 1910 as Kent Normal School, a teachertraining facility, Kent State University has earned many national and international distinctions, including recognition by The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching for its optimal blending of teaching and research.

The combined enrollment on its eight campuses is more than 42,000. Of interest on the nearly 28,000-student Kent campus are the planetarium, art galleries, gardens, the Liquid Crystal Institute and the Kent State University Museum (see attraction listing).

The Kent State University campus is also home to the May 4th Site, Memorial and Visitors Center, which



commemorate the events of May 4, 1970, when four students were killed and nine wounded by the Ohio National Guard troops during a protest against the Vietnam War. The memorial sits on a sloped, wooded area at the northern corner of Taylor Hall overlooking the University Commons. Every spring the bloom of the 58,175 daffodils planted at the site symbolizes the nation's losses in Vietnam. For the 40th anniversary of the events, seven trail markers with descriptions, maps and pictures were installed so visitors can walk part of the campus and learn about what occurred that day. To further enhance their self-guiding walking tour, visitors can call (330) 672-6294 to hear audio narration on their cellphone by civil rights activist and NAACP Chairman Emeritus Julian Bond.

KENT STATE UNIVERSITY MUSEUM is in Rock-well Hall at 515 Hillton Dr at ict F Main and S well Hall at 515 Hilltop Dr. at jct. E. Main and S. Lincoln sts. This 1927 Beaux-Arts building was the college's first library. Focusing on fashion and decorative arts, the museum houses one of the nation's largest and finest collections of 18th- through 21st-century American and European gowns and traditional dress. Also featured are historic women's periodicals, international textiles, decorative arts, collectible glass and paintings. Eight galleries feature changing exhibitions from a permanent collection of nearly 40,000 pieces.

### **KIRTLAND**

The first permanent settler came to this area in 1811, and the township was formed in 1822. In 1831 the settlement expanded when Mormon leader Joseph Smith and many of his followers arrived; Smith wrote much of the doctrine of the Church of Latter Day Saints while he lived here. Nearly 3,000 people lived in Kirtland by the time the Mormons moved westward in 1838.

Today this historic village is known for its amenities, both man-made and natural. Lakeland Community College occupies 400 rolling, wooded acres. Chapin Forest Reservation's 390 acres offer an opportunity to picnic or hike.

HISTORIC KIRTLAND is at jct. SR 306 and SR 615 (Chillicothe Rd.) The village interprets the history of Kirtland and the Mormon Church in America. In the 1830s Joseph Smith Jr., leader and first president of the Mormon Church, established church headquarters at Kirtland. Meticulously restored structures—such as Newel K. and Elizabeth Ann Whitney Home, Johnson Inn, the 1826 Newel K. Whitney Store, an ashery, a sawmill, a schoolhouse—and two farms convey the history of the community.

Kirtland Temple is at 9020 Chillicothe Rd. near Historic Kirtland; tours begin at the nearby visitor center at 7809 Joseph St. Kirtland once was home to some of the 19th century's most successful community builders. Under the leadership of Joseph Smith Jr., followers built this temple 1833-36. In 1838 it was the center of community life for more than 2,000 believers; within a year, only 100 members remained. Guided 1-hour tours begin with an audiovisual presentation.

LAKE METROPARKS FARMPARK is 4.5 mi. s. of I-90 on SR 306 to SR 6, then 1 mi. e. at 8800 Euclid Chardon Rd. This 235-acre park is a science and educational center dedicated to explaining how farmers raise food, fiber and other agricultural products that sustain and enhance human life. Visitors can milk a cow, take a wagon ride, watch border collies skillfully herding, meet more than 50 breeds of farm animals and on weekends watch an ice cream production demonstration.

Visitors can explore plant life in The Great Tomato Works and Hydroponics exhibits, established orchards, vineyards, themed gardens and field crops areas. Renewable energy sources such as wind and solar power are explored and explained. Seasonal activities include maple

sugaring and cider pressing. A corn maze is open mid-August to early October. Vintage Ohio Wine Festival takes place in early August.

LAKE METROPARKS PENITENTIARY GLEN NATURE CENTER is at 8668 Kirtland-Chardon Rd. The center is on 424 acres and is part of the early 20th-century estate of Sam and Blanche Halle. A deep gorge divides the park, which features fields, forests and wetlands, a butterfly garden, wildlife center, live animal displays and a nature center with interactive exhibits and art shows. Native son Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman is honored with a statue at the intersection of Main and Broad streets on Zane Square.

Preserving the city's heritage are the early 19th-century houses on Square 13, which is bounded by N. High, Broad, Main and Wheeling streets.

Logan is the county seat of Hocking County, which is known for its scenic natural attributes. Clay pottery was one of the area's first industries. Rolling hills, craggy cliffs, caves and cascading waterfalls pepper the area, providing ample opportunities for hiking, canoeing and horseback riding. The day-use Lake Logan State Park (see Recreation Areas Chart) is 4 miles west of Logan off SR 664; catches include bluegill, crappie, bass, muskie, catfish, northern pike and saugeve.

A museum area showcases the company's history.

HOCKING HILLS STATE PARK is in Hocking State Forest, 10 mi, s.w. of US 33 at 19852 SR 664 S. This 2,356-acre area boasts cliffs, a river, waterfalls and hemlock-shaded gorges. About 110 kinds of birds are known to nest in the park—50 species spend the winter, and others are migratory.

Rock formations include cross-bedding and honeycomb weathering. The park's caves attracted indigenous people; evidence of the ancient Adena culture dates from more than 7,000 years ago. Native American tribes visited or lived here during the 1700s, including the Delaware, Shawnee and Wyandot. They called the river Hockhocking because of its gourd-shaped valley.

More than 25 miles of trails wind through the park's gorges and ridges. A swimming pool is open Memorial Day through Labor Day. See Recreation Areas Chart. Phone: (740) 385-6842, or (866) 644-6727 for camping reservations. 🖍 🖷 🔀

Ash Cave is 15 mi. s. of Logan and 5 mi. e. of South Bloomingville on SR 56, within Hocking Hills State Park; the park office is at 19852 SR 664 S. A semicircular recess, the cave is 700 feet long and 90 feet high. A stream falls from the cave's roof into a splash pool. The guartermile trail leading to the cave is wheelchair and stroller accessible. Phone: (740) 385-6842.

Cantwell Cliffs are 12 mi. w. of Logan and 5 mi. s.w. of Rockbridge on SR 374, within Hocking Hills State Park; the park office is at 19852 SR 664 S. The area consists of 386 acres of impressive cliffs and a deeply cut, rugged glen. Phone: (740) 385-6842.

Cedar Falls is 13 mi. s. of Logan and 2 mi. n. of Ash Cave on SR 374, within Hocking Hills State Park; the park office is at 19852 SR 664 S. The area includes 50 acres. A path leads from Old Man's Cave up the gorge of Clear Creek. Cedar Falls is found at the head of the gorge; just below it is a saltpeter cave. A 3-mile trail connects with Old Man's Cave. Conkles Hollow Nature Preserve is 14 mi. s.w. of Logan and 4 mi. n. of South Bloomingville on SR 374, within Hocking Hills State Park; the park office is at 19852 SR 664 S. This rugged 87-acre area contains 200-foot cliffs studded with waterfalls and a deep gorge. The area is explored by a gorge trail accessible for wheelchairs and strollers or a strenuous rim trail that offers sweeping vistas. Phone: (740) 385-6842.

**Old Man's Cave** is 12 mi. s.w. of Logan within Hocking Hills State Park, behind the park office at 19852 SR 664 S. The 417-acre area features 2 miles of a heavily wooded, winding ravine, picturesque waterfalls, two recessed caves and interesting rock formations. A visitor center offers displays. Rose Lake, accessible by a halfmile walk, is stocked with trout annually; a fishing license is required. ### MANSFIELD

Mansfield was laid out in 1808 under the direction of Surveyor General of the United States Jared Mansfield. As the surrounding lands were cleared and cultivated in the 1820s. Mansfield became a center of trade and commerce. In the late 1840s and 1850s the arrivals of the railroads and telegraph drew the first industries, such as the Ohio Brass Co. and Aultman and Taylor, makers of threshing machines.

Pulitzer Prize-winning author Louis Bromfield is a native of Mansfield. John Sherman, brother of Gen. William T. Sherman and author of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, practiced law here for a time. Mansfield also has fostered artists. Displays of their works, including acrylic paintings, watercolors, photographs, quilts and weavings, can be seen at the Mansfield Art Center, 700 Marion Ave; phone (419) 756-1700.

Self-guiding tours: The convention and visitors bureau offers brochures detailing a driving tour of local film sites used in the 1994 movie "The Shawshank Redemption." Among the locations are the 1896 Ohio State Reformatory, Oak Tree and Central Park.

BIBLEWALK is .5 mi. n. of US 30 via SR 545 at 500 Tingley Ave. This wax museum brings the Bible to life with five different tours, each with an accompanying non-denominational audiovisual presentation. The Life of Christ and the Miracles of the Old Testament each last 60 minutes. The Museum of Christian Martyrs, the Heart of the Reformation and Amazing Grace: The Journeys of Paul each last 30 minutes. Forty-eight pioneers led by Rufus Putnam arrived in Marietta during April 1788. They platted the future community, built a land office, erected a fort and chose the name Marietta in honor of Queen Marie Antoinette, in recognition of the aid rendered to the Colonies by France during the American Revolution.

In Muskingum Park is the Memorial to the Start Westward, a stone sculpture created by Mount Rushmore sculptor Gutzon Borglum to commemorate the opening of

the Northwest Territory and the 150th anniversary of the Northwest Ordinance of 1787.

Marietta also serves as the southern terminus for the Covered Bridge Scenic Byway that runs through Wayne National Forest (see place listing p. 329).

Early settlers of Marietta built the fortification to protect the settlement from Native American attacks known as Campus Martius, Latin for "Field of Mars," the military camp where the legions of ancient Rome

trained. Exhibits re-create the founding and early development of Marietta as the first organized American settlement in the Northwest Territory. Exhibits and artifacts focusing on Appalachian migration into Ohio 1850-1970 are included. The museum encloses the Rufus Putnam House, home to the settlement's leader, and the only surviving dwelling of the original settlement.

Ohio River Museum and the W.P. Snyder Jr. are at Washington, Front and St. Clair sts., 1 blk. w. of the Campus Martius Museum. #### **MARION**

In 1821 the combination of a steady diet of salt pork and a lack of water caused Jacob Foos to dig into a few feet of moist dirt. Discovering an abundant spring, he named the site Jacob's Well, and the area grew to become the county seat. The town was renamed in honor of Revolutionary War general Francis Marion, the "Swamp Fox."

Marion's economy, once based on the manufacture of the steam shovel and road roller, now depends on such agricultural goods as dairy products and popping corn. The Marion Popcorn Festival, held the first weekend after Labor Day, celebrates the area's beloved snack.

Architect John Eberson's Marion Palace Theatre, 276 W. Center St., opened in 1928 and remains a focal point of the city. This atmospheric theater features seats and a stage curtain in vibrant reds, and the rest of the interior—complete with a night sky overhead—looks like a European courtyard. The event schedule consists of local theater and touring productions along with movies and musical acts. Guided theater tours are available by appointment; phone (740) 383-2101.

THE WARREN G. HARDING PRESIDENTIAL SITES can be accessed at 380 Mount Vernon Ave., 4 mi. w. of SR 23 on SR 95. The site includes the Warren

G. Harding Presidential Library and Museum, the Harding Memorial and the former president's private residence. The Queen Anne-style Victorian house is where Harding conducted his "front porch" campaign in the 1920 presidential election. Visitors can see a portion of the more than 5,000 original objects in the Harding Collections, including White House items, clothing, furniture, gaslight fixtures and original furnishings.

In the back of the house, the former campaign press building— a catalog kit home— contains exhibits about the press. The election of 1920 was not all the reporters covered; some documented the apples eaten from the backyard. The apple trees have been restored in the back along with a horshoe pit, where Harding and reporters once played..

The adjacent museum features white brick reminiscent of the White House, U.S. Capitol and Ohio Statehouse. In addition to a lobby, there are changing exhibits as well as a research center and secure storage space featuring the Harding Presidential Papers and other historical documents and objects. **Time:** Allow 1 hour, 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (740) 387-9630 or (800) 600-6894.

Harding Memorial is on Delaware Ave. (SR 423) at Vernon Heights Blvd., about 1 mi. s. of The Warren G. Harding Presidential Sites. The circular, pillared monument is made of white Georgian marble. 

# MASSILLON

# Hotels p. 284

Named for Bishop Jean-Baptiste Massillon, a clergyman and writer at the French court of Louis XIV, Massillon came into being in the 19th century when five villages joined together. The city prospered during the Ohio & Erie Canal era, thrived as a site of steam engine manufacturing in the latter half of the 1800s and continued to grow as a center of steel production through the first half of the 1900s.

Massillon's heritage is most visible in the 19th-century architecture of its downtown area and brick-paved Fourth Street historic district between Lincoln Way and Cherry Road. One of the most notable buildings in this area is the three-story Five Oaks house at 210 Fourth St. This Romanesque-Gothic structure was designed in the early 1890s by noted architect Charles Schweinfurth, designer of many of the mansions on Cleveland's Millionaires' Row. St. Mary Church, an impressive Gothic-style stone church

at 206 Cherry Rd N.E., was begun in 1876 and dedicated in 1892.

Artist Eric Grohe's three downtown murals depict vibrant and colorful scenes. The "Ohio & Erie Canal" at 39 Lincoln Way West portrays the days when the canal ran through the town, and "A Century of Heroes" captures high school football glory at 50 Lincoln Way East. Grohe created a scene perfect for storytelling with his "55 Diamond Court" mural at 32 E. Erie Street South; the painting portrays a brick building with lots of windows and lively occupants.

One of Massillon's historic houses, Spring Hill, off Wales Rd. N.E. at 1401 Springhill Ln. N.E., was built about 1821 and was a stop on the Underground Railroad. The grounds of the restored house have herb and flower gardens, a smokehouse, springhouse and other outbuildings; phone (330) 833-6749 for tour information.

### **MAUMEE**

During the late 18th century much of Ohio's Native American population was concentrated along the Maumee River, a vital link to the British army post in Detroit, Mich. Repeated Native American raids delayed settlement of the area until 1794, when American forces led by Gen. Anthony Wayne won the decisive Battle of Fallen Timbers.

The War of 1812 permanently secured the area for the United States, and Maumee was founded in 1817 by William Oliver, a former scout and officer at nearby Fort



Meigs (see attraction listing p. 302). A blockhouse and stockade of the fort can be seen from the old canal towpath. By the mid-1800s the Miami and Erie Canal had

made Maumee a center of trade and commerce. The locks that connected the Maumee River and the canal can be seen in Side Cut Metropark; (419) 407-9700.



JAMES A. GARFIELD NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE is 2 mi. e. of I-90 on US 20 at 8095 Mentor Ave. A 45-minute guided tour takes visitors through the home of the 20th president. The memorial library, added by Lucretia Garfield after her husband's death, and Garfield's private study as well as many original furnishings and memorabilia belonging to the family, who remained in the house until the 1930s, can be seen. A fireproof vault is a highlight of the tour. Outbuildings include the campaign office, a barn and a windmill.

The 1893 carriage house has been repurposed and is now a visitor center with exhibits about Garfield's life, covering his childhood on the Western Reserve; education; service during the Civil War to the Union army and in the House of Representatives; presidential election; and his assassination, funeral and memorial. An 18-minute biographical film is shown throughout the day.

Special themed tours are given regularly and include a 2-hour behind-the-scenes tour that includes the basement, attic and outbuildings and a 90-minute tour focusing on Garfield's Civil War service. 

Founded in the early 1800s on a bluff overlooking the Huron River, Milan overcame its landlocked handicap by building a canal to the river, which flows into Lake Erie. By the early 1840s, with the canal newly completed, Milan was booming as one of the largest wheat-shipping centers in the country.

The prosperity lasted until the town refused right-of-way to the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railroad. The railroad went through Norwalk instead, and Milan's commerce abruptly declined. To add to the city's problems, deforestation caused the river to diminish and become unnavigable. By the 1870s the canal was abandoned, and Milan entered an era of light industry and farming.

EDISON BIRTHPLACE MUSEUM is at 9 N. Edison Dr. This is the house where inventor Thomas A. Edison, born in 1847, spent his first 7 years. Guided 45- to 60-minute tours of the well-preserved house are available.



The site of several large prehistoric Native American mounds, Newark was founded in 1802 by a New Jersey man who named the new plot after his hometown. Like its namesake, Newark became a busy center of trade and industry, especially after the completion of the Ohio & Erie Canal in 1832 and the arrival of railroads in the 1850s.

A monument commemorating the canal's groundbreaking ceremony, presided over by New York governor DeWitt Clinton on July 4, 1825, is 3 miles south on SR 79. Also of interest is Cranberry Island on nearby Buckeye Lake in Buckeye Lake State Park (see Recreation Areas Chart). The island is a sphagnum bog that was formed at the end of the ice age; it contains various species of plants, including alder bush, sundew and poison sumac. Due to the island's fragile state, though, access is by guided tour only; phone (740) 929-1998.

Not to be missed by vaudeville, film and architecture buffs is the Midland Theatre, an opulent 1928 movie palace that reopened in 2002 following an 8-year, \$8.5 million renovation and restoration. Marble columns, a gilded proscenium arch, and an alabaster chandelier suspended from an ornate medallion grace the interior of the Spanish motif, 1,200-seat structure at 36 N. Park Pl. Guided tours sometimes are available on a walk-in basis or by appointment. For a schedule of live and film offerings or for tour information phone (740) 345-5483.

The former Longaberger National Headquarters at 1500 E. Main St., a seven-story replica of a Longaberger market basket, will surely catch your eye.

THE DAWES ARBORETUM is 5 mi. s. on SR 13 to 7770 Jacksontown Rd. The nearly 2,000-acre arboretum has plant collections, gardens and natural areas. Twelve miles of hiking trails and a 4-mile automobile route are on the grounds. The Daweswood House Museum is furnished with 19th- and 20th-century antiques and family memorabilia.

#### **NEW PHILADELPHIA**

New Philadelphia was founded in the early 1800s by Moravian missionaries and Swiss-German immigrants who were undaunted by the hard times faced by their brethren in previous unsuccessful settlements. Surviving Native American raids and the Revolutionary War, the village soon saw economic growth and prosperity.

A light industrial center, New Philadelphia also is a popular vacation spot. Recreational opportunities are abundant on the 16,000 acres of lakes in the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District (see Recreation Areas Chart).

SCHOENBRUNN VILLAGE is on SR 259 at 1984 E. High Ave., 4 mi. e. of I-77 exit 81. Founded by David Zeisberger in 1772 as a Moravian mission to the Delaware Indians, Schoenbrunn was the first missionary settlement in Ohio. The town grew to include more than 60 log buildings. Its 300 settlers drew up Ohio's first civil code and built the first church and schoolhouse. British and Native American hostilities caused the abandonment of Schoenbrunn in 1777.

"TRUMPET IN THE LAND" is performed in the Trumpet in the Land Amphitheatre, off I-77 exit 81. # PERRY'S VICTORY AND INTERNATIONAL PEACE MEMORIAL

Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial is reached during summer by automobile and passenger ferry from Catawba and Port Clinton and by plane from Port Clinton. The memorial, at Put-in-Bay (see place listing p. 307) on South Bass Island in Lake Erie, commemorates the Battle of Lake Erie and the ensuing years of peace between the United States, Britain and Canada.

During the War of 1812 Master Commandant Oliver Hazard Perry commanded the American fleet, consisting of the Lawrence, the Niagara and seven smaller vessels assembled on the British-controlled lake. On Sept. 10,

1813, he met and defeated the British fleet and forced Robert Heriott Barclay's flagship and five other vessels to surrender. Perry then sent his famous message to Gen. William Henry Harrison: "We have met the enemy and they are ours." This victory made possible both the recapture of Detroit and Gen. Harrison's invasion of Canada.

The memorial is 352 feet high and 45 feet in diameter at its base. Built of pink granite from Milford, Mass., the memorial has an observation deck at 317 feet. The visitor center shows a movie and has exhibits about the Battle of Lake Erie and the building of the monument.

Allow 30 minutes minimum. Visitor center and memorial open daily 10-6, late May to mid-Sept.; daily 10-5, mid-Sept. to early Oct.; Fri.-Mon. 10-5, early Oct.-late Oct.

The 1,608 acres of Pickerington Ponds Wetlands Wildlife Refuge feature observation areas with waterfowl, shorebirds and raptors.

#### **PIQUA**

Three Native American villages once existed near the present city. In 1747 the Miami tribe built Pickawillany; shortly thereafter an English trading post, Fort Pickawillany, was established, but it was destroyed in 1752 by the French and their Native American allies. In 1780 the Shawnee tribe took possession of this territory. At the end of the century European-American settlers arrived, formally laying out a village in 1807.

The 1891 Fort Piqua Plaza, on the downtown public square at 116 W. High St., is a stone and brick Richardsonian Romanesque building that was once a hotel. The exterior features more than 100 carvings of faces, animals, plants, dragons and other creatures. Former visitors include Harry Houdini, Teddy Roosevelt and John Philip Sousa. It now houses the Piqua Public Library; phone (937) 773-6753.

Remnants of the Miami and Erie Canal, which reached the area in 1837, are visible from Lock Nine Riverfront Park.

Self-guiding tours: Self-guiding walking and driving maps and brochures detailing the historic district including a brochure about Fort Piqua Plaza's art, architecture and historical artifacts—are available from the library.

Shopping: Miami Valley Centre Mall, at I-75 and US 36, features Dunham's Sports and Sears. Downtown Piqua has antique and specialty shops.

JOHNSTON FARM & INDIAN AGENCY is off I-75 exit 83. 1 mi. w. on CR 25A, 2.5 mi. n. on SR 66, then .2 mi. e. to 9845 N. Hardin Rd. This 1815 two-story brick house on a 250-acre farmstead is furnished as it was in 1829 when John Johnston and his family lived there. A museum features displays about the Eastern Woodland Indians who inhabited the area; Pickawillany, the first large English trading post in Ohio; and the canal era in Ohio. Costumed interpreters lead house tours and demonstrate pioneer crafts, and a mule-drawn canal boat ride takes visitors through a restored portion of the Miami-Erie Canal.



#### PORTSMOUTH

At the confluence of the Ohio and Scioto rivers, Portsmouth was a manufacturing center where steel and clay products were made for more than 100 years. The Ohio & Erie Canal that once ran from Cleveland to Portsmouth impacted the development of the area, but the great flood of 1913 terminated canal use in this region. Many of the city's 19th-century buildings are restored, including structures in the Boneyfiddle District.

Portsmouth was the boyhood home of motion picture and television cowboy star Roy Rogers, who was born in Cincinnati in 1911 but lived here most of his first 17 years, and of baseball great Branch Rickey, who broke the major league baseball color barrier in 1947 when he signed Jackie Robinson to play for the Brooklyn Dodgers. Both men are depicted in the 2,000-foot-long Portsmouth Floodwall Murals along Front Street on the Ohio River; the 50-plus scenes chronicle more than 2,000 years of Portsmouth and Scioto County history.

COLUMBUS ZOO AND AQUARIUM is off I-270 Sawmill Rd. exit, following signs to jct. Riverside Dr. and Powell Rd. The zoo, which opened in 1927, has six regions totaling nearly 140 acres of gardens and natural habitats. Stroll on paths, many though wooded areas, to travel among the zoo's regions: Congo Expedition, Heart of Africa, Asia Quest, Australia and the Islands, North America and Shores, and Jungle Jack's Landing.

More than 10,000 animals representing more than 600 species call the zoo home.

Enjoy a walking safari through the forests of Africa and see bonobos (pygmy chimpanzees), colobus monkeys, gorillas (including Colo, the first gorilla born in human care), a leopard, mandrills, okapi and red river hogs. The new 43-acre Heart of Africa exhibit offers a variety of animals, including cheetahs, lions, gazelles and wildebeests; visitors also have the opportunity to ride a camel and feed giraffes. In Asia Quest, exotic animals—Asian elephants,

giant fruit bats, red pandas, pheasants and Amur tigers roam their habitats.

In the Australia and the Islands region, check out the Kangaroo Walk-about, where you can get surprisingly close to these Aussies. Only a roped path separates onlookers from the kangaroos, who hop around on a grassy lawn and recline under trees. A bird sanctuary, koalas, komodo dragons, nocturnal animals, orangutans and otters complete this group.

In the section devoted to North American creatures, polar bears swim and play in a 167,000-gallon pool or recline on rocks above water, soaking in the sun at Polar Frontier. North America also is home to brown bears. black bears, bison, eagles, Arctic foxes, Mexican wolves, moose, otters, trumpeter swans, cougars and wolverines as well as a songbird aviary.

Manatees occupy a 250,000-gallon home in the Shores region, which also houses alligators, Humboldt penguins, the Discovery Reef aguarium, a touch pool and a reptile house.

Rides include a 1914 carousel, train and pony rides and a boat ride through the Islands of Southeast Asia; there also are two playgrounds and a marine-themed play space. Jungle Jack's Landing is home to 13 amusement park rides, including a 1,250-foot log flume with two drops, a roller coaster and a whirligig. You also can touch docile cownose and Southern stingrays in the 18,000gallon saltwater pool at Stingray Bay.

Zoombezi Bay is at 4850 Powell Rd. at the Columbus Zoo and Aquarium. The park features 19 water attractions including a wave pool, a children's splash pool, an action river, an adults-only river and Baboon Lagoon—a multilevel play structure with 90 interactive aquatic controls, waterslides and a 1.000-gallon tipping water bucket, and Otter Banks— a new aquatic adventure area that includes two waterslides with a surprise drop at the end, a challenging aquacourse and an activity pool complete with cascading waterfalls and water basketball.

#### **PUT-IN-BAY**

You won't find an abundance of cars at this popular summer resort destination. Although vehicles are permitted on South Bass Island, parking is very limited. The alternative is to rent a bicycle or golf cart once you arrive. The main visitation season runs April through October; if you prefer fewer crowds, consider visiting Sunday through Thursday. Two ferries provide transportation from the mainland. Jet Express Ferry, (800) 245-1538, carries passengers from Port Clinton and Sandusky to the island May through October. Miller Boat Line, (419) 285-2421 or (800) 500-2421, transports passengers and automobiles late March through November from Catawba Island. In addition to its extensive access to Lake Erie, the island's other claim to fame is Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial (see place listing p. 302), just outside the village.

Lake Erie affords great recreational opportunities like boating, kayaking, parasailing, sailing and jet skiing; there are multiple places to rent watercraft. Put-In-Bay has two public beaches, both of which offer nice scenery; a sandy beach is at the end of Delaware Avenue and a pebble beach is in South Bass Island State Park. A boat ramp is located downtown next to the Jet Express Ferry dock. You can fish at South Bass Island and Oak Point state parks; picnicking is permitted at both. South Bass Island State Park also offers camping facilities, boat rentals and a launch ramp, and if you look closely at some of the limestone bedrock in the park, you may be able to see some glacial striations, small grooves created from rocks in the glaciers that once covered the area. If you plan to fish with children while you're here, you may want to go to the Aquatic Visitors Center on SR 357. The facility offers free bait and fishing gear for those under age 16.

There are many other activities to occupy your time. Watch the lake and Delaware Avenue activity from DeRivera Park, a grassy area with picnic tables, benches, a fountain and a playground. The area is a good locale for bird-watching, particularly May 1-20 and in September during migrations. Stroll the downtown streets and do some boutique and souvenir shopping. Pop into the Carriage House gift shop, 150 Delaware Ave., to buy tickets to ride Kimberly's Carousel, a 1917 Allen Herschel creation from North Tonawanda, N.Y., that usually runs mid-June through Labor Day. Several dozen special events are held during the main tourist season. A regularly held event is an antique car parade passing through downtown each Sunday afternoon—a big treat for classic and historic car fans.



SANDUSKY

Although Sandusky was explored by Robert LaSalle in 1679 and visited by English trader George Croghan in 1760, it was not until 1816 that the town was settled. Its location on Sandusky Bay, a natural harbor on Lake Erie formed by the Cedar Point and Marblehead peninsulas, quickly made it a major center of shipping and industry. It is one of the largest coal-shipping ports on the Great Lakes.

Sandusky still has time for relaxation; its lakeside resorts, abundant fishing opportunities and access to Lake Erie's islands make it a popular summer vacation spot.

**CASTAWAY BAY,** 2001 Cleveland Rd., is an indoor water park with a Caribbean theme featuring waterslides, a giant tree house with a variety of children's activities, a wave pool with 3-foot-high waves, a toddler tide pool and adults-only hot tubs. Lounge chairs are scattered throughout the park.

CEDAR POINT is off US 6, 10 mi. n. of Ohio Tpke. exit 118 at 1 Cedar Point Dr. This 364-acre amusement/theme park and resort opened in 1870. Cedar Point offers more than 150 rides, shows and attractions, including 18 roller coasters and more than a dozen thrill rides. Valravn reaches 75 mph and includes a 90-degree drop. Other coasters include Steel Vengeance, a hybrid of steel and wood; Rougarou, a floorless coaster; the 420foot-tall, 120 mph Top Thrill Dragster; the 310-foot-tall Millennium Force; the six-inversion Raptor; Magnum XL-200, the first roller coaster to break the 200-foot barrier; and GateKeeper, a winged coaster. Two water rides offer refreshing thrills. SlingShot is a two-person experience that launches participants 360 feet in the air. Other thrill rides include Ocean Motion (a ship that swings back and forth), Scrambler, Power Tower and WindSeeker.

If all those sound a bit intense, fear not. Most of the park's rides cater to families and young children. Pipe Scream takes riders back and forth several times across a 300-foot track, twisting and turning as it maneuvers across the hills. On Lake Erie Eagles riders fly in individual eagle cars and can control how mild or wild to make their flight. There are also carousels, three kids' areas, the Cedar Point & Lake Erie Railroad and an array of other classic amusement park rides.

Cedar Point also presents a variety of live shows, including the high-energy nighttime show Luminosity and several shows starring PEANUTS characters like Snoopy, Lucy and Charlie Brown. Other offerings are pioneer crafts, a marina and a sandy beach on the shore of Lake Erie. The Forbidden Frontier on Adventure Island offers an interactive adventure using both brain and brute power.

HalloWeekends is an annual fall favorite that offers daytime events like a parade and The Great Pumpkin Fest as well as the nighttime Haunt. Select rides are open Friday nights and all non-water rides are usually open on Saturdays and Sundays.

The furnishings, mostly from the 1950s, are in mint condition and reflect the wealth of the Dorn family, the last residents of the house. The first two floors are open to the public. A garden and greenhouse also are featured.



### **SPRINGFIELD**

Springfield was settled about 1800 by a group of Kentuckians, including the frontiersman and Native American scout Simon Kenton. Kenton's wife named the town for the numerous springs found there. In 1802 a waterpowered flour mill was built nearby on a gorge in what is now Clifton, where visitors can take a self-guiding tour of the mill and explore a country store.

After the road came through in 1838 it became known as the "town at the end of the National Pike." Now US 40, the pike connected Springfield with industrial cities as far east as Cumberland, Md., and opened new markets for the city's harvests. Agricultural machinery firms set up shops, and slowly Springfield's complexion changed from rural to industrial. Its industries have diversified, producing turbines, engines and piano plates. Wittenberg University

and its 2,000 students add a college-town flavor to this bustling city.

WESTCOTT HOUSE, 85 S. Greenmount Ave. (visitor center entrance), was designed for the prominent Westcott family by Frank Lloyd Wright in 1906 and construction was completed in 1908. In the 1940s the home was altered into an apartment building, completely changing the original design. In 2005 a five-year restoration was completed, and the house once again reflects Wright's design. The house is Wright's only use of Prairie Style architecture in Ohio. One-hour tours begin with a brief video about the house's history and restoration.

At S. 3rd and Adams streets, adjacent to Historic Fort Steuben, is the First Federal Land Office of the United States: it was built in 1801 and served as a 19th-century home office. A new roof and floor have been constructed, but the building's logs are original.

As part of Steubenville's City of Murals project, the exteriors of 23 buildings in downtown Steubenville and Hollywood Plaza are painted with large murals depicting historical scenes relating to the city, including one of Steubenville native Dean Martin. Tour maps are available at the visitor center.

The town is home to the Catholic Franciscan University of Steubenville and its nearly 2,500 students.

Steubenville's Hometown Celebration, held in June, features a variety of events, including the Grecian Food Festival, Ohio Valley Frontier Days and Dean Martin celebrations.

HISTORIC FORT STEUBEN is at 120 S. Third St. This reconstructed 1787 fort provides a taste of military life on the frontier in 18th-century Ohio. Visitors can view displays in the exhibition hall and tour the enlisted men's quarters, the officers' quarters, commissary, quardhouse and hospital as well as the artificer's and quartermaster's shops and an archaeology dig. In addition, the visitor center offers information for travelers. Adjacent to the site is the First Federal Land Office as well as Fort Steuben Park, which includes the Veterans Memorial Fountain. Concerts are held at the Louis Berkman Amphitheater.

### **TOLEDO**

• Hotels p. 321

A great industrial center, Toledo is one of the world's busiest freshwater ports, ranking third on the Great Lakes. The city's importance as a port stems from its location at the mouth of the Maumee River, the largest river flowing into the lakes. Its natural harbor has 35 miles of frontage. Pipelines for crude oil and gas terminate in Toledo, which is a major refining center. The city also is a large producer of glass.

Toledo occupies the site of old Fort Industry, which was built in 1794 and stood near the present Summit and Monroe streets. Fallen Timbers Monument, off SR 24 on Jerome Road, commemorates Gen. Anthony Wayne's 1794 defeat of the Native Americans, ending the bloody conflicts between the colonists and Native Americans.

As a result of his victory the Native Americans relinquished their rights to the Firelands (see Norwalk p. 297), which comprised most of the Native American lands remaining in the vicinity. A consequence of the Toledo War of 1835, a vociferous boundary dispute with Michigan, gave Toledo to Ohio and granted Michigan its northern peninsula in compensation.

The Erie and Kalamazoo Railroad, completed in 1836, was the first American railroad built west of the Alleghenies. Toledo is now one of the nation's largest rail centers.

Toledo provides opportunities for outdoor recreation at its numerous public Metroparks of the Toledo Area. Promenade Park, a peaceful, landscaped setting along the Maumee River, is a favorite spot for viewing freighters and towboats. Oak Openings Preserve and Pearson Metropark are popular spots for watching wildlife, especially migrating birds.

A large collection of Victorian, Edwardian and Arts and Crafts homes in the Old West End provides a glimpse of architectural styles popular with wealthy industrialists in the late 19th- and early 20th centuries.

Notable among institutions of higher learning in the city is the 21,500-student University of Toledo, established in 1872. Guided tours of the campus, at 2801 W. Bancroft St., are available by appointment; phone (419) 530-8888 or (800) 586-5336. The university's Ritter Planetarium and the Brooks Observatory offer weekend shows throughout the year Fri. starting at 7:30 p.m. (8:30, May-Aug.) and Sat. at 1 during the academic year; phone (419) 530-2650 or (419) 530-4037.

Visitors can ride a bike suspended 18 feet in the air on the High Wire Cycle, become a human yo-yo on the BOYO and run on the Wheel of Fire.

**TOLEDO BOTANICAL GARDEN** is at 5403 Elmer Dr. The garden encompasses 60 acres and includes roses, herbs, wildflowers, azaleas and rhododendrons as well as

THE TOLEDO MUSEUM OF ART is at 2445 Monroe St., 1 blk. e. of I-75. This Grecian-style marble structure contains works tracing the history of art from ancient Egypt to the present. Among its more than 30,000 works of art are paintings and sculptures by such artists as Alexander Calder, Edgar Degas, El Greco, Paul Gauguin, Hans Holbein, Anselm Kiefer, Henri Matisse, Joan Miró, Claude Monet, Pablo Picasso, Rembrandt, Pierre-Auguste Renoir, Peter Paul Rubens and Vincent van Gogh as well as African and Asian works.

Also featured are books, manuscripts, prints, sculpture, medieval ivories, glass items, decorative arts objects and tapestries. A glass collection chronicles the history of glass over the course of 3,500 years. Time: Allow 2 hours minimum. Phone: (419) 255-8000 or TTY (800) 644-6862.

TOLEDO ZOO, 4 mi. s.w. on SR 25, is home to more than 9,000 animals representing more than more than 9,000 animals representing more than 700 species of mammals, birds, fish and reptiles. Tembo Trail features elephants, rhinos, camels and meerkats along with the Hippoquarium, which offers an underwater view of a hippopotamus family. Arctic Encounter offers close-up views of polar bears and seals. At Penguin Beach you can watch the black-and-white cuties' aboveand below-water antics. Flamingo Key is home to flamingos and other waterfowl, and Primate Forest houses white-cheeked gibbons, swamp monkeys, ring-tailed lemurs and more. Also featured throughout the zoo are cheetahs, Amur tigers, great apes and Asian sloth bears as well as Amazing Amphibians, an aviary and pheasantry, a reptile house, gardens, a train and two carousels.

The Aguarium area is home to rays and sharks as well as other aquatic life. Nature's Neighborhood features play activities to help children learn about nature; birds, fish, goats, guinea pigs and insects are housed here. In warmer weather visitors can experience Africa!, home to giraffes, zebras, ostriches and more. Behind-the-scenes tours of the zoo are available. The Eldean Covered Bridge, 2 miles north at the junction of CR 25A and Eldean Road, is a long-type truss bridge. Built in 1860, the 223-foot bridge crosses the Great Miami River. WACO AIR MUSEUM, 1865 S. CR 25A, preserves the history of the Waco Aircraft Co., which was the leading U.S. manufacturer of civil airplanes in the 1920s and early 1930s. During World War II the company specialized in glider production for the military. The museum features restored aircraft (including a World War II glider display), a library and aviation exhibits. A flight simulator is on-site as well.

Settling in Twinsburg in 1823, they married sisters, were life-long business partners, had the same number of children, died within hours of one another and are buried together.

Today Twinsburg, one of the fastest growing communities in the state, is the site of the area's largest annual gathering of twins. Twinsburg residents and nearly 35,000 visitors see double the first full weekend in August during the Twins Days Festival. Highlights of this gathering of twins, triplets and quadruplets from around the world include a parade, arts and crafts, live entertainment, fireworks display. 

WAGON TRAILS ANIMAL PARK is at 907 Youngstown-Kingsville Rd. 

Settled in 1799, Warren was named after the territorial surveyor Moses Warren. The site of early iron and coal production, the city served as the first capital of the historic Connecticut Western Reserve. Trumbull County, including Warren, played a significant role in the Underground Railroad.

Local industrialists William Doud and James Ward Packard established the Packard Electric Co. in 1890. The first Packard automobile was built in Warren. The success of the Packard brought prosperity to the town, as evidenced by the unusual architectural styles of the grand

homes along "Millionaires Row" on Mahoning Avenue. Warren was the first U.S. city to light its streets with incandescent bulbs.

You can visit two historic houses downtown. The John Stark Edwards House Museum, 303 Monroe St. N.W., dates to 1807 and is open the first Sun. of the month 2-5 and other times by appointment. It showcases some of the former residents' belongings; phone (330) 394-4653 to confirm tour schedule. The Upton House, 380 Mahoning Ave. N.W., was built in 1840 by Gen. Simon Perkins and was later inhabited by Harriet Taylor Upton, a prominent suffragist. In fact, the house even served as temporary headquarters of the National American Woman Suffrage Association. The home is open for tours by appointment; phone (330) 395-1840. Across the street is The Women's Park, which features a stone bridge and brick walkways inscribed with dedications to women who have inspired others.

Northwest on US 422 next to the McDonald's at 2487 Parkman Rd. is the former site of the Warren Airways Airport from which Neil Armstrong, at the age of 6, took his first flight; 33 years later he became the first human to walk on the moon. Commemorating both firsts is the Neil Armstrong "First Flight" Lunar Memorial, a half-scale replica of the Apollo 11 Lunar Module set on a concrete slab cratered to resemble the moon's surface, and a 1/16scale model rocket replicating the Gemini V mission.

The W.D. Packard Music Hall, built in 1955, is used for concerts, lectures and other programs. The 43-mile Western Reserve Greenway trail runs between Ashtabula and Warren. The trail offers opportunities for biking, hiking and horseback riding.

The museum houses the largest collection of Packard family and business memorabilia and also features a Packard automobile collection dating 1900-56.







#### WAYNE NATIONAL FOREST

Elevations in the forest range from 630 ft. on the Ohio River near Newport to 1,320 ft. on the Narrows River on a ridge near Sardis. Refer to AAA maps for additional information.

In the southeastern portion of the state is Wayne National Forest, named in honor of Revolutionary War hero Gen. Anthony Wayne. The forest encompasses three general areas totaling 244,000 acres. More than 300 miles of hiking, mountain biking, horse and off-highway vehicle trails wind through the forest; the trails are open mid-April to mid-December. Redbuds and dogwoods bloom in spring, and the fall foliage is stunning. Starting in Marietta and ending in Woodsfield, the Covered Bridge Scenic Byway stretches 35 miles and leads travelers to 10 interpretive stops, including a historical mill site, covered bridges, a painted barn advertising Mail Pouch Tobacco, a historic inn. a homestead and an oil well.

Flowing through the forest's Marietta unit, the Little Muskingum River offers opportunities for canoeing and kayaking as well as fishing. Lake Vesuvius Recreation Area, north of Ironton off SR 93, includes a lake, campground and a 19th-century furnace left from Ohio's iron industry. Primitive camping is available throughout the forest and both the Athens and Ironton units have developed campgrounds; a small fee is charged. Hunting is permitted in season.

The forest is free and open all year. #### WELLINGTON

Established in 1818, Wellington did not achieve its potential until 1850 when the railroad arrived. A station on the Underground Railroad, the town was the site of the Oberlin/Wellington Slave Rescue of 1858. By 1880 the town was known as the "Cheese Capital of the United States," with more than 40 cheese factories in the area.

Wellington was the 1855-75 home of Archibald M. Willard, painter of the classic "Spirit of '76." A copy of the artwork, along with many Willard originals, hangs in the town library at 101 Willard Memorial Square and in the Spirit of '76 Museum at 201 N. Main St.; phone (440) 647-2120 and (440) 647-4367, respectively. Another notable native was Myron T. Herrick, governor of Ohio 1904-06 and ambassador to France, 1912-14 and 1921-29.

There are many opportunities to enjoy outdoor activities such as hiking, mountain biking, fishing, camping, kayaking, disc golf and paddleboating at Wellington Reservation and Findley State Park. See Recreation Areas Chart.

Train Journey, billed as the world's largest indoor train display, has 25,000 square feet of G-scale model trains (1/24 the size of real trains) that travel along more than 2 miles of track through detailed displays representing different eras in railroad history. There even is an 11-foot waterfall. The American Railroading Museum includes railroad artifacts, trivia kiosks and a video theater. At Imagination Junction, kids can play at an indoor 5,000-square-foot railroad-themed play area. From Memorial Day through Labor Day, children can ride a hand-cranked locomotive around a 300foot track, and the Narrow Gauge Kid's Train is in operation on 1,000 feet of track, weather permitting.

The second main attraction of the complex is the A-Maze-N FunHouse, where visitors can attempt to make

## **WEST LIBERTY**

OHIO CAVERNS is 4 mi. s.e. on SR 245. Discovered in 1897, the caves maintain a constant temperature of 54 degrees F. Vividly colored walls contrast with pure white stalactites and stalagmites. The guided 1-mile Natural Wonder Tour, which lasts 50-55 minutes, takes visitors through the caverns along electrically lighted passageways. On the .75-mile Historic Tour visitors take a shuttle bus to the original entrance where the cavern was first discovered and then are shown the parts of the cavern that were toured 1897-1925; the tour lasts about 45 minutes.

The Limestone Tour is a 25-minute handicapaccessible, quarter-mile tour featuring the first part of the Natural Wonder tour. Above the site is a 35-acre park with a playground and opportunities for gem mining.

THE PIATT CASTLES are 1 and 2 mi. e. on SR 245. 

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



Xenia (ZEEN-yuh), once the site of the Shawnee Nation's largest settlement, was the 1768 birthplace of Tecumseh. In the 1790s and early 1800s, Tecumseh tried to create a pan-Native American alliance to protect tribal lands and culture from the encroaching frontiersmen. He joined forces with the British during the War of 1812, but his cause died with him in 1813 at the Battle of the Thames in Ontario.

Running through downtown is the Little Miami Scenic Trail, an approximately 78-mile paved trail that averages 66 feet wide and runs between Cincinnati and Springfield. The park/trail is a converted, abandoned railroad rightof-way that offers opportunities for bicycling, in-line skating, hiking, backpacking, cross-country skiing, horseback riding and canoeing the Little Miami National and State Scenic River. ## YOUNGSTOWN

## Hotels p. 339

Youngstown was named after John Young, a surveyor who purchased 15,600 acres of land in 1797. The town's development was slow until 1803, when iron ore was discovered and the first blast furnace was established in the area. The opening of the Pennsylvania and Ohio Canal increased both the population and industrialization of the area during the 1820s. In 1862 the first coal mine was opened, and the first steel plant, the Union Iron and Steel Co., was built in 1892. Most early settlers came from Pennsylvania, New York and New England; however, the growing industrial economy soon attracted European emigrants.

Youngstown State University, with an enrollment of nearly 15,000 undergraduate and graduate students, was established in 1908.

Shopping: Along the US 224 corridor is Southern Park Mall—anchored by Dillard's, JCPenney and Macy's—and Boardman Plaza, one of the country's first strip malls.

THE BUTLER INSTITUTE OF AMERICAN ART is at 524 Wick Ave. The museum was founded in 1919 by Youngstown industrialist Joseph G. Butler Jr. The collection focuses on American art from the Colonial period to the present, including a wing dedicated to digital art. Highlights include works by Mary Cassatt, John Copley,

Thomas Eakins, Winslow Homer, Georgia O'Keeffe, Frederic Remington, Norman Rockwell, Charles Sheeler, Robert Vonnoh, Andy Warhol and Benjamin West.

The Trumbull branch (about 12 miles north in Howland Township) showcases works by international artists as well as contemporary sculptors and painters. Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (330) 743-1107.

MILL CREEK PARK is s. of Mahoning Ave. off Glenwood Ave. The 2,882-acre park contains a 6-mile-long gorge, 15 miles of foot trails, 20 miles of drives, a pond and three lakes. Opportunities for biking, boating, cross-country skiing, fishing, golf, hiking, sledding and tennis are available. The largest of the lakes is 60-acre Lake Newport, which also includes 40 acres of wetlands that can be explored on the interpretive boardwalk along the Albert E. Davies Wetland Trail.

Four viewing platforms on the 1913 Parapet Bridge afford pleasant views of the area. Fellows Riverside Gardens, Ford Nature Center and Lanterman's Mill also are on the grounds. See Recreation Areas Chart. Phone: (330) 702-3000.

Fellows Riverside Gardens is s. off Mahoning Ave. at 123 McKinley Ave. at the north end of Mill Creek Park. The 12-acre garden encompasses a formal rose garden, perennials, shrubs, trees and seasonal displays of some 40,000 tulips in the spring and flowering annuals in the summer. Two overlooks provide views of the park and city. The architecturally interesting D.D. and Velma Davis Education & Visitor Center features the John C. Melnick Mill Creek Park Museum and the Andrew and Carol Weller Gallery and an observation tower and also provides maps and other visitor information. **Phone:** (330) 740-7116.

**Ford Nature Center** is at 840 Old Furnace Rd. and is part of Mill Creek Park. This former residence built of stone now houses a naturalist staff and a variety of displays. Three rooms feature native plants and animals as well as hands-on exhibits. Wildlife gardens, walking trails and areas for bird-watching are included. Nature programs and hikes also are offered. **Phone:** (330) 740-7107.

Lanterman's Mill is at 1001 Canfield Rd. and is part of Mill Creek Park. The restored 1846 water-powered gristmill has been completely renovated and still operates. The grounds also include hiking trails, one of which is a

boardwalk; a covered bridge; and an observation deck for viewing Lanterman Falls. **Time:** Allow 30 minutes minimum. **Phone:** (330) 740-7115.

**YOUNGSTOWN HISTORICAL CENTER OF INDUSTRY & LABOR** is at 151 W. Wood St. Exhibits chronicle the impact of the iron and steel industries upon Mahoning Valley communities. The museum's permanent exhibit explores labor, immigration and urban history using videos, photographs, reconstructed scenes and historic objects. Items displayed range from workers' tools and clothing to "last heats," the final batches of steel produced at a mill before it closes.

# ZANESVILLE • Hotels p. 340

Settled in 1799, Zanesville was once considered the pottery capital of the United States; its surrounding areas still support a number of pottery factories. Zanesville was the birthplace of such notables as the architect of New York's 1913 Woolworth Building, Cass Gilbert, in 1859, and novelists Charles D. Stewart in 1868 and Zane Grey in 1872.

The Y-Bridge, which carries US 40 over the junction of the Muskingum and Licking rivers, is shaped like the letter Y; the design is uncommon in the United States. Since the early 1800s, the bridge has been rebuilt several times. US 40 is the contemporary name for the first federal road, the National Road, authorized by Congress in 1806 to extend from Cumberland, Md., to the Ohio River.

Zanesville is at the junction of two scenic highways. US 22 runs southwest to Lancaster, and a scenic portion of

I-70 runs east to Bridgeport, then through West Virginia and into Pennsylvania.

Lorena Sternwheeler is moored at Zane's Landing Park. This riverboat offers 1-hour sightseeing, lunch and twilight cruises as well as 2-hour dinner cruises on the Muskingum River. Tours are offered select dates early June to late October; phone (740) 455-8282.

Visitors may tour the studio and wax and mold rooms, where artists and artisans are at work, and learn about the creation of a sculpture from idea to finished work.

ZANESVILLE MUSEUM OF ART is 3.2 mi. n. via Maple Ave. at 620 Military Rd. The museum features Ohio art pottery and glass as well as a diverse collection of traditional and contemporary art and fine craft from America, Africa, Asia and Europe. The museum has paintings, drawings, photographs, sculpture, prints and ceramics. Varied temporary exhibitions are presented throughout the year, and an art library is on the premises.

Paintings by old masters and decorative arts adorn a room that was once part of a 17th-century house in London, England. The paneling and carved fireplace enclosure create a fitting environment for the 15th- to mid-19th-century English, Flemish, Dutch, French and American paintings, sculpture and porcelain as well as the 18th- and 19th-century furnishings.

# **ZOAR**

ZOAR VILLAGE is on SR 212, 3 mi. s.e. of I-77 exit 93 to 198 Main St. The village, founded in 1817 by German immigrants who acquired several thousand acres along the Tuscarawas River, is in the center of what was once the Zoar community. Their practically selfsustaining community prospered until it was dissolved in 1898, when village industries failed to keep pace with those of the rest of the country.

Visitors can tour restored buildings including Number One House, the home of leader Joseph Bimeler; a bakery; tin shop; wagon shed; general store; kitchen; dairy; blacksmith shop; and garden house. The community garden is geometrically patterned to symbolize the New Jerusalem.

# LET'S **GET SOCIAL**


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The Mountain State has endured a troubled history of Civil War battles, mountaineer feuds and coal mining labor disputes. But thanks to abundant highland beauty, the state has left its past difficulties far behind to become a playground for skiers, whitewater rafters, hikers and anyone else who loves the outdoors.

This is not to say that West Virginians have forgotten their heritage. Descendants of self-reliant pioneers still craft objects that were once necessities of frontier life. And carefully restored sites like Harpers Ferry, Blennerhassett Island and Wheeling's Independence Hall show how seriously the locals take their history.

# "Mountaineers Are Always Free"

Aptly named, the Mountain State is indeed the most mountainous east of the Mississippi. Blanketed with trees and cut through by swift-flowing streams, the chain of craggy peaks—part of the ancient Appalachians—stretches along West Virginia's entire eastern border. This may once have been the capital of coal country, but today the most used natural resources are above ground.

West Virginia's ski slopes are considered some of the best east of the Rockies; names like Timberline, Canaan Valley and Snowshoe come to mind. An evergrowing number of white-water rafters challenge the rapids of the New. Gauley and Cheat rivers. The thrill of these sports is intensified by the scenery. One sight to behold is the 1,000-foot-deep canyons of the New River Gorge National Park and Preserve, most dazzlingly viewed from the bridge perched above its raging waters. And although no one rafts down the plummeting streams of Blackwater, Hill Creek and Holly River falls, their beauty still draws tourists from all over.

Perhaps the greatest natural assets are stunning mountain vistas like those at Spruce Knob, the highest point in West Virginia. This peak is in Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area, one of the most popular rock climbing areas in the East.

# Scenic Railways and Fall Foliage

Part of a once-extensive railway network for transporting lumber, the Cass Scenic Railroad carries passengers to a viewing area just below lofty Bald Knob for breathtaking views of the surrounding countryside. In fall, the landscape blazes with color as untold millions of leaves change hue. Similarly, West Virginia's many picturesque covered bridges were originally built for practical reasons but are now the focus of the pleasantly impractical endeavor of sightseeing.

Other man-made attractions also are worth seeking out. Victorian historic districts in Parkersburg, Wheeling

and Charleston, the state capital, evoke the coal boom era. You'll also want to see the capitol building and its impressive 293-foot-tall golden dome.

The state's dramatic scenery continues underground thanks to the many caves scattered throughout the highlands. In Greenbrier Valley, Lost World Caverns features huge subterranean rooms and waterfalls up to 235 feet below the surface. And even if you can't tell the difference between a stalagmite and a stalactite you'll still enjoy Smoke Hole Caverns west of Petersburg and Seneca Caverns near Riverton, which have both.

Today bathers in search of therapeutic balm still flock to White Sulphur Springs and Berkeley Springs. The warm, mineral-laden waters bubbling up from these depths were discovered by American colonists more than 200 years ago.

#### Recreation

If white-water rafting floats your boat, remember these names: Gauley, Cheat and New. The big three of West Virginia rafting rivers enjoy a world-wide reputation for superior white water. The Gauley River has 100 major rapids on a 25-mile course. Exciting boulder-strewn rapids also characterize the Cheat River, but because there are no dams controlling its flow, suitable water levels are limited to spring. The Lower New has swirling Class IV and V rapids, while the Upper New features calmer water.

Another thrilling way to enjoy the outdoors here is skiing. The renowned Snowshoe ski area on top of Cheat Mountain features a network of 60 slopes and trails including Cupp Run, with its 1,500-foot vertical drop lasting more than 1.5 miles. On the northern edge of Monongahela National Forest, Canaan Valley Resort State Park has 39 interconnecting slopes running the gamut from beginner to expert. Timberline Four Seasons Resort features Salamander Run, the longest ski trail south of New England.

Cliffs at New River Gorge near Fayetteville challenge even expert rock climbers. Those who are unafraid of heights will be amply rewarded after a climb up the sandstone tower of Seneca Rocks; a stunning panorama of North Fork River and its environs awaits.

Avid anglers won't have any trouble finding a spot to cast a lure in West Virginia. Places such as Laura Anderson Lake are stocked with trout and are open for fishing year-round. Middle Island Creek, which is more river than creek, teems with largemouth bass and

channel catfish. Catches to brag about at Stonewall Jackson Lake are bass, crappie and walleye.

The state has more than 300 miles of rails-to-trails paths offering a range of scenic treks. One standout is North Bend Rail Trail, which ascends to the Wolf Summit terminus of the old rail line. Stretching 72 miles between Parkersburg and Wolf Summit, it passes over numerous bridges and through tunnels. Another favorite is scenic Greenbrier River Trail, a narrow strip of state park that passes through two tunnels and follows alongside the river for part of its length.

Hikers can wander along paths that meander past hemlock groves, red spruce woods, moors, bogs and waterfalls in Monongahela National Forest. Trails connect several scenic locales at Camp Creek State Park south of Beckley. Savor the rugged landscape from the 24-mile trail through Smoke Hole Canyon, offering views of both the canyon and North Fork Valley.

Ansted, originally settled by Baptists in 1790, was named New Haven by a group of New England Spiritualists who came to the town in 1830. The following year it was renamed after British scientist David T. Ansted, who had interested English investors in building coal-mining operations. On a knoll overlooking the town, Westlake Cemetery contains the grave of Julia Jackson Woodson, Gen. Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson's mother.

The Ansted Culture and Heritage Museum, 19940 Midland Tr., features exhibits about the Midland Trail, the area's Native Americans, pioneers, the Civil War and the region's African American and industrial history; phone (304) 658-5901.

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

Beckley is the center of southern West Virginia's smokeless coal region. The bituminous coal mined in this area is a higher grade of coal that produces less smoke when burned.

Beckley is the northern anchor of the 187-mile Coal Heritage Trail which winds its way past company stores, miners' houses, railroad yards, coal tipples and 500 small company towns on its way south to Bluefield; follow SR 16 southwest to US 52, which heads south and east to Bluefield, the end of the trail. #### **BERKELEY SPRINGS**

The Berkeley Springs, famous for their supposed curative properties, were a haven for Native Americans long before Europeans discovered their soothing waters. A thriving community had been established by the time George Washington arrived in 1748 to survey the area for its owner, Lord Thomas Fairfax. In 1776, Washington assisted in establishing the town as a health resort under the name of Bath, which remains its official name.

More than a dozen members of the Colonial elite were among original lot owners—George and Martha Washington bought property in the area. The springs continue to flow from five main sources at the rate of 1,000-1,500 gallons per minute; the water maintains a uniform temperature of 74 F.

Though known for its spas, Berkeley Springs is also gaining notice as an arts community. The town is home to a growing number of art and craft galleries and shows. Ten miles south, Cacapon Resort State Park (see Recreation Areas Chart) offers an 18-hole golf course, a lodge, a lake beach, a trap shooting range, a nature center and trails to the top of Cacapon Mountain; phone (304) 258-1022 or (800) 225-5982.

Founded in 1889 as the regional headquarters of the Norfolk & Western Railway, remnants of the naturalgravity switching yards remain in Bluefield. Named for the many chicory flowers growing wild along the hillsides, the town attracted many industries in addition to the railroad, such as coal mining.

South of town, the border between the two Virginias is on the crest of East River Mountain. Some of the best views can be found at the East River Mountain Scenic Overlook (1780 Stadium Dr.); phone (304) 327-2448. A sister city, Bluefield, Va., lies to the southwest.

The West Virginia city's original municipal building, built in 1924, now houses The Bluefield Performing Arts Center, an active center for visual and performing arts that hosts regular concerts at Bluefield High School, Bluefield College and Harman Chapel; phone (304) 325-9117.

The Granada Theater, featuring 1920s Spanish-Moorish design, was one of several theaters built in the early 20th century when Bluefield was a popular railroad stopover and known as "Little New York." (The city received a nod in the 1934 film, "Red Dust," when the character, played by Jean Harlow, revealed she had lived in Bluefield.) The 1928 theater features live performances as well as classic and indie movies at 537 Commerce St.; phone Bluefield Preservation Society for information at (304) 589-0239.





### **CASS**

Once a large lumbering community, Cass retains the history of its greatness at the beginning of the 20th century. The Cass Country Store is in the former West Virginia Pulp and Paper General Store, purported to have been the largest company store in the world.

CASS SCENIC RAILROAD STATE PARK departs from the downtown depot at 242 Main St. Pasfrom the downtown depot at 242 Main St. Passenger trains make several runs with the old steam Shay and Heisler locomotives that once hauled logging trains up the steep slopes of Cheat Mountain.

The rail excursions, which offer scenic mountain vistas, include an 8-mile, 2-hour round-trip to Whittaker Station and a 22-mile, 4.5-hour round-trip excursion to the top of Bald Knob. Other trips, including dinner trains, caboose rides and overnight packages with train rides to Old Spruce and Elkins also are available. Trips are preceded by a free show that includes a diorama and audiovisual orientation film that relate the town's lumbering history.

The Cass Historical Museum houses a collection of photographs and relics pertaining to the logging industry, including one of the largest band saws in the world. The Cass Showcase is a historic diorama depicting the Cass Railroad in its lumbering days and includes a reproduction of the town during the lumber boom at the beginning of the 19th century.

Capital of the state, Charleston was founded in 1794. From 1788-95, Daniel Boone lived across the river. He served in the Virginia Assembly in 1791. Remains of a Native American burial ground are in South Charleston at MacCorkle Avenue and D Street.

Serving as a regional cultural center, Clay Center for the Arts & Sciences of West Virginia houses a performance hall and a black box theater as well as museums, a planetarium and outdoor sculptures. Off I-64 exit 100 (Leon Sullivan Way) to 1 Clay Sq., the center is home to the West Virginia Symphony Orchestra; phone (304) 561-3570.

The Midland Trail National Scenic Highway/US 60 travels from Charleston to White Sulphur Springs through pastoral scenery and past the rugged New River Gorge.

Appalachian music, ethnic and traditional foods, West Virginia arts and crafts, dancing, storytelling and contests are part of the Vandalia Gathering, held on the Capitol Complex grounds and in the Cultural Center on Memorial Day weekend. Vandalia, proposed as the 14th colony during the late 1760s, had many backers, including Benjamin Franklin; the new colony's boundaries would have encompassed most of present-day West Virginia, in addition to much of what is now Kentucky. However, because of the strained relations between the fledgling American colonies and Great Britain, the plan never came to fruition.

#### 360 CHARLESTON, WV

The outstanding feature is the rotunda's dome, 180 feet above the main floor. From its center hangs a 2-ton rock crystal chandelier, 8 feet in diameter. The second-floor ceiling is decorated with a panel design showing leaves of West Virginia's native trees.



# **CLARKSBURG**

From 1861 until the first battle of Bull Run, Clarksburg was the headquarters for Gen. George B. McClellan. It also served as a Union supply depot throughout the war. Gen. William E. Jones' Confederate cavalry passed through in 1863 on the raid that destroyed military points on the B & O Railroad.

Clarksburg was the birthplace in 1824 of Gen. Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson, hero of the Confederacy. The site is marked by a bronze plate at 326-328 W. Main St. An equestrian statue of Jackson is on the northeast corner of the Court House Plaza. The military leader spent most of his boyhood 20 miles south at Jackson's Mill.

More than 100,000 visitors come to Clarksburg over Labor Day weekend to join in the merriment of the West Virginia Italian Heritage Festival. The 3-day street festival features name entertainment, traditional Italian foods, a pasta cook-off, a children's area, a parade and a bocce tournament.

Incorporated in 1885. Davis was born of the lumber boom. Today the area is a mecca for mountain bikers and rafters. Ten miles south, Canaan Valley Resort State Park (see Recreation Areas Chart) is an all-year resort and conference center. Downhill and cross-country skiing are popular in winter; golf on an 18-hole championship course, hiking, tennis and swimming prevail during the summer. Deer often cross the golf course early and late in the day. Other privately operated resorts and camping facilities also are available in the Canaan (ka-NAIN) valley.

Of historical significance is the Fairfax Stone, 7 miles north of town off US 219, which marked the western boundary of Lord Fairfax's lands. Under the terms of the grant issued by the king of England, Lord Fairfax owned all the lands between the Potomac and the Rappahannock rivers, and this marker served as the base point for the boundary between Maryland and Virginia (now West Virginia).

Elkins, on the Tygart Valley River in the Potomac Highlands, is in a region that contains many of West Virginia's highest mountains. Named for Stephen B. Elkins, secretary of war and U.S. senator 1895-1911, the city was a center for railroad, timber and coal operations. The mountains provide a variety of recreational opportunities, including the Mountain State Forest Festival, held each fall. Ski areas are nearby in the Monongahela National Forest (see place listing p. 377), which maintains its headquarters in Elkins.

Elkins is at the crossroads of three scenic highways. From Fairmont to the north, the scenic section of US 250 passes through, running south to Huttonsville. US 219 runs south jointly with US 250 to Huttonsville and then continues on to White Sulphur Springs. US 33 crosses them in Elkins, following the Tygart River into town before heading east into some of the region's most spectacular scenery. The Stuart Memorial Drive, which passes Stuart Recreation Area and 4,020-foot Bickles Knob, runs between Elkins and Alpena.

CHEAT MOUNTAIN SALAMANDER departs from the depot at 315 Railroad Ave. A 9-hour, 128-mile round-trip train ride takes passengers through the rugged, scenic Cheat Mountains. #### **FAIRMONT**

Fairmont occupies the steep hills surrounding the Monongahela River, which divides the town into east and west sections. Originally two towns, Palatine and Middletown, Fairmont was incorporated in 1843. Ferries shuttled people and supplies across the river until 1852, when a suspension bridge unified the town.

During the 1850s railroad access encouraged the development of coal mines in the area. While coal continues to be a source of employment, today the town is on a hightech corridor with a NASA software facility and a software consortium. Other Fairmont products include mine machinery and aluminum.

Fifteen miles south off SR 310. Valley Falls State Park (see Recreation Areas Chart) features a series of waterfalls generated by the Tygart Valley River. The park's

The visitor center offers exhibits about the Monongahela Valley's history and has bike rentals for riding the park's trails. The park has a nature trail and a hiking trail that follows a converted rail bed to Fairmont and Morgantown. A 400-seat amphitheater hosts summer concerts and performances. #### **FAYETTEVILLE**

Settled in 1818, Fayetteville was named for Marguis de Lafayette in 1837. A historical marker on the town lawn identifies Favetteville as the site where the military tactic of indirect firing— the shooting over friendly troops into enemy positions beyond—was first used during the Civil War.

Fayetteville's proximity to the New and Gauley rivers has made it a center for recreation. Both these rivers are famous for their challenging white-water rapids, which are considered some of the best in the country.

Northeast of Fayetteville is the New River Gorge Bridge. one of the longest steel-arch span bridges in the world and one of the highest bridges in the nation. The arch spans 1,700 feet, while the bridge itself stretches 3,030 feet across the gorge. At 876 feet, it is 321 feet higher than the Washington Monument.

Extreme sports fanatics gather in Fayetteville the third Saturday in October for the New River Gorge Bridge Day. Close to 80,000 spectators watch as hundreds of BASE jumpers, rappel teams and high line riders leap, jump and descend from the bridge.

Fayetteville lies along scenic US 19, which runs 45 miles from the West Virginia Turnpike/I-77 at Bradley to I-79 near Sutton.

#### GRAFTON

While still a part of Virginia, Grafton was incorporated in 1856. The town was a key point in the Civil War because of its location on the B&O Railroad. At the beginning of the war, Confederate Colonel George A. Porterfield and a small contingent established a base in Grafton. Bailey Brown, who during the Battle of Philippi became the first Union soldier killed by Confederate forces, is buried in Grafton National Cemetery at 431 Walnut St.

THE INTERNATIONAL MOTHER'S DAY SHRINE is at 11 E. Main St. Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church was the site of the first observance of Mother's Day, May 10, 1908. Phone: (304) 265-1589.

TYGART RIVER DAM AND LAKE is 2 mi. s., following signs from US 50 or US 119. The dam was built to control floods on the Monongahela River and reduce the crest of the Ohio River during flood times. The dam is 207 feet thick at the base, 1,921 feet long and 230 feet high. The reservoir, which covers 1,750 acres and has a 32-mile shoreline, provides opportunities for fishing and hiking. #### HARPERS FERRY

The town of Harpers Ferry is at the confluence of the Potomac and Shenandoah rivers, separating Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia. The federal arsenal and armory built in 1796 manufactured many of the muskets and rifles used in the War of 1812 and the Civil War. These buildings were the targets of abolitionist John Brown's notorious raid.

On the night of Oct. 16, 1859, Brown, accompanied by 18 members of his 21-man "army," surprised and captured the armory and arsenal. His intent was to incite the slaves to insurrection and arm them from the government stores. After considerable bloodshed, the raiders were captured by U.S. Marines under Col. Robert E. Lee. Brown and six of his followers were tried for treason, convicted and hanged at Charles Town.

During the Civil War, Harpers Ferry was regarded by the Union command as a key to the safety of Washington, D.C. In 1861 the small federal garrison abandoned the town before a force of Virginians, but destroyed the arsenal before leaving. It was never rebuilt. The following year Gen. Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson captured the federal garrison after a terrific bombardment, taking 12,500 Union soldiers as prisoners before moving on to join Lee at Antietam.

The Appalachian Trail passes nearby, and the Shenandoah and Potomac rivers offer opportunities for fishing, canoeing and rafting.

# HARPERS FERRY NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

Harpers Ferry National Historical Park is on US 340 at the scenic confluence of the Shenandoah and Potomac rivers. The 3,823-acre park is comprised of several areas: the Lower Town, Maryland Heights, Loudoun Heights, Bolivar Heights, Cavalier Heights, Short Hill, Virginius Island, Murphy Farm and School House Ridge North and South. Maps and guides are available at the park visitor center on Cavalier Heights, about 1 mile west of the Shenandoah River bridge.

Congress authorized a national monument here in 1944, and the area was declared a National Historical Park in 1963. Shuttle buses connect the visitor center with

the Lower Town, the site where George Washington persuaded the federal government to construct a national armory and arsenal and where John Brown led his famous raid in 1859.

Park exhibits and museums in more than two dozen restored 19th-century buildings, including John Brown's fort, John Brown Museum, the Provost Marshal office, Civil War Museum, Industry Museum and Restoration Museum, reflect the diverse historical events that shaped the region: the first successful application of interchangeable manufacture; the arrival of the first successful American railroad; John Brown's attack on slavery; the largest surrender of Federal troops during the Civil War; and the education of former slaves at Storer College, one of the earliest integrated schools in the United States.


John Brown's Fort, on Arsenal Square, was the scene of Brown's capture. The 1848 brick armory firehouse was dismantled and moved to Chicago after the Civil War; the building was later moved to the Murphy Farm then Storer College campus before being restored to a site 150 feet east of its original location. The granite John Brown Monument marks the original site of the firehouse where Brown and his men made their stand.

The 1782 Harper House is the oldest surviving structure in Harpers Ferry. The lower level of this home exhibits an armory worker's apartment.

Guided tours are available throughout the summer. Hiking trails lead to Maryland Heights, 1,448 feet above the rivers, where remnants of Civil War fortifications and campsites are visible. A walking tour of Virginius Island on the banks of the Shenandoah River reveals the ruins of a once-thriving industrial community. The foundries, mills and factories that survived the war were leveled by record floods in 1870 and 1889.

The park and visitor center are open daily 9-5; closed Jan. 1, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Admission (valid for 3 days) is \$20 per private vehicle carrying up to 7 passengers; \$15 for motorcycles; \$10 for individuals (ages 16+) arriving by foot or bicycle. Credit cards are only accepted at Cavalier Heights entrance. Phone (304) 535-6029.

#### HINTON

Hinton, a historic railroad town on the New River, was once the main terminal for the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway. Ten miles north via SR 26 (River Road) is Sandstone Falls, a noted spot among anglers for catfish and bass. West on SR 20, the New River Gorge National Park and Preserve's Sandstone Visitor Center features interactive exhibits; phone (304) 466-0417.

Memorabilia and exhibits at the Veterans Memorial Museum, 419 Ballengee St., highlight every major conflict and era. The collection includes General Douglas MacArthur's footlocker, a vintage 151A2 jeep and a rare Nazi dagger.

Bluestone Dam, 1 mile south via SR 20 on the New River, forms 2,040-acre Bluestone Lake, providing recreational options such as boating, fishing and picnicking; phone (304) 466-2805 for information about Bluestone. See Recreation Areas Chart.

Among the products manufactured in the area are chemicals, clothing, glass and steel.





#### LEWISBURG

Lewisburg's name was changed from Camp Union to honor Gen. Andrew Lewis, who organized the Virginia militia in 1774 for a campaign against the Shawnee. Lewis led his frontiersmen to victory at the Battle of Point Pleasant, said to be the first battle of the American Revolution. Andrew Lewis Park on N. Jefferson Street was the site where the militia assembled for the historic campaign.

The Civil War made yet another battleground out of Lewisburg. On May 23, 1862, the Confederate forces of Henry Heth clashed with the Union troops of George Crook, who later would win renown as the captor of Apache chief Geronimo. Although the Union force was victorious, Lewisburg remained a Confederate outpost for most of the war.

Some of Lewisburg's old buildings still bear scars of the battle, and a cross-shaped mass grave on McElhenny Road holds the remains of 95 unknown Confederate soldiers killed during the Battle of Lewisburg.

Carnegie Hall, 611 Church St., was a 1902 gift from Andrew Carnegie to the Lewisburg Female Institute, later known as Greenbrier College. The building now serves as an arts and education center; phone (304) 645-7917 for information about performances and exhibits.

Professional theatrical productions are staged by Greenbrier Valley Theatre. Musicals, dramas, comedies, children's plays, musical concerts, and literary and poetry readings are offered year-round; phone (304) 645-3838 or (866) 888-1411 for information.

The Greenbrier River Trail, a 78-mile pathway for hikers and bicyclers, runs along the Greenbrier River from Caldwell to Cass (see place listing p. 359); the entrance to the trail at Caldwell is 3 miles east via US 60. The trail, originally part of the Chesapeake & Ohio rail system, provides access to the river for fishing, canoeing and crosscountry skiing.

**Self-quiding tours:** Booklets outlining tours of the Battle of Lewisburg and the 236-acre historic district, containing more than 60 18th- and 19th-century buildings of historic and architectural interest, such as North House Museum and Old Stone Church, are available at local lodgings and at the visitors center. Brochures containing information about self-guiding tours of the county's covered bridges, scenic overlooks and historic sites also are available at the visitors center.

LOST WORLD CAVERNS is 1.5 mi. n. via Court St. to 907 Lost World Dr. The caves were discovered in 1942 by speleologists from Virginia Polytechnic Institute. They contain a number of large rooms with stalactite, stalagmite and flowstone formations as well as impressive displays of pure calcite. Visitors descend about 100 feet below the entrance point and explore at their own pace by taking a self-guiding, half-mile loop trail through the caverns.

Some of the formations encountered include the Bridal Veil, a dazzling display of white calcite; the Snowy Chandelier, one of the largest stalactites in the United States at a whopping 30 tons; and the War Club, a 28-foot stalagmite. A subterranean stream and stalagmites jutting upward from the cave floor add to the mystique and beauty of this underground world. While the caverns' temperature is a constant 52 F. visitors can warm up in the facility's onsite museum, featuring an assortment of fossil and dinosaur replicas.

Note: Guided Wild Cave tours take four hours; full mobility is recommended. Warm clothing and comfortable shoes are recommended on all tours. Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. **Phone:** (304) 645-6677 or (866) 228-3778. GT <del>7</del>

NORTH HOUSE MUSEUM is .5 mi. w. on US 60 to 301 W. Washington St. The restored 1820 house displays antiques and artifacts dating from the early 1700s to the late 1800s, including Civil and Revolutionary war items and a Virginia Valley covered wagon. The library and its archives contain documents and family records from the same period.



#### MONONGAHELA NATIONAL FOREST

Elevations in the forest range from 900 ft. at Petersburg to 4,861 ft. at Spruce Knob. Refer to AAA maps for additional elevation information.

Monongahela National Forest encompasses ten West Virginia counties in the Allegheny Mountains. Noted for its rugged terrain, highland bogs, blueberry thickets, vistas of exposed rocks, fast-moving streams and thick cover of trees, the forest was established in 1920 after widespread cutting of eastern forests. One of the 920,000-acre forest's best known attractions is Spruce Knob, West Virginia's highest peak at 3,861 feet (see Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area p. 387).

Seneca Rocks (see Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area p. 387) and July-blooming rhododendrons are among the region's highlights.

Access the four bogs of Cranberry Glades Botanical Area, which contains bog vegetation far south of its normal range, from a half-mile-long boardwalk at the

Cranberry Mountain Nature Center (SRs 39 and 50), where you also can hike on a self-guiding nature trail and see exhibits depicting forest ecology, history and wildlife, including a live snake display. The center is open mid-Apr. to mid-Oct.; phone (304) 653-4826 or (304) 846-2122 off-season.

Many good routes traverse the forest; some provide picturesque drives. The 43-mile Highland Scenic Highway between Richwood and US 219 follows SR 39/55 for 21 miles, then SR 150 for 22 miles, offering spectacular views of the Allegheny Highlands. US 250 offers some exceptional scenery. Between Huttonsville and the Virginia line the highway crosses 4,353-foot Top of Allegheny. A 60-mile section of US 33 from Elkins east to Franklin also offers splendid vistas.

Bears, deer, grouse, rabbits, squirrels and turkeys can be hunted in season. The forest contains 129 miles of warm-water fishing and 576 miles of trout streams. Gaudineer Scenic Area, off US 250 north of Durbin, protects 140 acres of virgin red spruce. The Dolly Sods Wilderness Area, 17,371 acres west of Hopeville, offers wide views and upland bogs with unusual plants. In the 20,698 acres of Otter Creek Wilderness Area hiking trails thread through mountainous terrain. Fernow Experimental Forest, administered by the U.S. Forest Service, adjoins Otter Creek; hunting is permitted in season.

Other wilderness areas within the forest are Cranberry, Laurel Fork North, Laurel Fork South, Spice Run, Big Draft and Roaring Plains West. The forest is traversed by some 500 miles of hiking trails and an extensive backwoods road and trail system for hiking, mountain biking and horseback riding. An excellent hiking guide to the forest is available for a fee from the West Virginia Highlands Conservancy, P.O. Box 306, Charleston, WV 25321.

Near the Evansdale campus is the WVU Robert C. Byrd Health Sciences Center.

Coopers Rock State Forest, 13 miles east off I-68, offers 12,713 acres of forest, interesting rock formations, hiking trails, cross-country ski trails, camping and picnic areas, a 19th-century iron furnace and a spectacular view of the Cheat River Valley. Swimming and boating are popular activities at Cheat Lake, just east of town on I-68.

A 52-mile section of the West Virginia Rail Trail follows the Monongahela River through Morgantown. Ideal for walking, bicycling, jogging and inline skating, the trail is paved within city limits. Morgantown is at the western end of the scenic portion of I-68, which runs east to Hancock, Md.

#### **NEW RIVER GORGE NATIONAL PARK AND PRESERVE**

The New River Gorge National Park and Preserve encompasses 65,165 acres of scenic Appalachian terrain, which permits hunting and fishing, and 7,021 acres of parkland. Found within are the New River and its narrow gorge that wind through the Appalachian Mountains from Hinton to the New River Gorge Bridge (US 19) near Fayetteville. Contrary to its name, the New is believed to be one of the oldest rivers in North America; it was part of the ancient Teays River system, which originated more than 65 million years ago.

The river's human history began about 12,000 years ago when Native Americans lived and hunted in the area. The portion of the river within the park, however, was largely unsettled due to the dangerous and often impassable rapids and steep gorge walls. In 1873 the C&O Railroad was completed through the gorge and provided access to the exposed rich seams of coal in the mountains.

For the next 80 years the area was a booming industrial center, whose heart was the 18-odd communities in the lower canyon from Prince to Fayette Station. But as the mines were worked out, people began to leave the gorge's coal towns. Forest has since reclaimed most of the towns and mine sites.

#### General Information and Activities

The New River is regarded as one of the best rivers in the state for small-mouth bass fishing. In addition, muskellunge, walleye, catfish and carp test the skill of anglers. Some of the river's tributaries are stocked with trout. The most popular portion of the New for fishing is the upper section from Hinton to McCreery.

The river is said to rival the Colorado for its white-water rafting opportunities. The 30 miles of the lower portion from McCreery to the New River Gorge Bridge draw white-water rafting enthusiasts each year from early April to mid-October. Many outfitters with highly skilled guides provide both scenic and white-water trips through the gorge and are primarily located at the northern end of the river.

The sandstone cliffs along the New River, which range up to 120 feet tall, have become well-known among rock climbing enthusiasts. The peak climbing season runs from April through November.

Three visitor centers offer brochures, maps and historic background on the river and the surrounding area; park rangers provide information and orientation services. The Grandview's Center on SR 25 in the Thurmond railroad depot and SR 9 is noted for its overlooks, trails and spring display of rhododendrons. The Canyon Rim Visitor Center, (304) 574-2115, in Lansing and Sandstone Visitor

Center, (304) 466-0417, in Sandstone are open year-round; all others are open seasonally.

Other popular recreational activities within the park include picnicking, camping, hiking, mountain biking, canoeing, kayaking and horseback riding. See Recreation Areas Chart.

Though not the county seat, Oak Hill is Fayette County's largest city. The Coal Miner's Memorial Statue, at the visitor center on Oyler Avenue, stands as a reminder of the area's coal mining heritage; visitors are welcome to take a piece of coal as a souvenir.

At Oak Hill Public Library, 611 Main St., a bronze plaque notes legendary country singer Hank Williams "made his last stop on his last tour" in the community in 1953.

White-water rafting opportunities are numerous due to the city's proximity to the New River Gorge.

**ORGAN CAVE** is .5 mi. e. on SR 63 to 242 Organ Cave Dr. Ninety-minute walking tours of the cave, discovered in 1704, feature fossils, stalactites, stalagmites and a Civil War refinery used by the Confederates to produce saltpeter. More than 200 passages have yet to be mapped. The cave, left as unaltered as possible, has more than 45

miles of passageways. Condensed walking tours and exploration expeditions also are available.

#### **PARKERSBURG**

#### • Hotels p. 382

Parkersburg's strategic location at the confluence of the Little Kanawha and Ohio rivers aided its development as an industrial center. An early visitor was George Washington, who surveyed land above the city on the Ohio River. In 1810 the Virginia legislature passed an act to found the town, known as Neal's Station and Newport prior to being incorporated as Parkersburg. Improved transportation modes and routes to the area soon followed. West Virginia's first oil wells were drilled nearby in 1860, which made Parkersburg the supply and shipping point for the "black gold" fields.

The region also was blessed with natural gas fields, and gas soon became the major source of fuel for the growing number of industrial plants. More than 100 industries produce chemicals, glass, metals, plastics and other products.

A rails-to-trails conversion, the North Bend Rail Trail extends for 72 miles from its trailhead near Parkersburg to Wolf Summit near Clarksburg. The scenic trail runs through 10 tunnels constructed by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad 1853-57 and crosses 36 bridges.

BLENNERHASSETT ISLAND HISTORICAL STATE PARK is in the Ohio River, reached by sternwheeler from Point Park on Second Street. Harman Blennerhassett, an Irish aristocrat, built his island mansion in 1798. He became involved with Aaron Burr in an alleged plot to establish an empire in the Southwest and was forced to flee the island with his family in 1806 when the conspiracy came to light. Both men were eventually acquitted of treason, but their lives were ruined.

Fire destroyed the abandoned mansion in 1811. The Palladian-style house has been reconstructed upon its original foundation, and guided tours of the interior are

#### **PETERSBURG**

On the south branch of the Potomac River, Petersburg was settled in 1745. It was named after German colonist Jacob Peterson, who established the town's first store. During the Civil War the town served as a Union outpost along the contested border between the North and South. Nearby earthworks were constructed by troops from Illinois and Ohio in 1863.

Because it is near the entrance to Monongahela National Forest and Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area (see place listings p. 377 and p. 387), Petersburg is considered a recreation center, and calls itself the "Home of the Golden Trout." Area outfitters provide information, equipment and guides for hunting, fishing and canoeing trips into the surrounding wilderness.

SMOKE HOLE CAVERNS is 8 mi. s.w. on SR 28/55. Knowledgeable guides lead visitors along an intricate system of walkways to observe the various wonders within the caverns, which include helictites, stalagmites and stalactites. Unusual formations include one of the world's longest ribbon stalactites and an underground lake and stream. Features pointed out along the tour include the Artesian Spring, Rainbow Falls, Flowstone Dome and the Crystal Cave Coral Pool, filled with trout.

The caverns were reportedly used by Native Americans to smoke meat and by enterprising settlers to make moonshine. A 19th-century still is displayed. A wildlife museum is on the grounds. The caverns maintain a constant temperature of 56 F. **Phone**: (304) 257-4442 or (800) 828-8478. ====

The first land battle of the Civil War occurred at Philippi (FIL-uh-pee) on June 3, 1861. Col. B.F. Kelley and a detachment of Federal troops from George McClellan's army surprised and routed the newly recruited Confederates under the command of Col. George Alexander Porterfield.

Spanning the Tygart River is a covered bridge that was originally built in 1852 and was used by both Confederate and Union forces during the battles. The bridge burned in 1989 but has been completely restored and is the only covered bridge still in use as a federal highway. From Fairmont to the north, the scenic portion of US 250 passes through Philippi on its 73-mile journey to Huttonsville.

Details include woodwork of native hardwood, double porches, an outside walnut stairway, travelers' rooms and a metal roof with handmade brackets. Point Pleasant is in a growing resort area near the confluence of the Kanawha and Ohio rivers. It is said that when George Washington surveyed this area in the 1740s, he referred to it as the Pleasant Point.

A reconstruction of Fort Randolph, the best known of the town's forts, is in Krodel Park and is open during special events. The 44-acre park also contains campsites and a playground, and allows fishing; phone (304) 675-6788, (304) 675-1068 or (304) 857-1490 for the campground.

SENECA CAVERNS is 3 mi. e. of US 33 via German Valley Rd. Visitors travel along a .75-mile passage on an hour-long guided tour through the caverns at a depth ranging from 25-165 feet below ground level. Lighted trails provide access to the caverns' unusual mineral formations including cave coral, rimstone, stalactites, stalagmites and travertine.

Other formations include Mirror Lake, a reflective underground pool, and the Grand Ballroom, featuring a natural balcony. The caverns served as a refuge for the Seneca Indians from cold winters and for ceremonial rituals during the 1400s and 1500s. Gemstone mining is available. Tours of undeveloped Stratosphere Cavern, reportedly the oldest cavern in the state, also are offered.

#### **SANDSTONE**

Sandstone is a rural community along the New River just south of I-64, characterized by its natural beauty and views of the river. Sandstone Falls State Park is south of town along SR-26. The falls stretch the full width of the river (about 1,500 feet) and it is the largest waterfall in the river. Visitors can enjoy hiking, fishing and mountain biking along the lush trails.

SANDSTONE VISITOR CENTER is just n. on SR 20 from jct. I-64 exit 139 to 330 Meadow Creek Rd. Keeping environmental sustainability in mind, the center was designed and built using "green" concepts. Highlights include informative and interactive exhibits about the river's natural and cultural history as well as a 12-minute video presentation about ecology and the New River Valley. German Street is the town's cultural and social hub; Shepherd University's more than 4,200 students find time between classes to take a break at the street's cafés, boutiques and art studios. The town's history is well-represented in Federal, Greek Revival and Victorian homes and other buildings. On German Street are Shepherd University, built in 1871, and the Entler Hotel, built in 1786.

The site of one of the earliest settlements in West Virginia, Shepherdstown was established by English and German farmers who had crossed the river from Pennsylvania into this area before 1730. The legal grant to the land was purchased by Thomas Shepherd in 1732. Originally named Mecklenburg, the name was changed to Shepherdstown in 1798. While living in Shepherdstown in 1787, James Rumsey gave the first public exhibition of his steamboat. A monument on the banks of the Potomac commemorates this successful demonstration.

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#### SPRUCE KNOB-SENECA ROCKS NATIONAL RECREATION AREA

The Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area is composed of two sections within the Monongahela National Forest (see place listing p. 377). The larger Seneca Rocks unit is especially noted for rugged terrain and white-water boating during high flows in spring and rock-climbing opportunities. Camping, fishing and hiking are popular during spring and summer. Hunting is permitted in season. Cross-country skiers prefer the higher elevations in the Spruce Knob unit, where trails are plentiful. For further information, phone (304) 567-2827 for Seneca Rocks Discovery Center or (304) 257-4488 for the Potomac Ranger District office. See Recreation Areas Chart.

SENECA ROCKS is off US 33 and SR 28 at the town of Seneca Rocks. Rising above the North Fork River, this 900-foot-tall mass of intricately eroded quartzite sandstone is one of the most impressive rock formations in the East and is considered to be an excellent rock-climbing area.

According to legend, Snow Bird, the beautiful daughter of Seneca chief Bald Eagle, held a contest to decide who should be her husband. The first warrior to scale the mighty cliff, which she had been able to climb since her early childhood, was eligible to marry her. SMOKE HOLE CANYON lies along Smoke Hole Rd. in the Seneca Rocks unit; take SR 28/11 s. from jct. SR 28 at Cabins. The half-mile-deep gorge was formed by the south branch of the Potomac River as it ran between North Fork and Cave mountains. SR 2 leads northwest from US 220 north of Upper Tract, traverses a portion of the gorge and ends at the Big Bend Campground. Among Smoke Hole's notable formations is Eagle Rock, which towers upward from the river. Phone: (304) 257-4488 for the Potomac Ranger District office.

SPRUCE KNOB is w. of SR 28 via SR 33/4 about 2.5 mi. s. of Riverton. Spruce Knob is the highest point in West Virginia at 4,861 feet (see Monongahela National Forest p. 377). Numerous overlooks provide scenic views on the road to the summit, which features an observation tower and an interpretive trail.

Nearby Spruce Knob Lake is stocked with trout and offers good fishing, especially during the spring and fall. Note: The road is twisting and steep and can be dangerous especially during hazardous driving conditions; caution is advised. The road should not be attempted by inexperienced drivers. Nancy Hart, a Confederate spy, led an attack on Summersville in 1861. During the battle a Union force was captured, and the town was burned. Hart escaped to Confederate lines but returned after Gen. Robert E. Lee's surrender.

US 19, a 45-mile scenic highway linking I-79 at Sutton and the West Virginia Turnpike at Bradley, passes Summersville near Summersville Lake. The lake is West Virginia's largest with 60 miles of shoreline and more than 2,800 acres of water. Summersville Lake State Park, 62 Farmhouse Ln., offers swimming, fishing, hiking, camping, scuba diving and snorkeling, and picnicking opportunities (see Recreation Areas Chart). Summersville serves as the county seat for Nicholas County.


The Gauley River National Recreation Area, between Summersville and Swiss, protects 25 miles of the Gauley River and 6 miles of its tributary, the Meadow River. The Gauley is known for its rapids, white-water rafting and fishing opportunities. The recreation area can be reached from Carnifex Ferry Battlefield State Park (see attraction listing) or Summersville Dam off SR 129 and from SR 39. #### UNION

The one-time hunting grounds of the Iroquois and other tribes attracted settlers from Virginia. James Alexander settled in what became Union in 1774 before serving in the Revolutionary War. When the area separated from Greenbrier in 1799, the town became the county seat of Monroe County.

The area boasts farmland, timberland and mineral springs. Those same springs made it part of a popular resort region until the early 20th century. Historic features abound, especially on Main Street. An eye-catching 1952 Chevrolet truck is parked outside Kittles Hardware and Supply, at 405 Main St. Once home to Ford Model-Ts and General Motors, the 15,000-square-foot store has sold hardware and essential supplies since the 1950s; phone (304) 772-3009. North on US 219 is the Indian Creek Covered Bridge, part of a former Native American path called the Seneca Trail or the Warrior's Path.

Moncove Lake State Park, 695 Moncove Lake Access Rd., is a wildlife management and recreation area *(see Recreation Areas Chart)*, which is in nearby Gap Mills. Phone (304) 772-3450.

Agriculture remains an economic force and a source of pride. Farmer's Day, an annual event in early June,

celebrates agriculture with a parade, street dance and fireworks.

**Self-guiding tours:** Brochures outlining scenic drive trips, including the Rural Heritage Quilt Trail, which features decorated barns and businesses, and Civil War Trail, are available at the Monroe County Historical Society.

MONROE COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY MUSEUM COMPLEX, at US 219/Main and Fairview sts., features historical buildings, Civil War-era exhibits and carriages in the National Historic District of Union. The 1810 Clark-Wiseman and Owen Neel II log cabins reveal pioneer life complete with period furnishings. Interior exhibits of the 1820 Hugh Caperton law office include Native American artifacts, historic tools and a uniform of J.W.M. Appleton, a recruiter for the 54th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment, the African American troop portrayed in the 1989 Civil War film "Glory."

The Carriage House Museum showcases a John Stephenson Company omnibus, a sleigh and other 19th century horse-drawn vehicles. **Phone:** (304) 772-3946. **GT**

Weston serves as a commercial center for an agricultural area and supports glass industries. Surveyed by Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson's grandfather, the town contains several rambling Victorian-era homes. The Trans-

Allegheny Lunatic Asylum (see attraction listing), formerly called Weston State Hospital, is surrounded by vast landscaped grounds. The main building, begun in 1860 and completed in 1865, has 9 acres of floor space and is said to be the largest hand-cut stone building in the United States.

The Citizens Bank Building at 201 Main Ave. is noted among devotees of classic Art Deco architecture. Built 1928-30, this 54-foot tall Indiana limestone structure is believed to be the tallest single-story building in the United States; the wrought-iron work is by the noted artist

Samuel Yellen. Inside, the woodwork is hand-carved American walnut, and the 45-foot suspended plaster ceiling has a relief of the Great Seal of West Virginia. Also of interest in nearby Horner is the Central West Virginia Genealogical and Historical Library and Museum, which is open to the public for research; phone (304) 269-7091.

Every Labor Day weekend, the city celebrates Jackson's Mill Jubilee, complete with Civil War re-enactments, heritage exhibits, music, fireworks and arts and crafts vendors.

Nearby Stonewall Resort State Park surrounds the state's second-largest lake. This park offers many recreational opportunities and facilities. For more information phone (304) 269-7400. See Recreation Areas Chart.

#### WHEELING

Wheeling lies along the scenic portion of I-70, which continues into Pennsylvania to the east and Ohio to the west. The last battle of the American Revolution was fought in Wheeling Sept. 11-13, 1782, when Fort Henry was attacked by a force of 40 British soldiers and 260 Native Americans. The news of the peace had not yet reached this outpost. Ebenezer and Silas Zane, who founded the city in 1769, led the defending forces. Their sister, Betty, brought powder from the Zane cabin to the fort; her efforts saved the garrison. The site of the fort is marked by a memorial stone on Main Street.

When Virginia seceded from the Union, delegates from the western counties met at Wheeling and set up the "Restored Government of Virginia," with Wheeling as the capital. After West Virginia was formally admitted to the Union in 1863, Wheeling was the capital until 1870 and again 1875-85.

The 1,010-foot-long Wheeling Suspension Bridge, built in 1849, is one of the world's longest of its kind. Henry Clay, while visiting Wheeling a year after the bridge opened, described it as "a rainbow to behold."

Wheeling's history as a frontier port where the National Road met the Ohio River is evident in the Old Town section; some of the buildings are open to the public by tour.

From May through August the Wheeling Heritage Port Amphitheater hosts Wheeling's Waterfront Wednesdays where free concerts are featured.

In winter, the city is illuminated with one of the country's largest light shows, Festival of Lights, featuring a 6-mile driving tour through 300 acres.

Shopping: Eight miles west on I-70 in nearby St. Clairsville, Ohio, is Ohio Valley Mall, whose more than 150 stores include Macy's and Sears. Wheeling's Historic Centre Market, 2200 Market St., features antique and craft shops in and around the refurbished Centre Market House.

**TEAS** is at 810 Main St. The 18-room 1892 Queen Anne town home maintains many original features, such as stained glass, fretwork, mantles, inlaid floors, pocket doors and original electric and gas light fixtures. Tours provide information about area history and the home's living and servants' quarters. Teas, including a sweet tea, an afternoon tea and a tea luncheon in the home's elegant dining room are presided over by a costumed hostess.

OGLEBAY RESORT is off I-70 at US 40, then 3 mi. Volume on SR 88 to 465 Lodge Dr. This 1,700-acre parklike resort offers gardens, nature trails, stables, a zoo, a spa, shops and museums. Activities include golf, tennis, swimming, trail rides, pedal-boating, fishing, skiing and snowboarding (see Recreation Areas Chart).

In November and December, one million holiday lights decorate the park for the Winter Festival of Lights.

The Good Zoo at Oglebay, within Oglebay Resort, is named in memory of 7-year-old Philip Mayer Good, a young boy who loved nature and visiting

Oglebay Park. The 30-acre zoo provides natural settings for 50 species, many of them rare and endangered, including African wild dogs, lemurs, otters and red pandas.

The Discovery Lab offers hands-on exhibits for children, while the Benedum Theater provides seasonal programs for all ages. A wetlands exhibit features animals and plants native to the region. An 1863 train tours the zoo along a 1.5-mile track and travels through the ostrich and zebra exhibits. An O-gauge model train is part of an indoor display.

Lorikeet Landing is an Australian walk-through aviary where cups of nectar can be hand-fed to the colorful birds that perch right on visitors' hands. Gray and red kangaroos and red-necked wallabies may be seen at the Outback Exhibit. A children's farm, a goat contact area, animal encounters and a gem mining sluice also are available.

Mansion Museum, within Oglebay Resort, contains historical material and is furnished with items reflecting Ohio Valley life in the early days. The mansion, the former summer home of Col. and Mrs. Earl W. Oglebay, is furnished to represent different eras of Wheeling's past. Schrader Environmental Education Center, within Oglebay Resort at 465 Lodge Dr., offers three nature trails that cover almost 5 miles, featuring overlooks, wildlife observation areas and waterfalls. Stifel Fine Arts Center is off I-70 exit 2B, .5 mi. n.e. on Washington Ave., then s. to 1330 National Rd. The center contains art exhibits by local, regional and national artists. Housed in an old mansion, the center is surrounded by lovely gardens. Time: Allow 1 hour minimum. Phone: (304) 242-7700.

WEST VIRGINIA INDEPENDENCE HALL MUSEUM is at 1528 Market St. This former Custom House is considered to be the Civil War birthplace of West Virginia. The state's separation from Virginia was the only change in the map of the United States resulting from the Civil War. From 1861 to 1863 the building housed the loyalist Union government of the Restored State of Virginia and the first constitutional convention for the state of West Virginia.

Restored rooms and a film interpret the building's history. A permanent exhibit of 3-D maps, artifacts and audiovisual displays depicts the rise to statehood and the war in West Virginia. The museum also features what is reputedly the largest exhibit of West Virginia Civil War battle flags and a Discovery Room for children. Time: Allow 30 minutes minimum. WHEELING PARK is 4 mi. e. on US 40 at 1801 National Rd. The 406-acre park contains paddleboating facilities, a covered ice-skating rink, indoor and outdoor tennis courts, a miniature golf course, a nine-hole golf course, a playground with rubberized safety surface, and an Olympic-size swimming pool and waterslide (see Recreation Areas Chart).
